FIRST DAILY DAILY---Today's is the first of your basic daily Dailies for the 1975-76 school year. The reduced printing of 300 copies will continue, however, until the end of the month when the faculty has returned.

CWE EARNINGS UP, AGAIN---Students in LCC's Cooperative Work Experience program earned more than \$1.3 million in 1974-75, and in the process set an earnings record for the second straight year. A little more than 1,100 students earned a total of \$1,313,682; last year about 1,500 students earned \$1,049,000, the first time CWE income had topped the million dollar mark. The big guns for CWE this year were business management which had an unduplicated headcount of 175 and earnings of \$616,812, law enforcement with 65 students and \$155,625 in earnings, and construction with 109 students and \$150,808 in earnings.

If all that sounds big, it is. In fact, in a recently-released survey titled "Undergraduate Programs of Cooperative Education in the United States and Canada", LCC ranked 28th of 970 programs.

BOARD TO MEET---The Board of Education will meet in regular session tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. in Adm. 202. On the agenda: discussion on KVDO, which has now been sold to the Oregon Educational and Public Broadcasting Service; approval or disapproval of the Special Programs Activity Fund budget; approval or disapproval of a recommendation from the college that the Board rescind its action of April 10, 1974 which bound LCC to UFW produce in the food service area. The meeting is open.

560 ON HONOR ROLL---A total of 560 students, including 23 with straight A's, are on the summer term honor roll. The number is equally divided between the Dean's and President's Lists: 280 each.

...MEANWHILE OVER IN PLACEMENT---Director of Placement Buck Bailey has moved from the student placement office to counseling, where he will serve as a full-time counselor. 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LANE TO WRITE HEALTH COURSE---One of the three initial courses for Project ACCESS; formerly the Goldmark Project, will be developed by Lane Community College. LCC will lead the efforts in writing a health course, starting later this month when representatives of seven other colleges meet with Dick Newell on this campus to pool their efforts. The other two courses are consumer education, under the direction of Central Piedmont Community College, and business under the direction of the Los Angeles Community College District.

SPAF BUDGET TO BE PRESENTED TONIGHT---A \$121,600 Special Projects and Activities Fund budget will be presented to the Board for approval tonight, and when it comes time to make a decision it will have four alternatives to choose from. Alternative #2 will be recommended for approval by Dean of Students Jack Carter, although the SPAF committee recommended an original budget that would have reduced all user budgets (except ASLCC) slightly from 1974-75. Alternative #2 provides slight increases for athletics and health services, a 14 percent increase for ASLCC, and a slight decrease for The Torch. Jack says he is recommending Alternative #2 because it realistically reflects last year's expenditures. If approved the budget would provide \$29,100 for athletics; \$45,000 for ASLCC (the 14 percent increase takes into account that many ASLCC programs did not get off the ground until the middle of last year); \$38,100 for health services; \$7,800 for The Torch; zero for the Concrete Statement; and \$1,600 for contingency. The Board meeting begins at 7:30 in Adm. 202.

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LETTUCE BAN LIFTED---A decision it made a year and a half ago restricting Lane Community College to lettuce and grapes picked by United Farm Workers has been reversed by the LCC Board of Education. The Board voted five to two last night (Jim Martin and Catherine Lauris voted "no") to rescind its April, 1974 decision which held food service managers to the UFW produce. The majority voting for return to an open purchase system noted that UFW lettuce has not always been available and is usually more expensive than locally-grown lettuce. Also cited were Board policies already on record which give preference to local suppliers for all LCC purchases, and a policy that states the Board will not in essence engage in "political" activities.

Other highlights of the meeting include:

*Keith Harker was named associate dean of instruction. The Board voted unanimously to promote Keith to associate dean after the college recommended the change. Gerry Rasmussen pointed out that Keith's duties as director of the LRC are on a par with duties of the three other LCC associate deans, and that other schools who have LRCs of comparable size to Lane's have associate deans as directors.

*The xerox computer system will be expanded. The Board decided to increase the computer memory and to add five teleprocessing ports.

*The SPAF budget was sent back to the SPAF committee. Committee members, who have not met since June, worked out a budget along different guidelines than those used by Jack Carter, and the Board would like them to try again--using the same guidelines.

*There was discussion on the possibility of hiring a contract caterer to manage the food service operation. Ken Brownell and Tony Birch and most of the Board members like the idea, citing the caterer's superior purchasing powers, recipes, and merchandising abilities. The matter will be looked into.

*Pay for part-time community education teachers will get a raise: Level 1 goes from \$7.50 to \$8; Level 2 goes from \$8 to \$8.50 an hr.; and Level 3 from \$8.50 to \$9.50. The teachers received no raises last year.

*It was announced that last spring's graduating registered nursing class passed its national boards with flying colors. It is believed to be the first time an entire class has passed the exams.

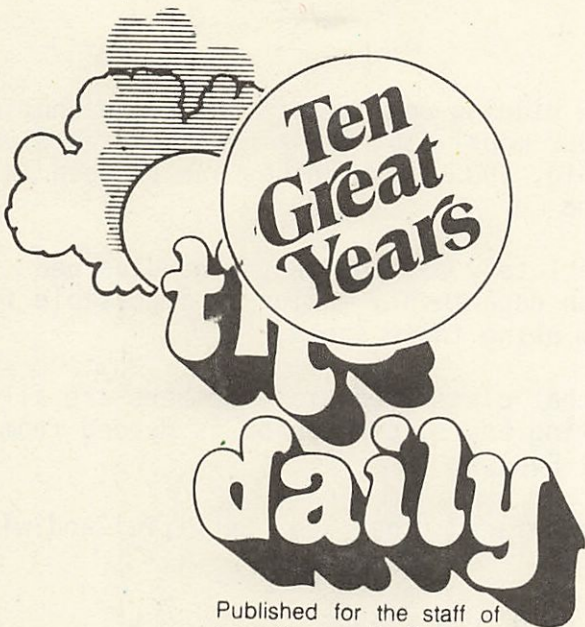

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LCC "DEVELOPING INSTITUTION"--Lane Community College has been named a "Developing Institution" by the department of Health, Education and Welfare, and that may mean \$2-\$3 million dollars coming our way in the next few years. The grants will be awarded for ideas HEW thinks would strengthen such areas as curriculum, LRC, counseling, management and so forth. Dean of Academic and College Planning Lew Case, who has been a proposal reader for other institutions for the past two years, said the deadline for idea papers from staff members is Sept. 24. Ideas, he said, should lead to serving students better than we are now, not necessarily to serving more students than we are now.

The Developing Institution program was started by HEW in 1973 to help make strong institutions stronger. This year, about 30 two-year schools are expected to be made eligible for some \$27.5 million in Advanced Institutional Development Program grants.

SOME PRICES UP IN SNACK BAR---From now on it will cost you more to buy a cheeseburger and hamburger in the snack bar, and that's just for openers. New prices, effective immediately are: hamburgers, up from 35 cents to 45 cents; cheeseburgers, from 40 cents to 50 cents; French fries, now available in two sizes, 20 and 30 cents each (old price, one size, 25 cents); coffee, tea, and cocoa, from 10 to 15 cents; chef salads, 60 to 70 cents for the small ones, and 85 cents to \$1.10 for the large salads; and some cold sandwiches have gone up a nickel.

Ken Brownell said the increased costs to the customer are due to increased food costs to the institution, and anticipated increased labor costs. When classes start later this month, some prices will also go up in the restaurant, Ken said, to a maximum of about 10 percent. The cafeteria? At this point he doesn't know.

BELIEVE IT OR NOT DEPARTMENT: POSTAGE RATES DOWN---New postage rates went into effect yesterday: while it still costs 10 cents for the first ounce of first class mail, each additional ounce now only costs nine cents. It had been 10 cents for each additional ounce. Post cards have gone down from eight to seven cents, and third class mail is ten cents for the first two ounces and eight cents for each additional two ounces. How can the poor Postal Service stay in business with such practices you ask? Hang around until the first of the year and try to mail a letter for 10 cents. That's how.

WINNERS AND LOSERS, THREE OF EACH--Voters rejected three Lane County measures yesterday, but accepted three others, including Junction City's school budget. Others passed were Cottage Grove's city budget and the South Lane Rural Fire Protection levy. Not so fortunate were the school budgets for Fern Ridge and South Lane, both defeated, and the county budget, which went down by a two to one margin. Another big loser yesterday was the Medford school budget--for the fourth time. Medford is the state's largest school district.

ART SHOW SCHEDULED---Paintings by Eugene artist Edwin B. Koch will go on display Sept. 29 in the main gallery. The exhibit of about 30 large oils will remain in the gallery until Oct. 14. A free reception is scheduled for 8 p.m. Oct. 3. Koch, a native of Montana, received a bachelor of science degree in painting and drawing from the University of Oregon in 1964. He has also attended the Portland Art Museum School and the Rhode Island School of Design, and received a master of fine arts degree from the UofO in 1967. He has been an instructor at the UofO, at the Maude I Kerns Art Center, and at LCC. He currently owns a business in Eugene. Koch's exhibits include shows at the UofO Museum of Art, the Maude I. Kerns Art Gallery, LCC, the Portland Museum of Art, The Seattle Art Museum, and Image Gallery in Portland.

SAT SCORES DROP, AGAIN---For the fourth straight year Scholastic Aptitude Test scores have dropped nationally, although Oregon fared better than most of the rest of the country. Compared with last year, national verbal scores dropped 10 points, from 444 to 434 (Oregon declined six points, from 446 to 440); math scores nationally were down eight points, from 480 to 472 (Oregon math scores dropped seven points, from 475 to 468). Nationally, the 1974-75 scores were the lowest in 11 years.

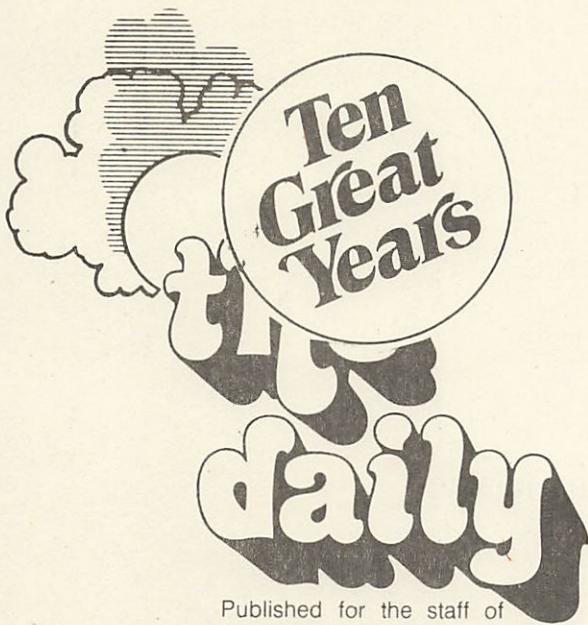

GOT A QUESTION FOR ANSWER?---"Answer", the two-way communication program that permits staff members to question practices or policies of the college without getting tangled in red tape or revealing their identity goes into effect at LCC this week. Employees can start using "Answer" as soon as the bright yellow questionnaires, which double as pre-paid mailers, start appearing in departmental offices and work areas, probably today or tomorrow. Patterned after similar programs at Oscar Mayer and other large companies, "Answer" was designed to provide a direct, two-way communication channel through which all employees could get factual, accurate information about the college while maintaining their anonymity at the same time. In supporting the program, President Schafer said "it's the first time, to my knowledge, that a system has been devised to provide access with confidentiality to all levels of administration, with assurances to the staff that they will always receive an answer." Here's how "Answer" works:

1. Write your question in the space provided on the handy "Answer" form. Include your name and address, sign, fold and seal it, then drop it in a U.S. mail box. All questions should be legitimate and straight forward, and all forms must be signed.

2. When it is received by program coordinator David Butler it will be coded by number. Your name and address will be detached and filed in a locked box, and the question will be forwarded to the appropriate supervisor or manager. He or she has ten working days to reply.

3. When the coordinator receives the answer, he will review it for inaccuracies, prompt disclosure violations, conflicts with union agreements or other problems. If for any reason answers cannot be provided, the inquirer will be notified of the reason.

4. The coordinator matches the code number on the reply with that on the name slip in the locked file box, then mails the response to your home. A file of code numbers only will be kept for each question/response, but your name slip will be destroyed. Your participation in "Answer" is known only to you and the coordinator.

Periodically, questions and answers of general interest will be reprinted in the Daily, but the identities of inquirers will always remain secret. If you have questions about the program, or if your work area does not receive "Answer" forms, please call David Butler, ext. 340.

MANNINGS TO MANAGE FOOD SERVICES---A San Francisco-based company will take over management of the day to day operations of the food services on campus, probably within a few weeks. Mannings Inc. will be offered a management services contract to not only provide the college with a manager, but also to come up with menus, merchandising techniques and purchasing services. No current LCC staff members will be cut because of the up-coming contract, which was approved by the Board of Education last night 5-2. Jim Martin and Larry Perry voted against the proposal.

Food services director Ken Brownell supports the move, saying that Mannings should be able to purchase food at lower prices than Ken is able to now (quantity buying is the reason, he says), and that the instructional end of food services should improve. Mannings' track record in research, menu construction, merchandising and purchasing techniques should rub off on the students, he added. The contract will be for three years, but either party can get out of it at the end of the first year. For its services, Mannings will get 3.5 percent of the net receipts.

According to Ken, representatives from Mannings will start arriving on campus within a few weeks to make a complete study of LCC's eating patterns, desires, and needs, then will offer a variety of options for the college to choose from. Meanwhile, the company will also send several candidates for the position of manager to be screened by the campus screening committee. Should one be selected from that group, he or she will be paid a salary set by Mannings, but will not exceed \$1,250 a month including fringe benefits.

Mannings was one of five companies contacted by the college when it started to explore the possibility of outside consulting services, and was one of two who seriously sought the contract. The other, which already has a similar contract with Mt. Hood Community College, asked five percent of the net sales plus a cash fee of \$15,000. In Eugene, Mannings has operated Sacred Heart General Hospital's food service for several years, and has been the management service at Modesto (Calif.) Junior College since 1965.

In other business, the Board approved the SPAF budget, which awards \$29,100 to athletics, \$45,000 to ASLCC, \$38,100 to health services, \$7,800 to the Torch, and \$1,600 to the contingency fund. Discussion on Board Policies was postponed until a later date.

REGISTRATION REPORT---"Opportune times to take classes are gone," Registrar Bob Marshall told the Daily at mid-afternoon Wednesday. The thousand people expected to enroll today will be picking from leftovers. And registration will continue next week. When it's all over, we should have close to 8,000 students this term. That's up about 500 over last fall term. Bob says 3,150 signed up last week, then 1,550 on Tuesday, about 1,200 yesterday. Meanwhile, President Schafer is talking to the deans about adding classes on swing and graveyard shifts in some technical-vocational areas.

The play is directed by George Lauris and will be the first production of the year for LCC. Parts call for three black actresses and two white actresses, one black actor and one white actor. "To Be Young, Gifted and Black" is based on the life of Lorraine Hansberry, the black playwright who wrote "A Raisin in the Sun" and "The Sign in Sidney Brustein's Window". It's full title is "To Be Young, Gifted and Black--a Portrait of Lorraine Hansberry in her Own Words", and was adapted by her husband. The play is a moving, entertaining piece portraying Miss Hansberry's life from the slums of Chicago through her triumph on Broadway as the first woman and only black playwright to win the New York Drama Critics' Award for the Best Play of the Year ("Raisin in the Sun") in 1959.
