

BOARD OF EDUCATION--A new tax base will go to the voters in November, F's are back on the transcript, and manatory student body fees are out as a result of action by the LCC Board of Education last Wednesday. The tax base election will be November 2 following the tax levy election September 21. If approved the tax base would go into effect for the 1977-78 school year and would result in about the same tax rate as experienced this year. The board also agreed to record F's on student transcripts. The procedure has not been used for the past three years. And Board members voted to eliminate mandatory student body fees but agreed to support a voluntary student fee. Several support services for student government will be continued this year --including a part-time secretary -- while the change from mandatory to voluntary is made.





THEY ARE HERE--Over a week past the expected arrival date, and with many stories to tell of the 1,000-mile journey, two trucks carrying two huge steel tanks arrived at LCC yesterday from Chatsworth, Calif. The two tanks, which were once a part of the space program of Rockwell International in suburban Los Angeles, will be used to hold more than 100,000 gallons of water at LCC as part of the College's energy management system. The tanks, weighing 50 tons each, reaching 13 feet one inch high and 65 feet long and 12 feet six inches wide, are parked in the east lot awaiting placement near the Mechanics Building. After installation this term, engineers estimate \$107,000 will be saved yearly on the College's electric bill, a reduction of nearly 40 per cent.

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



#### \* SWINE FLU \*

- \*\*\*\*\* In cooperation with Lane County Health Dept., LCC Student . Health Service will offer monovalent swine flu vaccine to individuals over 17 years of age. The vaccine is not expected to be available in Lane County until after mid-October.
- \*\*\*\*\* Tentative plans call for the first public clinics in Lane County to be held specifically for high-risk individuals (those 65 years of age or over and those with chronic illnesses). These clinics will be followed by ones for the general public.
- \*\*\*\*\* All vaccine for public clinics is being provided by the federal government. operating funds are provided however. So, to help offset costs, a \$1.00 donation will be asked, a policy adopted statewide.
- \*\*\*\*\* We will inform you as soon as we know of a possible date for the swine flu vaccine to be offered here at LCC.
- \*\*\*\*\*\* Information from the Public Health Service Advisory Committee on immunization practice states: "Results of field trials provide clear evidence that adults can effectively and safely be immunized against A/New Jersey influenza with a single dose of monovalent vaccine. Bivalent vaccine containing A/New Jersey and A/Victoria vaccine will be available to the high-risk group."

\*\*\*\*\* Infants of smoking parents are more susceptible to respiratory infection, according to an English study of pneumonia and bronchitis in 2,200 babies in their first year of life. The researchers found the incidence of these diseases in children one year old or less to be 7.8% if neither parent smoked, 11.4% if one parent smoked, and 17.6% if both parents smoked. There was no consistent relationship between parental smoking and respiratory disease in children over one year of age. The researchers concluded that giving up smoking may be one of the very few ways parents could expect to lower the chances of their children developing respiratory diseases in early childhood.



WE WON--A happy Board of Education accepted the canvass of votes last night for Tuesday's election and approved a resolution levying \$5.2 million in property taxes toward this year's budget. The final tally was 18,029 for the good guys and 15,367 for the other side. Margin of victory was 2,662 or 54 per cent yes. The turnout was 23 per cent, which was 3 per cent more than June 29. The College won 86 precincts, compared to 48 on June 29. All but 5 Eugene precincts favored the levy. The historic voting pattern continued: high support in Eugene and parts of Springfield and low support in most of the outlying areas. LCC Advocates Chairwoman Mildred Holly was presented a plaque by the Board for "meritorious volunteer service."

In other business, the Board heard Dean of Students Jack Carter predict that Fall Term enrollment could be up 500 to 600 students over last year in credit programs. Headcount may reach 7,000 by the end of the week. New staff representatives were seated: Pat John for the faculty union and Jim Bacon for faculty council. A new Board policy banning possession of dangerous weapons on campus received a first reading.

John Elliott's resignation as Mass Communication chairman was accepted. Contracts were approved for Anne Stewart as women's program coordinator, Carl Horstrup as an adult education coordinator, Horace Pendergrass as food service supervisor, Barbara Harmon as veterans affairs coordinator, Donald Micken as electronics instructor, and Nancy Jolley as a management secretary in Personnel Services.

ONE WASN'T AS LUCKY--Multnomah County voters rejected for the fourth time yesterday Mt. Hood Community College's operating levy. The vote was 55 per cent no.

HUMOROUS APPROACH--The University of Southern California is experimenting with a program known as the Quality Teaching Effectiveness Program. Essentially, the fancy title means that instead of conducting conventional lectures, instructors have been urged to spice up lessons with jokes -- to turn them into something resembling comedy routines. College officials say that in classes where the course material was infused with humor and dramatic techniques, students did better than those where such methods were not used. It is too bad the USC's football team doesn't try the humorous approach; Oregon could have used a few laughs.
