RAPE INFORMATION--The Associated Lane Interagency Rape Team (ALIRT) has just published an "Information Packet for Teachers." The packet contains lesson plans, prevention tips for males and females, handouts on the myths of rape, and other information pertinant to all students. The packets are available through the Women's Center, ext. 350 or 391. They are free. And by way of introduction, the Women's Center ask that the following be reprinted.

Recently, Harper's Weekly carried an item from the American Bar Association Journal declaring that few rapists are punished for their crime: only one in five rapes is reported and only one out of eight reported rapes ends in conviction. In a dialogue to demonstrate why most rape victims prefer not to press charges, the article asks us to imagine a robbery victim undergoing the same sort of cross-examination that a rape victim does:

"Mr. Smith, you were held up at gunpoint on the corner of First

and Main?"
"Yes."

"Did you struggle with the robber?"

"No."

"Why not?"

"He was armed."

"Then you made a conscious

decision to comply with his demands rather than resist?"

"Yes."

"Did you scream? Cry out?"

"No. I was afraid."

"I see. Have you ever been held up before?"

"No."

"Have you ever given money away?"

"Yes, of course."

"And you did so willingly?"
"What are you getting at?"

"Well, let's put it like this, Mr. Smith. You've given money away in the past. In fact you have quite a reputation for philanthropy. How can we be sure you weren't contriving to have your money taken by force?"

"Listen, if I wanted--"

"Never mind. What time did this holdup take place?" "About 11 P.M." "You were out on the street at 11 P.M.? Doing what?"

"Just walking."

"Just walking? You know that it's dangerous being out on the street that late at night. Weren't you aware that you could have been held up?"

"I hadn't thought about it."

"What were you wearing?"
"Let's see—a suit. Yes, a suit."

"An expensive suit?"

"Well-yes. I'm a successful

lawyer, you know."

"In other words, Mr. Smith, you were walking around the streets late at night in a suit that practically advertised the fact that you might be a good target for some easy money, isn't that so? I mean, if we didn't know better, Mr. Smith, we might even think that you were asking for this to happen, mightn't we?"





GOOD NEWS FOR LCC--Voters gave LCC a new tax base at yesterday's election -- by a margin of 56 percent yes. The unofficial total was 56,576 yes votes to 42,741 no. LCC is the only school district in Lane County to get voter approval of a new tax base in the last 18 years -- and we've done it three times. The tax base will allow the College to operate two years without asking voters for a tax levy.

Most of the other race outcomes are old news by now but two community college tax base elections might be of interest. Linn-Benton won its bid for a new tax base but Treasure Valley will have to wait a while to know the results of its election. As of 7:30 this morning, a spokesperson at that school said "the election is still too close to call."







#### \*\*NEUROSIS? NO, CAFFEINE \*\*


The patient is feeling anxious, not sleeping well; his hands shake slightly. Before discussing his nerves, ask how much coffee, tea and cola he drinks. High doses of caffeine can produce central-nervous-system symptoms that are essentially indistinguishable from those of anxiety attack. So reports Dr. John F. Greden, until recently director of psychiatric research at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Over 250 milligrams of caffeine a day is considered a large amount, but a person who consumes three cups of coffee, two "headache tablets" containing caffeine, and a cola drink before lunch has taken approximately 500 mg. of caffeine.

Dr. Greden's cases of caffeinism include a nurse with a three-week history of light-headedness, tremulousness, headache and irregular heartbeat. She had been consuming 10-12 cups of coffee - more than 1000 mg. of caffeine - a day. Her symptoms disappeared within 36 hours after she stopped drinking coffee. (Adapted from Journal of the

American Medical Association.)

#### \*\* DRUG USE \*\*

The analysis of ten years of national hepatitis reporting (1966-1975) shows an almost ten-fold rise in drug-related hepatitis cases. In the last three years, the number of cases has declined but remains substantially higher than pre-epidemic levels. The rise began in the 60's among minority groups living in center cities of the East and West Coasts and spread during the 70's into suburbs of these cities and into metropolitan areas throughout the United States. 

BOARD OF EDUCATION--Without ever reaching the body of the lenghty agenda, the LCC Board adjourned at midnight Wednesday, agreeing to continue the meeting the next week. The topic receiving the most time and comment was the proposed change in staff at KLCC. The Mass Communication Dept. and the Administration has proposed replacing several present KLCC staff members with persons holding college degree and thus able to teach LCC classes. Several persons, including KLCC staff members, spoke in opposition to that reorganization. At midnight, the board ask that the item be carried over to the Nov. 18 session, and no decision was made.

Other items of discussion included: a request for a report on the concerns of part-time faculty and classified employees; an agreement to work with the South Lane School District in providing some alternatives while that district is without a budget election; passage of several course revisions and approval of a new degree program in Community Service, and the architect's presentation of the proposed acquatic center which would be constructed only if a federal grant is received.

ENROLLMENT--While recent media reports have indicated that enrollment in all of Oregon's community colleges has dropped significantly, actual enrollment at the 13 schools has stayed about the same as that of last year. Jack Carter, Dean of Students, says that enrollment figures at LCC show a total of slightly more than 13,000 individuals enrolled in credit and non-credit classes this fall, which is about the same as last year. Carter says that for the last several years, community college enrollments have been climbing at a fairly rapid rate but that trend appears to have leveled off this year.

A \$1 donation will be collected for administration of the vaccine under State of Oregon policy. If you clip the consent form on the back of today's Daily and take it with you (signed) to the clinic, it will expedite matters.

The Student Health Service learned this week from Jim Beyer, County coordinator for the Swine Flu clinics, that a second dose of monovalent vaccine will be necessary for those in the 18-24 age group. The second dose is given a minimum of 30 days from the first, and arrangements are being made for these to be given at LCC shortly after the first of the year.

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT SWINE INFLUENZA (FLU) VACCINE (MONOVALENT)

#### The Disease

Influenza (flu) is caused by viruses. When people get flu they may have fever, chills, headache, dry cough or muscle aches. Illness may last several days or a week or more, and complete recovery is usual. However, complications may lead to pneumonia or death in some people. For the elderly and people with diabetes or heart, lung, or kidney diseases, flu may be especially serious.

It is unlikely that you have adequate natural protection against swine flu, since it has not caused widespread human outbreaks in 45 years.

#### The Vaccine

The vaccine will not give you flu because it is made from killed viruses. Today's flu vaccines cause fewer side effects than those used in the past. In contrast with some other vaccines, flu vaccine can be taken safely during pregnancy.

One shot will protect most people from swine flu during the next flu season; however, either a second shot or a different dosage may be required for persons under age 25. If you are under 25 and a notice regarding such information is not attached, this information will be provided to you wherever you receive the vaccine.

#### Possible Vaccine Side Effects

Most people will have no side effects from the vaccine. However, tenderness at the site of the shot may occur and last for several days. Some people will also have fever, chills, headache, or muscle aches within the first 48 hours.

#### Special Precautions

As with any vaccine or drug, the possibility of severe or potentially fatal reactions exists. However, flu vaccine has rarely been associated with severe or fatal reactions. In some instances people receiving vaccine have had allergic reactions. You should note very carefully the following precautions:


- Children under a certain age should not routinely receive flu vaccine. Please ask about age limitations if this information is not attached.
- People with known allergy to eggs should receive the vaccine only under special medical supervision.
- People with fever should delay getting vaccinated until the fever is gone.
- People who have received another type of vaccine in the past 14 days should consult a physician before taking the flu vaccine.

If you have any questions about flu or flu vaccine, please ask.
