IT WAS A GOOD TERM FOR A's--A total of 2,120 students have been named to the fall term honor roll at LCC. Of the total, 1,112 are on the President's List (3.5 or better) and 1,008 are on the Dean's List (3.0 to 3.49). And 365 students earned perfect 4.0 gpa's.

ENROLLMENT--It appears that LCC will enroll about 13,000 individuals winter term. Registrar Bob Marshall says that 5,800 had enrolled in credit programs as of last Friday and 700 more are expected to register today and tomorrow. The total should reach 6,500 to 7,000 by the time outreach centers and other registration is completed. Non-credit, adult education registration is expected to involve about 6,000 individuals. The total will be slightly below fall term and this is the usual yearly pattern.

TUITION AND THE BOARD--Discussion of a tuition increase highlighted the Board of Education meeting Wednesday night, but a decision was postponed until a later meeting. Dean of Students Jack Carter recommended the increase to maintain tuition revenue at 20 per cent of the operating budget. Carter recommended that the number of hours for a full-time student be increased from 10 to 12 and that an increase of \$26 (from \$100 to \$126) be approved. He also recommended that the rate be increased from \$10 to \$10.50 per credit hour for part-time students, and increases for out-of-district and out-of-state students be made accordingly. Student Body President Len Wassom told the board that the student senate opposes such an increase, and two representatives of the Veteran's Club also indicated their opposition. They suggested administrative salaries be frozen rather than having a raise in tuition. A decision on tuition is expected at the Jan. 28 board meeting.

In other business, about 20 women walked out early in the meeting when they were informed further discussion of the women's program issue was not on the agenda for the meeting.

OFFICIAL OPENING--The Women's Awareness Center will officially open on Jan. 21 and 22 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days. Scheduled for Wednesday, is a speech by Norma Paulus, candidate for Secretary of State in Oregon, a poetry reading, and Planned Parenthood workshop. On Thursday, the schedule includes conversations with Susan Gilmore of the University of Oregon, music jam session, and a seminar on Women as Heads of Household, led by Edna Jensen. Everyone is invited to drop in.

NURSING LOTTERY--Applicants are coming forth willingly for the lottery for selection to the nursing programs. Some 80 students in the Associate Degree of Nursing program and 30 students in the Practical Nursing program, and alternates in both programs, will be selected by the lottery method. The drawing is scheduled for April 30. Minimum requirements must be met before a name may be submitted to the lottery and applicants may be allotted additional chances in the lottery if he or she has completed required pre-nursing course work, and has previous patient care experience. Only applicants meeting in-district requirements will be entered into the bowl for selection. Applications will be accepted prior to the March 31 deadline. Estelle Singleton, department chairwoman, indicated applicants seem to be receptive to the lottery system and prefer the drawing because it is more objective than the interview system used previously.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY--Do you know that if you ask a job applicant a wrong question, you may be asking for a lawsuit by the Equal Opportunity Commission? Questions of race, sex, religion, age or national origin are, of course, illegal -unless they are related to what EEOC calls a "bona fide occupational qualification" (BFOQ). But though most administrators would never ask an applicant his religion, they might well ask if he (or more likely she) is married, has children, or owns a home. And such questions, though more subtle than "Are you a Christian?" are still discriminatory, according to EEOC. To keep managers out of such trouble, a California company has come up with this short table of do's and don'ts for job interviews.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION WORKSHOP OKAYED--The Board of Education officially approved cancellation of classes Feb. 6 for staff participation in the Affirmative Action Workshop. The move clears the way for the day long series of discussions, panels and speakers scheduled by the LCCEA, LCCEF, Faculty Council, and Human Awareness Council. Organizers of the Workshop say LCC is the first educational institution to bring together the entire staff to study the issue of Affirmative Action. Its purpose is to help the staff understand the term's meaning and implementation.

Board members also agreed to defer action on a proposed tuition increase to allow exploration of several other alternatives. One alternative presented by board member Jim Martin was the establishment of a parking fee. Staff will investigate that proposal, as well as others, prior to the Feb. 11 meeting.

Board members also heard a preview of the 1976-77 budget which would call for an estimated levy of \$2.6 million outside the six per cent limitation. The tax rate on that amount would be \$1.77 per \$1,000 true cash value of assessed valuation. The current rate is \$1.61. Those figures remain estimates.
