IMPASSE - Collective bargaining between LCC and the classified employees' union has reached the factfinding stage. A factfinder selected by the parties will hold a hearing, probably this month, and then make recommendations for settlement of the dispute.

IN-SERVICE - Student Personnel staff members are having in-service sessions at various times this week. All staff will be involved all day Monday and Tuesday morning. Calls during that time will be taken at ext. 238. Counselors, however, won't be back in their offices until 8 a.m. Friday morning.

DEADLINE MOVED UP - Because many offices will be closed the last two weeks of August, the deadline for proposals for new workshop classes to be offered Fall Term has been moved ahead. They're now due at the office of Mary Jeanne Jacobsen on the Library mezzanine by Wednesday, August 6. Office of Instruction approvals will be announced August 11, Mary Jeanne advises.

PAYROLL - Mid-month draw payroll worksheets will be available for pick up at the Financial Services Office August 13th, and mid-month draw checks will be available August 15th. Monthly payroll worksheets will be available for pick up at 2:00 p.m., August 20th, and are due back to the Financial Services Office by 5:00 p.m., August 21st. August monthly paychecks will be available for distribution the morning of August 29th.

Supervisors of offices/departments to be closed the latter half of August should make the necessary arrangements to have payroll worksheets signed and returned with time sheets, if appropriate to Financial Services. Payroll checks which are not picked up at Financial Services Friday, August 29th, will be mailed that afternoon.

ELECTION TUESDAY - Lane County seeks approval of a \$3.5 million levy beyond the 6% limitation.

MOVING UP - Former associate dean of instruction Ray LaGrandeur becomes second-in-command of the Nevada community college system on October 1. To be based at Reno, Ray will have the title of assistant to the president of the community college division of the University of Nevada. He will supervise business, budget and personnel operations for the state's 3 community colleges at North Las Vegas, Elko and Carson City. The 5-year-old system enrolled 4,900 students last year.

LaGrandeur, at LCC from 1967-72, has been director of the Olympia, Wash., Vocational Technical Institute. During his tenure, the school won accreditation, broke ground for a \$4 million building (its first permanent facility), and last year led the 27 Washington community colleges in percentage enrollment growth.

BUILDING & MAINTENANCE - Construction of the Siuslaw Area Education Center is on schedule, reports Walt Van Orden of Plant Services. Foundations have been poured, floors are in, outside walls have been framed and the contractor is ready to go on the roof structure. The \$400,000 building is to be ready for occupancy January 1. If you're at the coast one of these days, you can see the structure by locating Florence's Siuslaw High School, which is next door. The parking lot is graveled and you should be able to get within close peeking distance.

Maintenance work is moving along around the campus on such projects as repainting the wood on the Center Building exterior and rebuilding the laundry's boiler.

Planning is underway to remodel the west half of the first floor of the Administration Building. Campus crews are expected to do much of the work connected with readying the space to house part of the Business Operations and Community Education staffs. That project may be complete by late Fall Term, Walt says.

RESTAURANT CUTBACK POSSIBLE - To cut losses, food services may have to diet this year. The restaurant's hours could be reduced or it could be closed and replaced by a catering service. An evaluation is underway; preliminary decisions may be announced by November.

WIND DAMAGE - Those 80-mile an hour winds that hit Ontario last Tuesday did some moderate damage to the campus of Treasure Valley CC. Some 25 to 30 trees and a cyclone fence hit the ground. Some composition roofing blew off the dormitory and a metal awning was peeled off the art building. Information officer Al Carr said that no rain leaked into either building, however.

HUMANITIES INSTITUTE - The University of Chicago wants to hear from faculty who'd like to spend a college year pursuing intensive study, discussion and curriculum planning in the humanities. UC has a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to pay participants' salaries at levels equal to what they receive at their home institutions. The Institute will be in the planning stage in 1975-76 and then will accept 20 teachers per year for three

UNION MEETING - Evelyn Tennis asks that all classified day personnel meet at 5 p.m. Monday, August 11, in the Board Room to discuss current negotiations. "Your attendance is very important. We need your vote," Evelyn reminds. She said the negotiation team will meet with swing and graveyard shift employees on their lunch hours.

IDEAS WANTED - A brainstorming session open to anyone with ideas on the future of education or the future of LCC will be held Tuesday, August 12, at 10 a.m. in the Board Room. This is preliminary to an application for federal funding of a five-year program of college development, under the program for Advanced Institutional Development.

AUGUST PAY FOR CLOSING DEPARTMENTS - Payroll worksheets for August 18-29 will be available Wednesday at 2 p.m. at Financial Services. The worksheets must be completed and returned by 5 p.m. Thursday. Payday is still August 29, except for those who requested advances last week. Adjustments for leaves without pay will be made in the September checks, unless other arrangements are made with Personnel Services before September 15.

CLOSURES - All instructional offices except Community Education will be closed the last two weeks of August. Most other offices will be open, including Business Operations, Student Personnel (except for Health Services and Student Activities), and the President's Complex (except for Information & Publications), and Academic & College Planning.

WHO'S WHO - LCC's chief flight instructor, Terry Hagberg, has been named to Who's Who of Professional Pilots in America. On the faculty two years, he also is an FAA pilot examiner and at only 24 has racked up 3,200 flying hours. Hagberg graduated from the program in which he now instructs and was a standout student.

NEW SCOUT LEADER - President Schafer has been selected as president of the Oregon Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America. Some 20,000 youths participate in Scouting in Lane, Benton, Douglas, Coos, Curry and Lincoln counties. To serve a one-year term, Eldon moves up from a three-year hitch as Council vice president for Exploring. He succeeds John Gregor, Eugene CPA.

FOODSERVICE PRICES ECONOMICAL - A comparison of food prices charged by LCC and a half dozen other food outlets in the area indicates that the college is underselling on most items. Erb Memorial Union averages about a dime more per entree and a nickel more on side dishes, reports foodservices coordinator Ken Brownell. Only on some breakfast items do LCC prices lose the competitive edge. Comparisons were made with menus from the College Side, The Pad, Black Angus, Mazzi's, Erb Union, and Jerry's Pancake Inn.

The finished report will be available for distribution during In-Service. For this first time only, the report will cover 18 months, from January 1, 1974, through June 30, 1975; thereafter, it will be on a fiscal basis.
