



NEW SCHOOL BUS IAW - State School Supt. Verne Duncan reminds that vehicles on both sides of a road are now required to stop when a school bus stops to load or unload children. "Flashing amber," he says, "means the bus is about to stop and motorists should get ready to stop too. Flashing red means the bus has stopped and motorists must stop and remain stopped until the flashing red lights are turned off." The only exception to the rule is if motorists are on a divided highway with two roads actually separated by a median strip or barrier. Then they must stop only if they are on the same road as the school bus.

#### \*\* LOUSY! \*\*

The U.S. Public Health Service reports head, body and pubic lice infestation in the U.S. is on the rise. Long hair and closer physical contact are main reasons why infestation is on the rise.

Simple treatments, used carefully according to directions and good personal hygiene, can control the itchy menace.

#### \*\* PAIN \*\*

"Pain is all in the mind," hard-bitten drill instructors will exhort their tired, aching troops. And according to many scientists, they may be right. The discovery of a morphine-like chemical, enkephalin, produced in the brain, may be the first step in finding a natural way of controlling pain.

In 1973, researchers at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine recognized that opiates (pain-suppressing medications derived from plants) attached themselves to receptor cells in the medial brain stem. They surmised that the brain itself must produce a structurally similar chemical. That substance, enkephalin, was finally isolated and purified in December 1975 by a Scottish research team led by Dr. John Hughes. Earlier this year Wyeth Laboratories synthetically produced and used enkephalin which they used to kill pain in rats. Now, says psychologist John C. Liebeskind of the University of California at Los Angeles, it seems hopeful that a non-invasive, non-addictive means to control pain in humans will be found. (Family Health, August 1976).

#### \*\* 200 YEARS AGO... \*\*

Rev. Samuel Danforth of Roxsbury, Mass., in describing an outbreak of the bloody flux, wrote, "It was a very sickly time, many being visited with gripings, vomiting and flux, with a fever which proved fatal to many infants and little children especially, but also to some grown persons." Noting that this outbreak might be a mixed blessing, a colonist stated that "British soldiers were (more) liable to the bloody flux and fever and some died of it." (Bulletin, Oregon State Health Division, August 1976).

#### \*\* VITAMIN C ABUSE \*\*

University of Minnesota dieticians have concluded research which indicates people who overmedicate themselves with Vitamin C are flirting with high blood pressure and renal calculi (kidney stones), not to mention insomnia.

IN CASE YOU ARE ASKED--We had a call yesterday from a woman who was studying her voter's pamphlet and wondered why, if LCC's total budget was \$14 million, would increasing the tax base to \$4.9 million be of any help to the College? We explained that, while \$14 million was the total operating budget, local property taxes, as established by the tax base and tax levies, account for only 32 percent of LCC's funding. Other sources of income for the \$14 million operating budget include state funds (41 percent), tuition (22 percent), and miscellaneous sources (5 percent). So the new tax base would help. The College would be able to operate without a tax levy election for two or more years.

STRONG STUDENTS--Howard Bird, who procures federal excess property for LCC, arranged for Treasure Valley Community College to get an excess forklift. The machine, which weighs 8,000 pounds, was delivered to the school, and Howard asked how they planned to unload it. They said they would just get a couple of work study students to lift if off. They must grow them big at Treasure Valley.

# Make a deal

The board of Lane Community College decided two months ago to reserve a niche on the November ballot for a tax base proposal. These measures can be voted on only in general or primary elections.

In essence, the college is offering to make a deal: If the voters will approve a new tax base, the college will spare them from annual "budget" elections for at least the next two years, and very likely three. It's a fair and reasonable proposition. Neither party can lose.

What's a tax base? Simply put, it is the amount of tax any unit of local government can levy without approval of the voters. LCC got its first tax base, \$1.5 million, in 1968. Voters approved a new tax base of \$2.6 million in November, 1972.

Having grown 6 per cent a year since that last revision, the tax base is currently \$3.1 million. But the college's actual levy for operating purposes this year is \$4.5 million. The difference had to be approved recently in a budget election.


The college is proposing a new tax base of \$4.96 million, which would be 9.3 per cent above the current year's actual levy. In other words, if the new base is approved, the college will be able to levy 9.3 per cent more next year without holding a budget election. From then on the base could increase six per cent a year without a vote.

The proposed base might last longer than the two or three years the college expects. The college might be overestimating its enrollment (it projects seven per cent annual growth) or future inflation (it anticipates an eight per cent annual rate).

If that turns out to be the case, great. More than likely, though, the need for tax funds will begin to exceed the tax base again by at least 1980-81. Then LCC will either have to go back to annual budget elections (requests to "exceed the six per cent limitation") or propose another new tax base.

It makes good sense to update tax bases. Lane Community College is not in as bad shape in this respect as many public school districts, of course. Their tax bases are so out of date that they bear no resemblance to realistic current tax requirements.

But then, there is no sane reason to want the college to slide into the same position as the school districts. The way to avoid that is to vote "yes" on the new tax base.







YOU & THE LCC EMERGENCY CARE TEAM--Too often we wait until something tragic happens before preparing to deal with it. Every year, thousands of people die from accidents or illnesses while observers do nothing in their support. Some helpful measures are very simple: the 'hug of life' for a cafe coronary, 'mouth-to-mouth' resuscitation for cessation of breathing, 'cardiac massage' to start a heart action. There are a number of reasons why no one responds-almost all fall under the categories of ignorance, half truth, or resistance for fear of legal consequences resulting from the act. None of these should prevent one from being aware of first aid and other emergency measures needed in time of illness and accidents.

Remember, a person can bleed to death in one minute. Irreversible brain damage can occur if oxygen is not supplied within four minutes. Does this allow enough time to call for assistance? If the answer is no, maybe it would be wise for you to be aware of emergency first aid. For example, what should you do to revive a heart attack victim? Stop serious bleeding? Assist in a coronary? Revive a person from electric shock? Now is the time for you to prepare to meet life saving emergencies. Join the LCC Emergency Care Team.
