"BUCKAWATT" MARATHON STARTS TODAY ON KLCC---The goal: \$10,000. The Reason: To purchase a new 10,000 watt transmitter. Beginning at noon today, all regular programming at KLCC will be dropped as the station's staff and a public radio marathon expert from New York launch the 24-hour-a-day Buckawatt Marathon to replace KLCC's 440 watt transmitter. Tom Lichty says that about 30 local musical groups have donated time to the station, and will play live in the studios during the marathon, and about \$2,000 worth of items donated by community merchants will be offered for sale. Helping organize the marathon, and serving as one of Tom's chief on-the-air fund raisers is Steve Post, author of "Playing in the FM Band" and chief announcer at WBAI, a listener-supported station in New York. He directed the first public radio marathon in New York in 1965 and has helped stations in other cities throughout the country with marathon ever since.

USE OF HEALTH SERVICE INCREASES---Student use of the student health service rose for the third straight year in 1974-75, according to a report released by health service coordinator Laura Oswalt. Patient visits totaled 11,302 last year, up from 9,965 in 1973-74 and 7,902 in 1972-73. The average visits per day also increased, from 63 a day in 1973-74 to 71 last year. In 1972-73, the health service saw 55 patients a day.

NEW ORDERING SYSTEM TO START---Effective immediately, foodservices will be using a new, numbered order form for ordering food and supplies. The forms may be obtained from foodservices. The procedure for ordering food and supplies will be as follows:

- Fill out order form with your food request. Before order can be processed, it must be signed by the department head or other authorized individual and the account number to be charged must be filled in on the bottom of the form. The originator keeps the second, yellow sheet for their file.
- 2. The Foodservice secretary will price your order and send you the first, white copy. Keep both the yellow and white copies for your departmental file. The balance of the form will be sent to the Business Office at the end of the month for automatic fund transfer.
- 3. If you have any questions regarding your food order, call Foodservices, ext. 203, and refer to the Foodservice number at the top of your order form.



RATIFICATION VOTE TODAY---Members of the faculty and classified bargaining units will vote today to accept or reject two-year contracts that have tentatively been agreed to by the Board of Education. Faculty members vote from 3-6 p.m. in the Forum. Absentee ballots are available from Charles Bentz. Dues-paying members of the LCC Employees Federation vote in the cafeteria from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2:30 p.m. today, and on breaks and lunch hours during swing and graveyard shifts. If the contracts are ratified, they will be sent to the Board for action.

BENEFIT CONCERT SCHEDULED---Works by Beethoven, Brahms, Liszt, Bizet, Mozart and Gershwin will be performed by four local women Oct. 10 in a benefit concert for the LCC music scholarship fund. FACULTY RATIFIES CONTRACT, CLASSIFIED TOTALS NOT IN YET---Faculty members approved their two-year contract yesterday, 158 to five. The contract will now go to the Board for ratification, probably at its Wednesday night meeting. As of 8:15 this morning, ballot counting had not been completed on the classified vote. Results will be announced when they come in.

DUE TO POPULAR DEMAND---The cafeteria will open from 3-10:30 a.m. for coffee, juice, donuts and so forth...starting Monday.

KLCC NEARLY HALF WAY HOME---As of yesterday at 3:30 p.m., KLCC had received cash and pledges totalling \$4,135 from supporters listening to its "Buckawatt" marathon. The station is trying to raise \$10,000 to purchase a 10,000 watt transmitter; it broadcasts over a 440 watt transmitter now. The crew, which includes New York broadcaster and writer Steve Post, vows it will stay on the air until the full amount is pledged.



KLCC DOES IT, RAISES \$10,000---KLCC's listeners came up with the last of ten thousand dollars being sought by the station in its "Buckawatt" marathon yesterday afternoon, about seven nours ahead of schedule. The money will be used to buy a new transmitter (the 10,000 watt variety) to replace the current 440 watt transmitter KLCC has been using for years. Tom Lichty says the new transmitter is the first step toward KLCC's becoming totally listener-supported. If the marathon was any indication, the listeners and the support are both definitely there.

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





CONTRACTS RATIFIED---As expected, the LCC Board of Education ratified contracts for the college's staff last night, then went on to tell the administration that escalating costs were going to have to stop, and the college has until February to tell the Board how it will stop them. The 10 year contracts call for about 8.5 percent increases in everyone's salaries, plus about two and three quarter percent in fringe penefits and professional growth, for a total of about 11.34 percent. The contracts will be printed up soon and be available for inspection. In addition, highlights of all the agreements will be printed in the Daily over the next couple of weeks.

Board chairman Al Brauer, a Florence physician, also proposed a set of guidelines that, in his words, would help keep "costs from escalating through continued innovative and creative means." He said "the Board's only acceptable solution to this fiscal dilemma is to direct the college to implement increased efficiency measures in a specific attempt to stabilize the cost per student." His motion, which passed five to two, directed the college to hold costs down by finding innovative and creative ways to teach more students without increasing costs; increasing average class size this year by at least nine percent; and increasing efficiency in the classified and administrative areas. The administration was directed to report on how all this will take place by Feb. 9, 1976.

BY THE WAY---Classified staff members have a choice as to whether they want their retroactive pay (back to July 1) in one lump sum or spread out in three equal payments. A form is being circulated at this moment. Should you wish your payment in one lump sum, disregard the form. However, if you wish to have it in separate payments, fill out the form and return it to Gail Eckhoff in Personnel Services by Oct. 13. If you're not sure which is best, Gail will figure out which of the two options is best for you, IRS-wise.

ON THE MOVE---Language arts instructor Ted Romoser will chair an affirmative action conference r the NEA this weekend in San Francisco. He'll do the same job on the other coast at Atlanta Oct. 24-26. Ted is on the move these days in his role as representative of the 50,000 higher education members in the NEA. His official title is chairman of the Higher Education Council, an office to which he was elected at the NEA convention at Los Angeles in July. His job is to let Congress know where his constituents stand on higher education issues. In recent months he's met with President Ford, Secretary of Labor John Dunlop, Energy Advisor Frank Zarb, and HEW Secretary David Matthews and Undersecretary Virginia Trotter.

ANSWER is getting questions. In the ten (working) days since it offically started ANSWER has accounted for 17 questions from staff members who want to know such things as whether the college carries liability insurance on health professions students (it does), policy on classes for part-time employees, and why there is "firewood" stacked up in the basement of the

Most of the questions have dealt with finances and facilities, with personnel practices running a close third. Nearly all questions submitted so far have been answered promptly and in a straightforward manner; questions still in the hands of supervisors will probably be returned to ANSWER early next week and in the mail to those of you who sent them

If you would like a question answered, but you don't have one of the bright yellow ANSWER forms, please call ext. 340 and we will send you all you need. By the way, permanent displays containing ample supplies of the forms will start appearing in work areas by the end

Here's a sample of some of the questions and answers received so far:

Q. "Why is the construction and remodeling of the first floor of the administration building at a standstill? When will it be completed? Is the proposed floor plan public infor-


A. "First of all, the remodeling of the first floor of the administration building is not at a standstill. Since the proposals for this area involve several different organizational units, it has been quite time-consuming to arrive at total agreement concerning the overall plans. This process is still underway, though, and we hope to have these issues resolved in the near future. Hopefully, the actual construction can be started sometime this fall with a

"There is no floor plan, really, for the remodeling. There are several feasibility and schematic studies which have been completed, but it would be premature to assume that any of these represent the final design. The design for this project will probably not be made public until after all the directly-affected staff members have had an opportunity to participate

- Q. "What precisely and explicitly are Dr. Schafer's reasons for his statement that not more than one faculty member from a given department shall attend an out-of-state discipline conference. Many conferences are so diverse that a single person could not possibly get to all
- A. "Dr. Schafer never said 'that not more than one faculty member from a given department shall attend an out-of-state discipline conference." I did comment to the dean that, in light of short travel funds, I questioned the practice of sending several members of one department to national meetings. It would seem appropriate to share the limited funds among as many faculty as possible."

- Q. "Why is there all that firewood in the storeroom by the south elevator on the basement of the Center Building?"
- A. "This wood is hardwood that has been cut and dried and will be used by the sculpture class for wood carving. It is stored in the old warehouse on a temporary basis. It will be removed when remodeling takes place in this area."
- Q. "What benefit will LCC receive from the \$200,000 that KVAL gave to OEPBS in our name?"
- A. "Some of the benefits are (1) LCC has first priority on scheduling programs to be transmitted for educational or informational purposes; (2) the mass communication students have the opportunity for working in a 'live' studio for training purposes; (3) the college will be able to schedule time for production in the KVAL facility."
- Q. "Why was the printshop closed down in late August and who made the decision? Thi service has come to be extremely important to the institution; now it's undependable."
- A. "The decision to close the areas of instructional operations, which include all of the areas of the Division of Learning Resources, was made by the dean of instruction. In the future the print shop will remain open and operating unless the total college closes down. We recognize the importance to the institution, and are trying to resolve the existing problems as best we can on a limited budget."
- Q. "Why can full-time employees take classes for free and part-time and half-time employees must pay full tuition costs to take classes?"
- A. "Full-time employees may take classes tuition free. In the case of classified employees they may take more than one class tuition free as long as attendance by the employee does not conflict with regular working hours. If they are employed for half time or more the number of classes that they may take without paying tuition is prorated in terms of the percentage of time that they work.

"If the college specifically requests that a person take a class it may be taken during the regular working schedule of the employee. Faculty employed half time or more may take one class tuition free which again does not conflict with their regular working schedule. The proration of this benefit is, however, subject to minor fluctuations. See Page eight, ARTICLE XII of Fringe Benefits in the 1974-75 Classified Agreement." (A member of the AFT negotiating team says the language of that section has not changed in the new agreement.)

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

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



NO HEPATITIS RISK TO THE REST OF US---Food services director Ken Brownell is confined to his home today with hepatitis, diagnosed Sunday. But, Lane County Health Department epidemiologist Jeannette Bobst said this morning that Ken's illness represents "no risk" to the general LCC community. She said that the college food service operation can continue as usual.


Ken apparently touched uncooked food only once in the contagion period, that on Oct. 8 when he served the LCC Board of Education and a few others. About a dozen people were involved.

Results of a blood test will be available early Tuesday, Ms. Bobst said. That should determine if it's infectious and whether those at the Oct. 8 dinner will need innoculations.

Meanwhile, says Ms. Bobst, everybody should wash hands well after using the bathroom. That, she reminds, is the main protection against contacting the disease.

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HEPATITIS CASE WILL NOT CLOSE CAFETERIA---In case you missed yesterday's special edition of the Daily, and/or you did not see last night's Register-Guard, there is no danger that LCC's food service will be closed because of a case of hepatitis diagnosed Sunday in food service director Ken Brownell. County Health Department Jennette Bobst said that because Ken did not touch raw food (with one exception) during the contagion period his illness represents "no risk" to the general LCC community. The one exception came Oct. 8 when Ken prepared and served a meal to the Board of Education. Results of a blood test will show today whether Ken's hepatitis is viral or serum; should it be viral, the persons who attended the Board dinner (about a dozen) will probably have to be innoculated. Meanwhile, Ken is confined to his home for several weeks. Cards of encouragement can be sent to him at 1450 W. 26th Ave., Eugene, 97405.

ELECTION DATE SET, BOARD SUPPORTS KLCC REQUEST---Lane Community College will seek a levy outside the six percent limitation April 20, which is one of eight dates the state allows school districts to hold elections. In a unanimous vote last night, the Board of Education gave the administration the go-ahead to start developing a budget that the lay budget committee can start dealing with after the first of the year. The budget that will be developed will have capital outlay funds built in , should, as President Schafer suspects, there be no attempt at a serial levy this year. President Schafer told the board that he fails "to sense a great enthusiasm among the Board and staff for a serial levy for long range needs," but, he said, he is not completely discarding the possibility. The college may also go for a change in the tax base, regardless of the results of the levy election, at either the May primary or November general election.

In other business, the Board voted to support KLCC's application to the FCC for a wattage increase (to 10,000 watts), approved five new members of the RSVP advisory committee (John Craig, Richard Freeman, James Larson, Clifford Jones, and Mildred Kubler), and, except for a couple of modifications in the 3000 series, approved the revisions in Board Policy 2000 series (administration) and 3000 series (business and non-instructional operations).

TICKETS GO ON SALE---Tickets for the LCC production of "To Be Young, Gifted and Black" go on sale to the general public Nov. 10, but staff members can get the jump on everyone else by buying tickets any weekday starting Tuesday, Oct. 28. Tickets are \$2.50 each, and all seats are reserved. The play is directed by George Lauris and is the story about black playwright Lorraine Hansberry, who, at 29, won the 1959 New York Drama Critics' Circle Award for Best Play of the Year for "Raisin in the Sun". Performances are scheduled for Nov. 21, 22, 28, 29 and 30.

VETERANS' DAY NOV. 11---While everyone else in the country observes Veterans' Day on the fourth Monday in October, Oregon's public schools and community colleges have to hang around until Nov. 11 before they get the day off. The November date, which is the <u>real</u> Veterans' Day anyway, was selected by the state legislature. Lots of folks, however, will still observe Vets' Day on Oct. 27--like the University of Oregon, for instance.

FIELD HOCKEY SCORE---The LCC field hockey team beat the OSU JVs 2-0 Tuesday, to bring its record to 1 win, two losses and a tie.

FORE STUDY OUT, SUPPORTS COMMUNITY COLLEGES---A two-year study of Oregon's community colleges by the Foundation for Oregon Research and Education (FORE) has been released, and it is highly supportive of the state's 13 two-year colleges. FORE is a privately funded group composed of business and professional leaders from around the state.

among its 40 conclusions, the study recommends:

* avoid or eliminate ranking for community college instructors, i.e. full professorship,

assistant professor, associate professor;

* that local community college boards of education monitor programs and drop courses when enrollments fall below an established minimum, priorities shift, or occupational opportunities diminish;

closer cooperation between community colleges and four-year schools to make credits earned at the two-year schools more freely transferrable within the state system of higher education.

retention of the present funding formula of 50 percent state general fund, 30 percent district property taxes, 20 percent tuition.

Chairman of the study's steering committee Lawrence L. Rennett, who presented the report to superintendent of public instruction Verne Duncan, said that "as the study progressed over the past two years, and particularly as (the committee) visited the 13 campuses, (it) became impressed with the high quality and dedication of these community college administrators and their staffs." He said the committee was also impressed "with the diversity of the 13 colleges and of the importance of keeping the fine line between independence and state leadership which seems so eminently successful." FORE recommended the present decentralized form of governance for the community college system be continued, giving the schools local autonomy within broad state policies under the direction of a local board.





LCC STUDENTS QUESTION "FREEDOM TRAIN" ADMISSION---Apparently a few LCC students have protested the \$2 admission charge to the traveling Freedom Train, and, according to a Springfield official, may attempt to disrupt the train's visit to the city next month. City Manager Thomas Cochran phoned the college yesterday to say that some LCC students had protested the admission charge and apparently planned to make their feelings known in public when the train stops in Springfield Nov. 19-22. It will be located between Second and Third Streets, south of Centennial.

Cochran did not know the students, or whether they represented an organized group. He said they were under the impression that the Freedom Train, which is a traveling museum containing about 500 artifacts, is tax-supported, and therefore should be open to the public free of charge. Cochran, and later a local Freedom Train committee member, said he wished to let the students and anyone else concerned about the issue know that the train is not tax-supported, but is financed by a private, non-profit foundation called the American Freedom Train Foundation. Local committee member Bill Ford said that most of the train's \$17.5 million budget comes from grants and from admission fees. The fees are \$2 for persons aged 10-64, \$1 for persons 3-12 and over 65, and free to toddlers.

The train is currently on a 17,000 mile trip around the country displaying several hundred items from America's past and present. Included in the exhibits, which are viewed while standing on a moving floor that rolls along at 1/6 walking speed, are JFK's rocking chair, an old fire wagon, and even Kareem Abdul Jabar's tennis shoes. Anyone--students or staff--who would like to know more about the train and/or its policies, can call Ford at KUGN during working hours. Any group wishing to know more about the train can also call Ford, who can arrange for a speaker from the local committee to address your organization at its next meeting.


