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Lane CC runners claim Region 18

LEBANON — Lane Community College captured the Region 18 Community College Cross Country Championships for the fifth straight year Saturday, placing its five scorers within 48 seconds of each other.

Al Tarpenning, who was selected coach of the year by the Oregon community colleges association after the meet, has directed the Titans to six region titles in eight years.

John Miller placed third in the individual standings in leading LCC, which won with 39 points to 55 for Clackamas College. Also scoring were Bill Sharp in fifth, Dave Martin in seventh, Glenn Owen in tenth and Mike McGriff in fourteenth.

Gary Schroeder of Central Oregon Community College successfully defended his individual crown with a 26:14 clocking over the five-mile

course. Tim Leque, also of COCC, was timed in 26:23 in second place, eight seconds ahead of Miller.

Clackamas and third place Northern Idaho joined Lane as qualifying teams for the national championships next Saturday at Rochester, Minn.

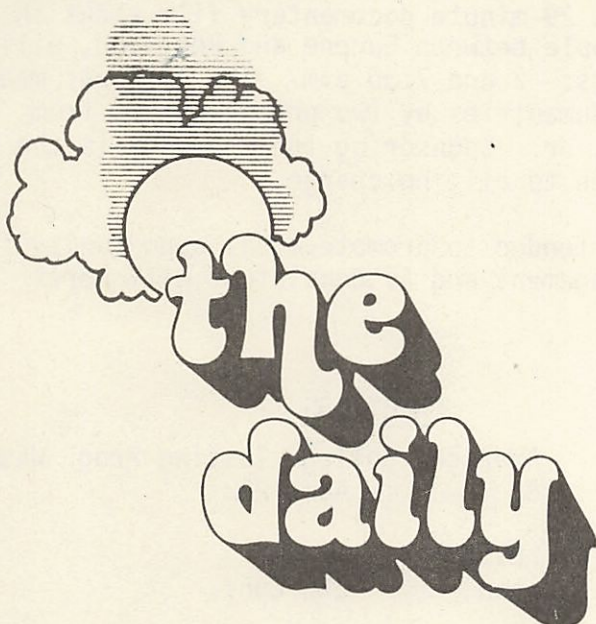

MORE AFFIRMATIVE ACTION EMPHASIS---The Board of Education last night directed the Administration to take immediate action in two areas: 1) campuswide indoctrination of staff regarding affirmative action and equal opportunity, and 2) awareness training for staff and students. Equal Opportunity Advisor Jonathan West reported that there are about 87 minority students enrolled--more than ever before--but that the number of minority staff has fallen. The Administration is to continue to work toward turning around the affirmative action climate at LCC.

In other business, the Board directed the Administration to contact Eugene School District 4J people about possible LCC use of one of their surplus elementary school buildings. President Schafer said that such an arrangement could provide more space for community education classes, eliminate the need for more construction on campus, and get classes closer to residential areas.

Dean Gerry Rasmussen reported that use of the Forum Building for large classes is contingent on solving acoustical problems.

IDEAS SOUGHT---\$4,000 is available from the LCC Development Fund to finance instructional improvements. Up to \$1,000 can be used for any one project. Submit idea papers to Lyle Swetland by Dec. 5. Proposals will be evaluated by a subcommittee of the trustees and awards announced by the new year.

DUES HIKED---The Classified Employees Federation voted overwhelmingly to raise dues from \$5 to \$10 for each month of employment. (In other words, those not working in the summer don't have to pay dues in those months.) Evelyn Tennis reports that contact is being made with state and national union offices to find out if part-time employees can be allowed to pay prorated dues. 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MORE STATE CONTROL PREDICTED---One of education's strongest advocates in the Legislature predicts that the fortunes of community colleges will rise and fall with the size of the 18-24-year-old population. And that may decline 15 percent after 1980, State Senator Ed Fadeley told the Steering Committee for Long-Range Planning last night. Adult Education, which some expect to take up part of the slack, is not what the Legislature perceives it should spend its money on, he said. He foresees no Legislative reduction of enrollment at four-year schools (which could shift students to community colleges). He expects to see more state questioning of local decisions, and power of the purse used to support some programs over others.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?---The State Department of Education published a community college student follow-up study recently concerning the classes of 1974. Major findings:

- Fifty-six percent of the graduates responding to the survey are employed, 37% are students, and 5% are looking for work.
- Nearly nine out of ten graduates responding to the survey believe that their community colleges prepared them well for their present occupations or courses of study.
- More than three out of four graduates found their instructors to be well-qualified, knowledgeable, available and helpful.
- More than half of the graduates used counseling services at their community colleges. Three out of four who did find counselors helpful.
- Of the graduates who are working full-time, 17% are earning less than \$450/month, 26% are earning between \$450 and \$599/month, 36% are earning between \$600 and \$899/month and 21% are earning over \$900/month.
- Male respondents were five times more likely to report monthly earnings of \$900 or more than women. Women respondents were three times more likely to report monthly earnings of less than \$450 than men.
- Nearly two thirds of the graduates have remained within 50 miles of their residences as students.

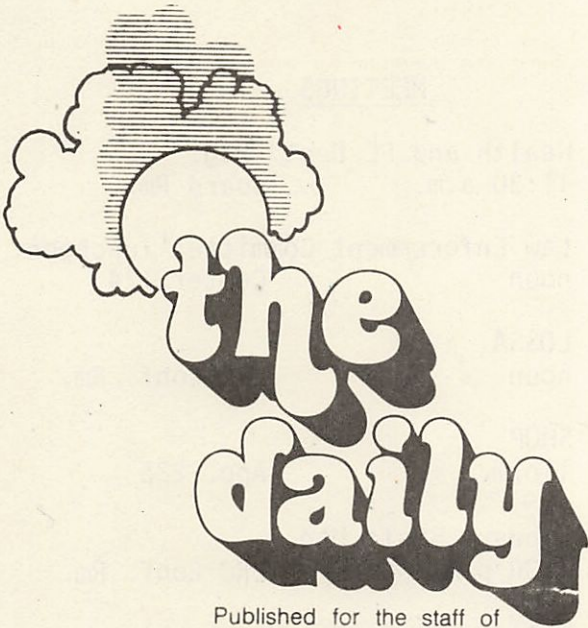

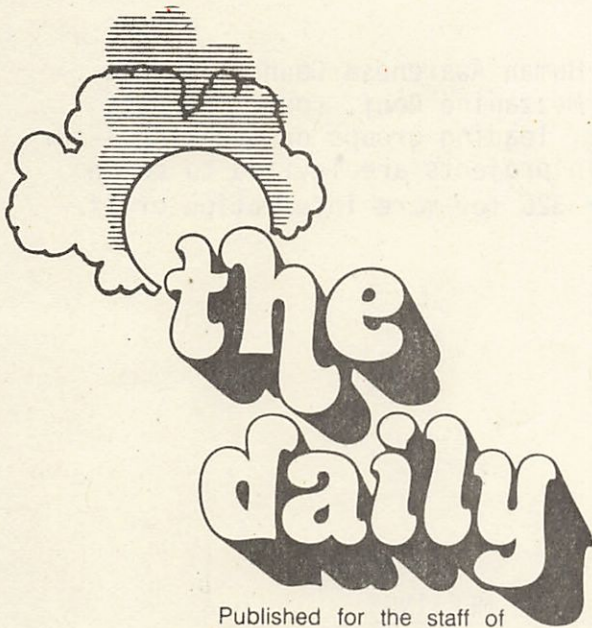

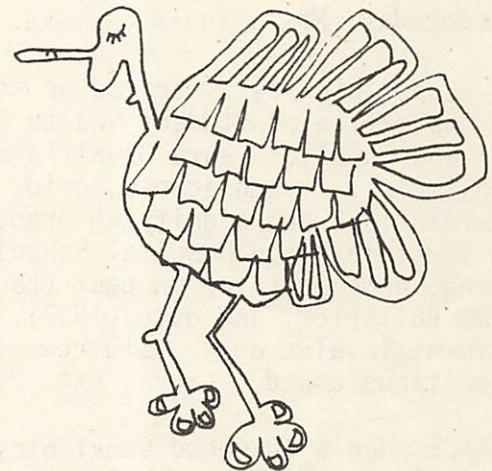
