

About a sixth of Lane Community College's 1976-77 operating budget would be met through the proposed property tax levy being placed before voters at the April 20 election.

Exact dollar figures won't be known until March 10 when the College Budget Committee completes its job of reviewing the Administration's total budget proposal for next year. Then the Board of Education will set the exact amount to go before voters.

A typical year's budget is made up of 46 percent state and federal monies, 20 percent tuition and fees, and 34 percent property taxes. Bond repayment and the tax base, approved by voters previously, make up most of the latter. That leaves about a sixth of the total operating budget subject to annual voting.

The Budget Committee is composed of the 7 elected Board of Education members and 7 citizen volunteers appointed by them. The Committee began its work in January with an Administration request that a \$2.6 million levy be placed before voters.

The budget request accommodates a number of needs:

- * It opens the door to a limited number of additional students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) student enrollment would increase 4.5 percent, from 7,314 this year to 7,633.
- * It provides for modest expansion in technical-vocational programs. Long waiting lists of students are seeking admission to such programs as auto mechanics, nursing, welding and machine shop.
- * Some additional support is allocated to remedial programs. More than a third of students in credit programs in any year need help in mastering such basic skills as reading, writing and mathematics. These skills are mandatory for success in both tech-voc and college parallel areas.

* Some \$400,000 is provided for the purchase of such items as tech-voc teaching equipment. This is the same amount as last year. Students need hands-on experience with equipment of the type they'll use when employed.

* It provides for inflation-caused cuts in purchasing power. An 11 percent increase is applied toward this year's expected 9 percent loss, plus 2 percent toward

prior years' losses.

* It takes into account possible reduced federal funding. Some 42 employees are now paid through the federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA). That money runs out July 1 unless Congress acts to extend the program.

* It meets requirements of collective bargaining contracts. Labor contracts hold the College to increases in faculty and classified salaries based on the Portland Consumer Price Index (CPI). We have an inescapable cost increase for salaries of at least 6.3 percent built into

the budget.

* It provides that students pay their fair share of increased costs. The Board of Education last month raised tuition in accord with its policy that students should pay approximately 20 percent of the cost of the College's operating budget. That increase, the first in two years, is less than the sum of the inflation of 12 percent two years ago, 11.3 percent last year, and 7.6 percent this year.

* It holds spending within the ability of the community to support LCC. The region seems headed out of the recession; there is reason to be optimistic about im-

provements in the economy.

* It takes into account a Board of Education directive to accelerate staff productivity at all levels. Credit class size is being increased this year at least 9 percent, staff development funds are being channeled into projects that specificially improve efficiency, development of courses that accommodate additional students without cost increases is being expedited, and rapid refinement of fiscal control procedures is underway.

BUDGET COMMITTEE RESULTS--LCC's Budget Committee is looking at the possibility of holding the college's property tax rate for next year at or below this year's \$1.61 level. It means cutting a half million to a million dollars out of the Administration's proposed \$14.7 million operating budget for next year. The Budget Committee Wednesday night told the staff to come up with ways to make the cuts and to have them ready by next Wednesday night, when the Committee is supposed to wind up its review. Potential cuts could come in materials and services, proposed new staff positions, and maybe in jobs funded this year by CETA.

BUDGET RATE TO GO DOWN--The LCC Budget Committee cut over \$500,000 from the proposed 1976-77 budget last night before sending it to the Board of Education for approval. The Board approved the \$14.3 million proposed budget which will go to the voters April 20. LCC district residents will vote on the levy of \$1.9 million outside the six per cent limitation. While the proposed levy is up from the amount of \$1.5 million this year, the tax rate is expected to drop to \$1.50 per \$1.000 true cash value of assessed valuation from the current rate of \$1.61 -- an 11 cent decrease. The cuts in the proposed budget came in the areas of expected inflation and accompanying payroll fixed costs, and the contingency fund.

BOARD ACTIONS--In addition to approving a budget levy, the Board last night asked the administration to investigate the possibility of hiring an independent consultant to evaluate LCC's telephone system.

And, as a result of other action, letters of intent to rehire will be delivered to department chairpersons for distribution to all contracted faculty. Undelivered letters will be sent by certified mail.


PREPARATION FOR APRIL 20 ELECTION

Informational activities are being focused in the main on 22 historically supportive precincts (up from 14 last year). A mailer to go to 20,000 voters is at the printer. Telephone numbers are being readied for a get-out-the-vote calling effort on election day. A folder of facts about the College is at the printer and should be ready for distribution in a week to such groups as the U of O faculty and county school district teachers. Pledges of assistance in such work as telephoning have been received from both campus unions. Voter registration on campus is underway.

Some media exposure is planned. Two releases have been sent; a third will go out in mid-April. The President has met with the media and will participate in a half-hour KVAL program next week. Editorial support will be solicited. The Spring Term Schedule of Classes had a page devoted to budget needs.

Regular year-round activities on behalf of public understanding continue. These include the President's monthly letter to friends and opinion leaders, a continuing series of coffee hours for adults with the President, Bunch for Lunch, campus tours for adults and prospective students, staff presentations in the community, representation at chambers of commerce and other groups, and related activities.

The philosophy behind this work is that of Phillip Piele of the U of O and John Hall of Arizona State U. Their research, much of it done in Eugene, suggests that major campaigning tends to polarize public opinion and bring out negative voters. They suggest that thin resources be spent on identifying friends and encouraging their support. This was the approach used last year at the June 17 election.

BOARD OF EDUCATION--In an hour and one-half meeting last night, the Board of Education agreed to continue exploration of an energy management system which includes the installation of storage tanks, piping, controls, and a converter to utilize condenser waste heat. The Board agreed to further explore such an energy conservation system and any future alternatives to save fuel. President Schafer suggested that numerous avenues for funding such a program be investigated before the Board take any final action.

Also during the meeting the Board approved expenditure of \$5,000 to finish development of plans to remodel the Center Building to house the Student Health Services. Moving SHS to the Center Building would allow better access for ambulances and also create more space for Nursing, Paradental and Home Economics in the Health Building.






