





U.S.A. VITAL STATISTICS

---- The death rate in the U.S. declined again last year but deaths due to cancer continued to increase and remain at the highest level ever recorded. The four causes of 73% of all deaths are heart disease, cancer, cerebro vascular disease, and accidents, in that order. The highest increase in the cancer category was cancer of the respiratory system. Life expectancy at birth is now 72.4 years, higher than ever before.

---- There are still more babies being born than people dying in this country and over 1 million people were added to the population by natural increase in 1975.

---- Marriages declined in 1975 to reach a rate lower than any year since 1967.


---- Divorces exceeded one million for the first time in history. The number of divorces has doubled in the last decade. (From The Nation's Health, Aug. 1976.)

People who bind, soak, dry, then burn newspaper/magazine logs are doing more than saving on fuel bills. They are also creating a health hazard, say two doctors from State University of New York. Drs. Kathleen Perkins and Frank Oski say that inhaling dust from a fireplace used to burn newsprint can lead to increased blood-lead levels, especially in children. Since lead poisoning can cause anemia, colic, and encephalitis, they warn parents to beware of this. So if you are looking for a way to keep the house warm, better stick to the real thing: wood!





BAD NEWS FOR WOMEN--The gap between the earnings of men and women has nearly doubled since 1955, according to a publication released by the U.S. Department of Labor. In constant dollars, taking inflation into account, the gap increased from \$1,911 in 1955 to \$3,433 in 1974. The publication attributes the difference in part to the large number of women who have entered the labor force for the first time, and so are concentrated in low-paying, entry-level jobs. Another reason is the continuing concentration of women in low-skilled occupations. --The Ragan Report, Dec. 13.




