AFFIRMATIVE ACTION UPDATE---The following memo from Personnel further explains who must attend the Affirmative Action Workshop: The February 6 Affirmative Action Workshop has been given official sanction by the Board and attendance should be of value for all employes.

"Since some campus functions cannot be left totally without coverage, some employes may have to remain on the job. It is the responsibility of the supervisor to determine which of the positions in his/her organization must be staffed and to make appropriate arrangements for necessary coverage.

"Accordingly, supervisors are to submit to their deans a listing of all employes (name and position) being required to remain at their work stations by 4 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 4.

"The Dean of a respective area bears the ultimate responsibility to resolve scheduling difficulties or discretionary decisions on attendance.

"Part time employes regularly scheduled to work a portion of Feb. 6, will be compensated for that time but should, subject to the comments above on required staffing, be allowed to attend the workshop. Irregular employes paid for intermittent service will not be compensated for attendance at the workshop but should be extended the opportunity to attend.

"Departments with second and third shift employes may modify schedules to facilitate attendance at the workshop and the discretion of the supervisor."

BUDGET COMMITTEE TO MEET---The LCC Budget Committee will meet at 8 p.m. tonight following a short Board of Education meeting (7 p.m.). During the budget meeting, President Schafer will present the budget message and budget document, the seven board members and seven lay members making up the budget committee will review the budget development process, and a time will be available for remarks from both the committee members and the audience. At present, it appears the committee will be considering a \$14,791,609 operating budget (as compared with \$11,797,544 this year). The tax rate on the proposed budget is estimated at \$1.77, a 9.94 per cent increase from the \$1.61 per \$1,000 true cash value this year.

BOARD AND BUDGET COMMITTEE WRAP-UP---At last night's meeting, the LCC Board of Education approved a resolution to acquire a surplus aircraft from the state of Kansas for use in the Flight Technology program. Also approved was a request for transfer of matching funds out of contingency for supplemental student federal work study funds. In other action the Board approved revision of the 6000 series of Board Policy (Instruction) which leaves only one series to be revised (8000 series/College-Community Relations).

The budget committee met last night for the first time and was presented with the 1976-77 budget document. In his message to the budget committee, President Schafer termed the budget a "realistic expression" of the fiscal needs at LCC. The proposed budget calls for \$2,604,073 outside the six percent limitation. The cost to the voter would be an estimated \$1.77 per \$1,000 true cash value (TCV). This year's tax rate is \$1.61 per TCV.

The next budget committee meeting will be Feb. 11. The budget committee includes seven lay members as well as the seven board members.

WHY?---At the request of the Affirmative Action Committee, Ted Romoser has drafted the following statement for insertion in today's Daily: Did you know that our staff organizations may be sued if we agree to a collective bargaining contract that turns out to be discriminatory in any way? Did you know that the State Department of Education is about to develop policies on affirmative action for every community college? Did you know that LCC must undergo an evaluation this year of every aspect of our program from hiring to textbooks? These policies will affect all of us, not just those who hire. Your bargaining agent must have an informed membership in order to work constructively on college policies.

Is it "indoctrination? No, no, no! This workshop is not an attempt to change anyone's opinion or beliefs. The basic purpose is for us to share our ideas and decide what we as a staff think about affirmative action and what we want the college to do or not do. The speeches and panels will provide facts and calm explanations for us to use. No one intends to push ideas down our throats.

BOARD AND BUDGET MEETING--A proposed increase in tuition and the Special Programs Activity Fund fee will again be considered by the LCC Board of Education during its meeting at 7 o'clock tonight in the Board room. The Board is expected to act on a proposal that would raise tuition to \$10.50 per credit hour with 12 hours considered a full time student. The proposed tuition increase is expected to keep student support at about a 20 per cent level of the total cost of operation. Tuition has not increased at LCC since Fall, 1974.

Another item on the agenda is a request for Board endorsement of the concept of Centrex telephone service. While installation of Centrex would improve the ability to reach extensions both on and off the campus, it would be December,1978 (at the earliest) before the change over could be completed.

Following the Board meeting, the seven lay members will join the Board at 8 p.m. for a Budget Committee meeting. The group is studying the proposed \$14 million operating budget.

Carol Metzler, R.N., from Health Services, initiated cardiac massage on her arrival. Security directed the ambulance to the proper location. Three attempts were made by ambulance personnel to get his heart action re-established. Meanwhile, students in the class remained calm, loaned their coats to keep him warm, and kept out of the way. At 9 a.m. Carol Metzler accompanied the patient in the ambulance to Sacred Heart Hospital and remained for a half-hour administering cardiac massage during this time, while others maintained his breathing and got monitors connected, etc. Donald was pronounced dead about 1 p.m. at Sacred Heart. Autopsy reports are not yet complete."

The tuition question was the only item considered in the meeting which was attended by about 75 people -- mostly students opposed to the increase. Following the Board meeting the budget committee convened to continue deliberations on the proposed \$14.7 million operating budget.

Goldmark Develops High-Speed System Of TV Transmission

Device Permits Reception From Broadcast or Cable On Home Set, Fast Storage

STAMFORD, Conn. -Goldmark Communications Corp. said it developed a new system for the transmission of television images and sound at speeds considerably in excess of those at which normal images and sound are sent.

The images and sound would be sent by means of regular "over-the-air" broadcasting facilities by satellite or by cable television for storage and playback over ordinary television sets in the home or at school. The technique was developed by Goldmark Communication's founder and president, Peter C. Goldmark, the man who developed the long-playing phonograph record and the first practical color television system. The latter two developments came about while Mr. Goldmark was director of research for CBS Inc. and head of CBS Laboratories. The images and sound sent by means of the new Rapid Transmission and Storage system can be picked up on a regular television set by means of an RTS recording attachment costing approximately \$300. The images and sound could be sent at night, recorded and stored for later use in the home or the classroom.

Six Colleges Slate Use

Goldmark Communications also announced that six community colleges would introduce the first-generation RTS system, Mark I, for teaching purposes this fall. The six colleges, with a total enrollment of more than 200,000 students, are Central Piedmont Junior College District of Charlotte, N.C.; Chicago City Colleges; The Coast Community College District of Costa Mesa, Calif.; the College of DuPage, Ill.; Lane Community College District of Eugene, Ore., and Metropolitan Community Colleges of Kansas City.

The Mark I system can provide 60 different half-hour programs in the sound and picture format from a single hour-long video cassette. Up to 30 of these programs can be selected from the single tape and shown simultaneously on as many sets for multiple classroom instruction. The first three of the initial group of courses already are in preparation, the company said. They deal with health sciences, consumer education and introduction to business. Each course will consist of 30 different modules or lessons of about 30 minutes' duration. "New Dimension" in Educational TV

The lessons sent by means by the new technique can be erased from the tape used to record them and the tape can be reused as often as desired to record still other lessons. The user can view the lessons he chooses on any standard color television set at any time he wishes. He also can repeat all or parts of a lesson. Mr. Goldmark said he expected the Mark I and a second-generation system, called Mark II, to add "a new dimension" to the educational television broadcast system.

"This network has access to more than three-quarters of the population," he said, "but it is underutilized during nonbroadcast hours at night-time. The RTS system will enable public broadcasting stations across the country to utilize fully these nonbroadcast hours to fulfill an important aspect of their charter..."

The transmission speed of the Mark II system will make it possible during a single eight-hour period to broadcast 2,800 different half-hour lessons.
