

Dean of Students Jack Carter said it appears the major drop in enrollment is in evening credit classes rather than day enrollment.

ENROLLMENT--Figures for winter term (as of last Friday) show 6,425 students have registered in credit programs. Dean of Students Jack Carter indicates that that number will probably increase to a total of 6,725 students this term. That compares with 7,066 students fall term of this year and 7,315 students winter term a year ago.

The state figures enrollment for financial purposes on FTE (45 credit hours or 680 clock hours equal one FTE per year). Last year's actual reimbursable FTE totaled 7,522. This year's projected FTE is expected to be between 7,300 and 7,350, or a decrease of about 2.3 to 3 percent in FTE from last year.





BOARD OF EDUCATION--Plans for a swimming pool at LCC appear to have sunk after the Board learned that the construction project failed to receive a sought-after federal grant. The Board stopped further development of plans for the PE and aquatic center since federal Economic Development Act funds were not awarded to the project. The architect was paid with the plans about half complete, and it appears the project will be shelved unless another source of funding is found.

The board also voted to refuse to voluntarily recognize part-time High School Completion and Adult Basic Education instructors as a collective bargaining unit. The faculty group now has the option of having a hearing and election to determine formation and representation. (The hearing is scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 3, at 1 p.m.)

Other items receiving Board attention included approval of a Board policy concerning employment of family members and of the academic calendar for 1977-78; and acceptance of resignations from Patrick Fraleigh, Counseling, effective March 15, and Randy Mafit, archives, effective Feb. 11. Randy indicated he would go to work for Lane County.

The Board also ask President Schafer to appoint a part-time faculty member to attend a Feb. 7-9 conference in Dallas, Texas, on Part-time Instructors in the Community College.

** LONG LIFE - SHORT LIFE **

Through a study of nearly 7000 adults, followed for 5 1/2 years, Doctors Brelow and Belloc demonstrated life expectancy and better health are significantly related to some basic health habits. These included:

Three meals a day at regular times instead of snacks.

2. Breakfast every day.

 Moderate exercise two or three times a week (long walks, gardening, bike riding, swimming).

1. Seven or eight hours sleep a night.

5. No smoking.

6. Moderate weight.

7. No alcohol or only in moderation.

Among the specific findings:


- 1. A 45 year old man who practices 0-3 of these habits has a life expectancy of 21.6 years he can expect to live to about 67. A 45 year old man who practices 6-7 of these habits can look forward to 33.1 years he can expect to live to about 78. The magnitude of this difference of more than 11 years is better understood if we consider that the increase in life expectancy of white men in the U.S.A. between 1900 and 1960 was only three years.
- The physical health status of those reported following all seven good health practices was consistently about the same as those 30 years or younger who follow none or few of these practices.

Summary

The primary barrier to good health in America is not lack of financial access. Certainly there are many Americans who do not have access to quality care and there is need for improvement in health care delivery, and in the education and distribution of

health manpower.

The fact remains, however, that the primary cause of poor health and premature death in America cannot be attributed to the above deficits. "Living a long life is essentially a do-it-yourself proposition" says a New York Times writer. The formal medical system merely patches up victims of heart attacks, automobile accidents, and attempted murder usually without affecting the underlying problems of poor diet, poor driving, or pent-up violence. A direct attack on the primary causes can only be made by efforts at prevention and health education. (From the report of the task force on Consumer Health Education, Anne R. Sommers, Chairman, Aspen Publications, 1976.)





LEGISLATIVE BULLETIN--Bills introduced in the Oregon Legislature in the past weeks

which would have an affect on community colleges include:

* HB 5010 would increase reimbursement rates to community colleges for operation from \$835 to \$960 for the first 1,100 students and from \$670 to \$770 for each student over 1,100 for the first year of the biennium. The amounts are adjusted to \$1,020 and \$820, respectively, for the second year. The bill also appropriates \$10.3 million for community college capital construction projects.

* SB 173 limits the scope of collective bargaining in the public sector to exclude: job classification specification, elements of personnel management, Public Employee Retirement System benefits and other subject areas which directly impose costs upon

other levels of government, and the mission and goals of state agencies.

* SB 261 requires community colleges to include in budget summaries and election notices information relating to expenditures of state funds for payment of unmet obligations for community college capital construction. It also requires such state func to be used for new capital construction to be voted on as a separate item in a budget election, and prohibits use of such funds for any billed construction not already approve by the state legislature, or for student health facilities, non-instructional portions of student centers or recreational facilities.




