DARK DAY IN MUDVILLE--Voters voted down 9 of 10 school district proposals yesterday, including Lane Community College's. Only McKenzie School District passed its budget proposal. LCC's total was 8,242 yes votes to 15,008 no votes, about 35 percent yes to 65 percent no. Only about 18 percent of the registered voters cast ballots in the election.

In races for Board seats, incumbent Stephen Reid won over Frank M. Long in Zone 4. Reid had 8,530 votes to Long's 7,953. Edward Cooper of Veneta, superintendent of the Crow-Applegate School District, will replace retiring Dr. Al Brauer. Cooper had 8,620 votes to his opponent Charles Nugent's 8,518.

LCC's Jonathan West was re-elected to his seat on the Eugene School District Board in the election.

The LCC Board of Education will meet May 5 to set the date of the next budget election. It is expected the Board will choose to go with June 29, the date of the District 4J budget election.

P.S. LCC staff, friends and some students called over 7,000 voters yesterday afternoon to remind them to vote. It was a noble effort.

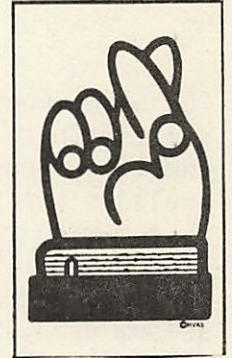

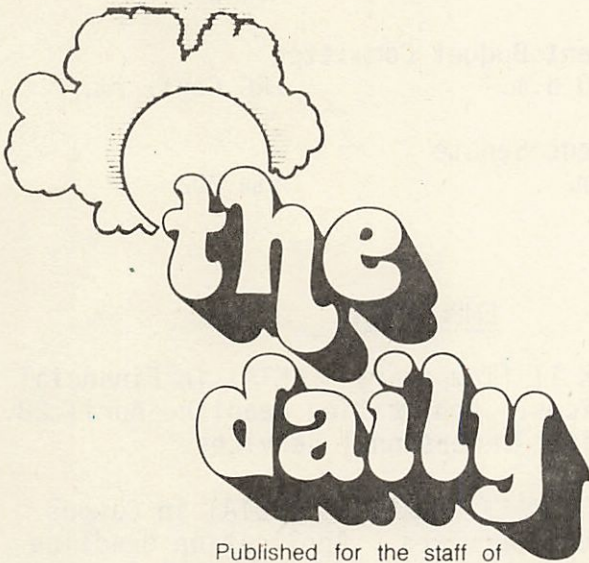

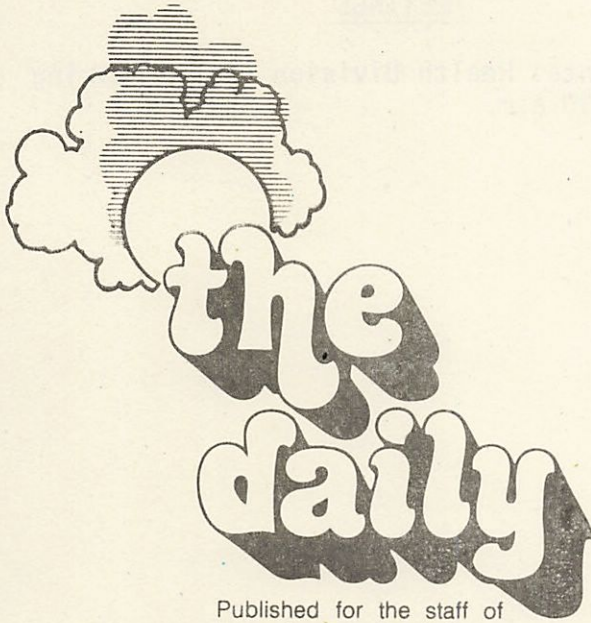

EXCESS PROPERTY PROGRAM--When something is purchased by any government agency and is no longer needed (because the program is discontinued or no longer in operation--such as NASA), it then becomes available to other federal agencies after the Department of Defense and Civil Defense get a chance at utilizing it. The program is called the Excess Property Program.

Howard Bird, Specialist in the Office of Academic and College Planning, has managed to get over \$200,000 worth of such excess property for use at LCC in the past three months at only the cost of transporting the material to the College. LCC is eligible through the Northwest Regional Commission of the Department of Commerce to participate in the program. The excess property is available to LCC on the condition that it is put to use immediately and that it is used for instructional purposes or to provide jobs for students. Bird has managed to get a \$49,000 40-ft. trailer with self-contained hydraulic laboratory, linseed oil for student painters, bolts of cloth for the Home Ec Dept., furniture for Performing Arts, among other items. After two years, the excess items become the property of LCC, providing they meet the proper usage requirements as determined by the federal inspector.

While the program is about two-years-old, the State of Oregon has made use of only about \$55,000 of excess property to date (about a fourth of what LCC has found use for in the past couple of months). Washington and Idaho, on the other hand, have found uses for millions of dollars of the excess property in the past couple of years.

The process is one that helps to cut down on capital expenditures and thus lower local costs for LCC, yet provide adequate learning materials and equipment for students. And LCC is a pioneer in the state in utilizing what has turned into a gold mine.
