CUTTING BUDGETS--Mt. Hood Community College, says the Gresham Outlook, is cutting \$1 million from its budget for the next fiscal year. Each department is assigned a dollar limit and then submits for approval a plan as to how it proposes to use the money. Everything is listed, down to the cost of pencils required annually. The Pendleton East Oregonian reports that Blue Mountain Community College (BMCC), to avert the possibility of overspending its budget, has placed a freeze on spending for items totaling \$31,000. Some \$16,000 will come from travel funds. The BMCC Board also has ratified a 1977-78 contract for support staff which includes a 4.5% pay raise.

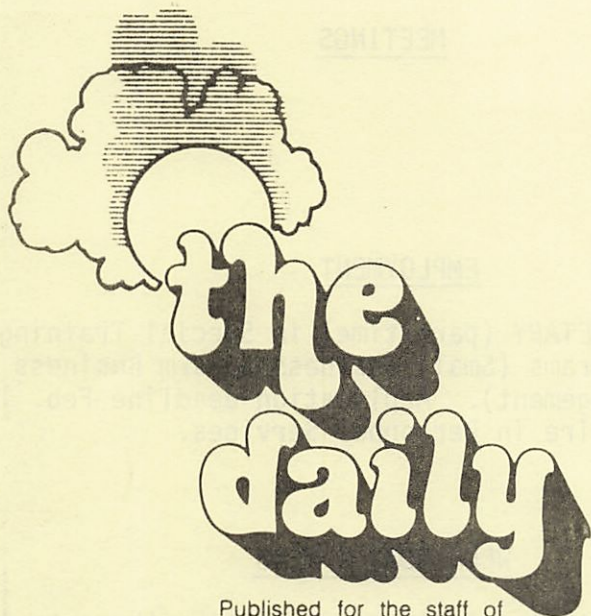

FTEs NOT ALL ALIKE--The January 1977 issue of OCCA Report states that last month a Portland newspaper understated Oregon community college full-time equivalent students (FTEs) by about two-thirds. The reporter erroneously assumed that community colleges and four-year institutions calculate their FTEs the same way. Community colleges divide total credit hours taken in a quarter by 45, the number of credits a full-time student takes in a year, because state reimbursement is based on yearly FTEs that are reported quarterly. Four-year institutions calculate their FTEs by dividing total credits taken by 15, the number of hours a full-time student takes in a quarter.

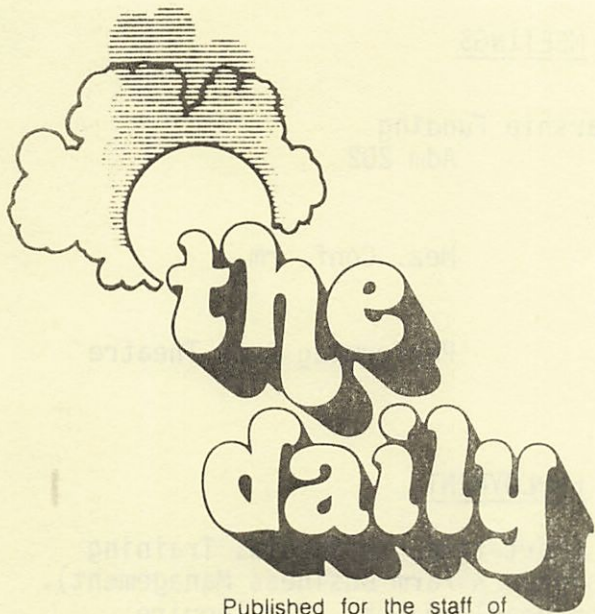

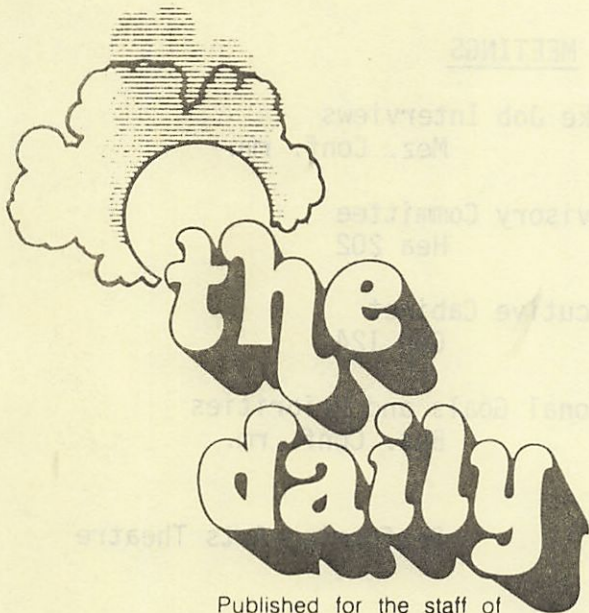

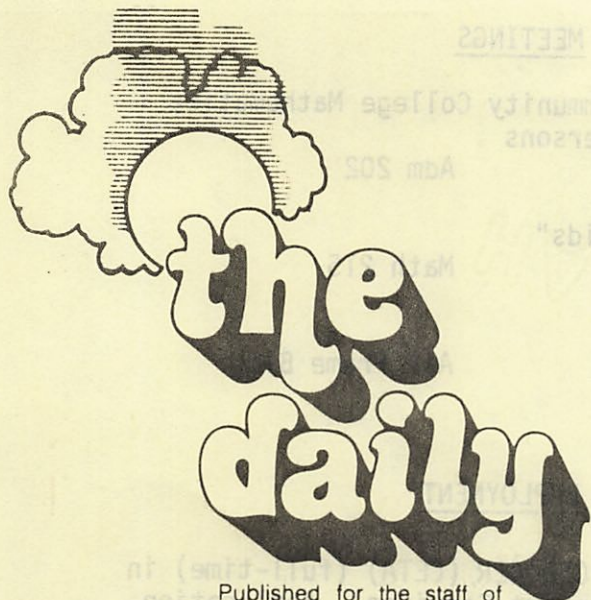

A 5 per cent tuition hike is built into the budget proposal. Voters will be asked to approve a one-year \$974,400 levy on April 19. That's \$160,000 more than was approved for this year. Central Oregon CC, reports the Bend Bulletin, will place a \$1.8 million levy before voters on March 8. The increase is 5.3 per cent. Interim President Gary Edelbrock at Chemeketa CC gets an editorial pat on the back from the Oregon Statesman for aggressive leadership in cutting back to accommodate an enrollment drop. He has axed 26 positions, 14 of them in administration. Even so, the college's budget is expected to climb 5 per cent next year.

The Board agreed last night to meet again next Wednesday, Feb. 23, to decide the future philosophy in programming of the station. At last night's meeting, the Board heard members of the Mass Communication Department reiterate that that department has no desire to change the current programming of the station, even though a new staff has been hired to operate it.

In other business, the Board authorized the administration to proceed with negotiations to replace a Piper Arrow airplane used the Flight Technology Department; and approved three new courses in Business, Home Economics and Study Skills.

* DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL IN OREGON *

The use of alcohol by automobile drivers is a serious and continuing problem in Oregon. There were 574 people (including drivers, passengers, pedestrians, motorcyclists and bicyclists) killed in automobile accidents during 1975. A blood alcohol reading was obtained on 68.8% of them and 53.1% of those tested showed evidence of alcohol in the blood. Since these percentages are based on blood alcohol reports of fatalities only, it does not include people involved in accidents who may have been driving but were not killed.

The fatality rates are highest in 18-19 year-old males, both for all persons and for drivers only. The ratio of the rate in the 18-19 year-old to the rate in the other age-sex groups combined is 4.7 for all persons and 5.4 for drivers only.

The Oregon State Legislature passed an "Implied Consent" law which took effect January 1, 1966. Under this law, it is automatically implied that a person who operates a motor vehicle on any public thoroughfare within Oregon will give his consent to take a breath test to determine his blood alcohol concentration if he is arrested for driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor. If he refuses to give his consent, his driver's license will be suspended for a specified period of time. A blood alcohol concentration of not less than 0.10% constitutes being under the influence of intoxicating liquor in Oregon, but a lower level may also be considered as indirect evidence.

LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS--The following article about the new Copyright Act may be useful to LCC staff members. It is reprinted from The Ragan Report's article by Delbert McGuire, Department of Technical Journalism professor at Colorado State University.

Beginning Jan. 1, 1978, owners of copyrighted material will find substantial changes in the provisions created by a new Copyright Act passed by Congress and signed into law by President Ford on Oct. 20, 1976.

Perhaps the major and most noticeable change is in the lifetime of a copyright. The new act provides that a statutory copyright will extend to the author's death and for 50 years thereafter. This provision replaces the period in use since 1909 in which the copyright was for 28 years, renewable once, for a total of 56 years.

Under the new provisions for joint works, prepared by two or more authors who did not work for hire, the copyright endures for a term consisting of the life of the last surviving author and 50 years after such last surviving author's death.

The rights of copyright for a compilation of materials or a derivative work extends only to the material contributed by the author of such work, as distinguished from the preexisting material used in the work. In other words, the copyright does not imply any exclusive right in the preexisting material.

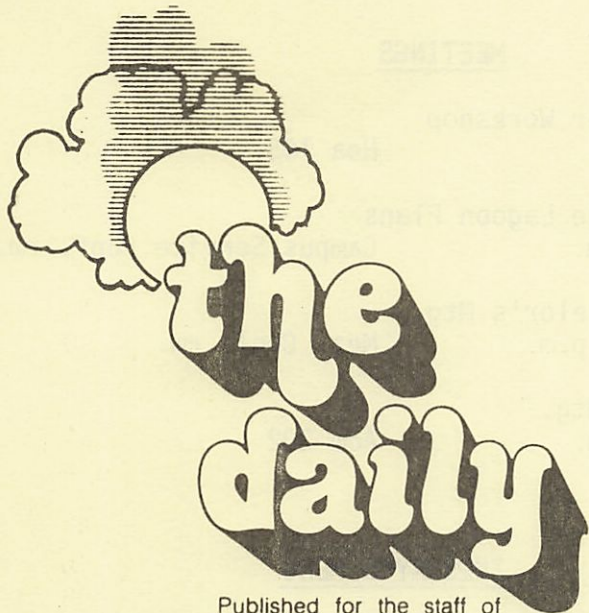
"Fair use": Limitations on exclusive rights for copyrighted material:

It is not an infringement of copyright if the work is (used) (reproduced) for criticism, comment, news reporting, teaching (including multiple copies for classroom use), scholarship or research, provided that: (a) The use is not of a commercial nature but is of a nonprofit educational nature; or (b) The nature of the copyrighted work does not prohibit such use or reproduction; or (c) The amount and substantiality of the portion used is reasonable.

There are some limitations on the above "right of fair use" of copyrighted materials, however. Some are: (a) A teacher may not make multiple copies of a work for classroom use if the work has already been copied for another class in the same institution. (this provision may pose a bookkeeping problem for the librarian or institution.) (b) A teacher may not make multiple copies of a short poem, article, story, or essay from the same author more than once in a class term, or make multiple copies from the same collective work or periodical issue more than three times a term. (Another bookkeeping chore.) (c) A teacher may not make multiple copies of copyrighted works more than nine times in the same class term. (d) A teacher may not make a copy of copyrighted works to take the place of an anthology. (e) A teacher may not make a copy of "consumable" materials, such as workbooks.

Reproductions: Under the new copyright provisions, a library may, for interlibrary-loan purposes: (a) Make up to six copies a year of a periodical published within the last five years; (b) Make up to six copies a year of small excerpts from longer works; (c) Make copies of unpublished works for purposes of preservation and security (as in the case of theses or dissertations); (d) Make copies of copyrighted published works for purposes of replacing damaged copies; (e) Make copies of out-of-print works that cannot be obtained at a fair price.

Common law copyright: The new copyright provisions do not change the status of common law copyright (the right of ownership of a work held privately by the producer, to be kept for his or her own use as long as he or she does not distribute it to others). Should he or she distribute the work, he or she loses common law rights and, if he or she does not file for statutory copyright at the time of distribution, the work goes into the public domain.

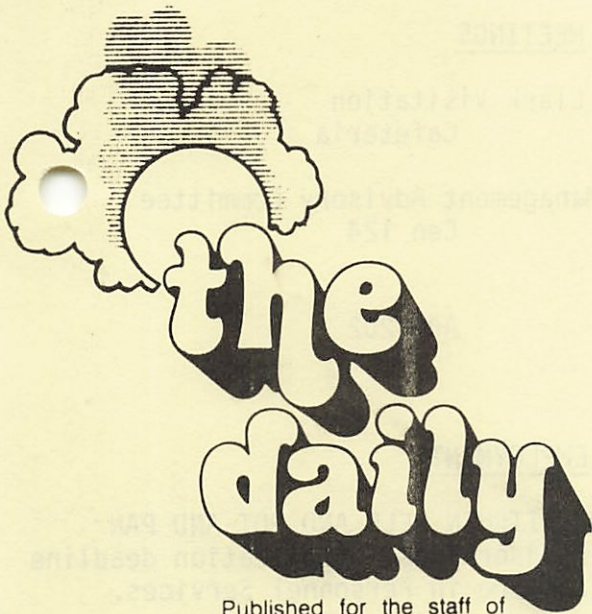

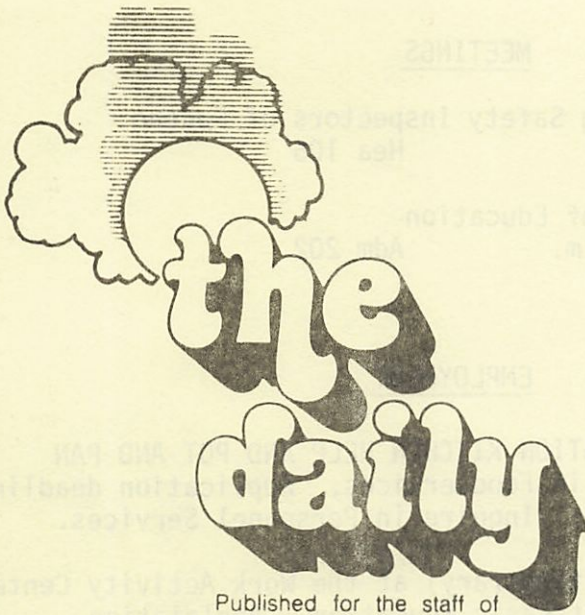

BOARD OF EDUCATION--The LCC Board of Education will meet at 6:30 tonight in the Boardroom. Only two items are on the agenda: KLCC and the graduate/dropout survey. The Board is expected to make a decision on the future of the College FM-radio station during tonight's session. The graduate/dropout survey was distributed to Board members several meetings ago and was put on tonight's agenda in hopes of finding time to review the material. The meeting is open to the public.

PLANNING AHEAD--Plans have been developed to save water on campus this summer. Walt Van Orden, Director of Plant Services, indicates that with tighter controls of the irrigation systems a 30 per cent savings may be realized. Sewage lagoons will be utilized for watering the athletic fields, fountains will be pumped out for watering the shrubbery, more bark-o-mulch will be spread to better contain moisture, and faucets in the restrooms will be regulated to supply only the minimum necessary water pressure. Also, the College will work with the Eugene Water and Electric Board to help with the economy measures.

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STATE BOARD HIGHLIGHTS--Last Friday the State Board of Education adopted anti-discrimination regulations for Oregon Community Colleges; allocated \$158,216 to Chemeketa CC to help construct and equip phase one of a fire training facility; and allocated \$37,143 to Rogue CC to renovate and equip a physical science laboratory.

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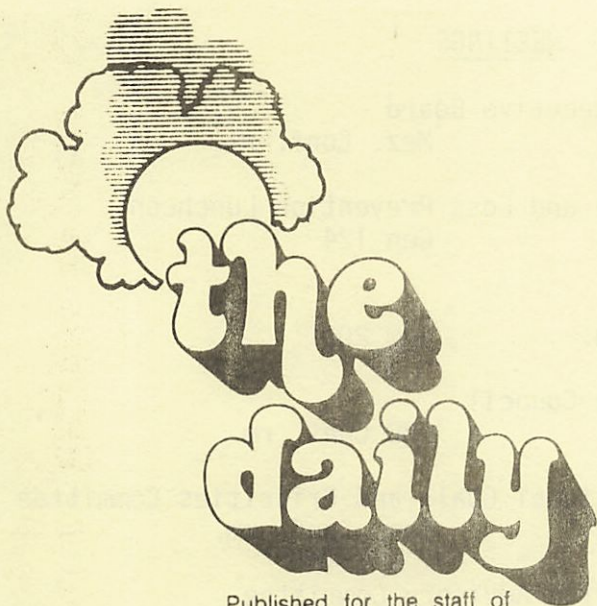

BOARD OF EDUCATION--At last night's meeting, the Board approved keeping the College's FM-radio station, KLCC, a community radio station but responsibility for the station was moved from the Mass Communication Department to the Dean of Instruction. The Board accepted a motion from member Catherine Lauris to retain the station's affiliation with the Corporation for Public Broadcasting and National Public Radio, appoint a seven-member advisory committee to serve as a sounding board for the station manager, make the budget a separate part of the Board of Education budget, and make the station manager in charge of day-to-day decisions affecting operation of the station.

Mrs. Lauris' motion was amended only in that the station will come under the responsibility of the Dean of Instruction, Gerald Rasmussen, rather than President Eldon Schafer, as she originally moved. The amended motion was accepted by a four to three vote of the Board and will be effective July 1. The Board also made provisions to review the station's operation every six months.

As a result of the move, it appears KLCC will maintain a similar jazz and public affairs programming but with an increased emphasis on educational functions for broadcast students. The audience of about 60 appeared to be in agreement with the solution to the controversy which erupted over a change in staff at the station to include personnel qualified to teach College-level classes.

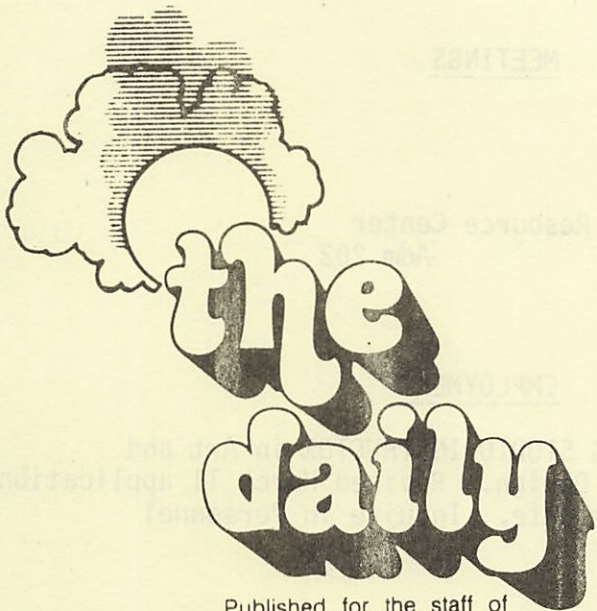

CC GROWTH NOT UP TO INCREASED COSTS--The steady enrollment growth at Oregon community colleges during the five years from 1971 to 1976 pales in comparison to the increases in various fixed and mandated costs colleges faced during that same period, according to a study recently completed by the Oregon Community College Assembly. The study shows enrollments in the five year period rose an average of 10.4 per cent during each year of the study period, while costs for utilities, liability insurance and mandated and negotiated employee overhead costs went up an average of 31.6 per cent yearly.

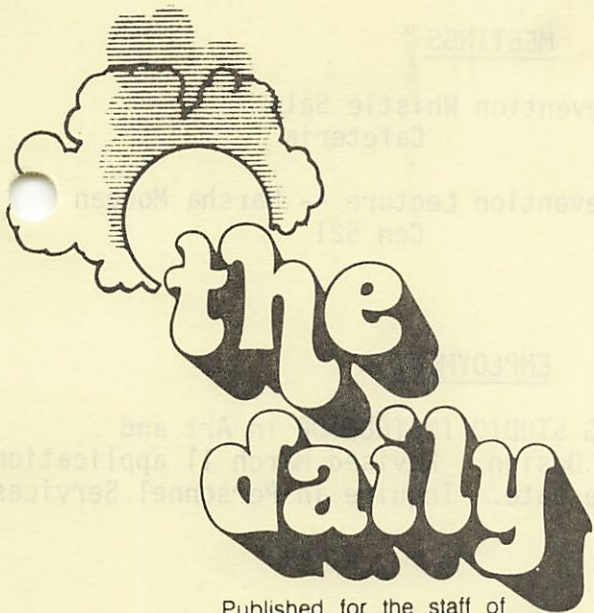

BOARD AGENT EXEMPT FROM OPEN MEETING LAW--Oregon's open meeting law does not apply to bargaining sessions carried on by a retained labor negotiator, according to a Feb. 8 decision by the Oregon Court of Appeals. This issue arose when the Southwestern Oregon Publishing Company filed suit against the Southwest Oregon Community College district for refusing to allow the press to attend bargaining sessions between the district's negotiator and staff representatives. The Circuit Judge for Coos County held that the public meeting law did apply and therefore the press should be allowed to attend bargaining sessions.

The case was appealed by the community college district, partially at the request of the Oregon School Boards Association and Oregon Community College Assembly, because of the precedent setting nature of the decision in contending that agents of the board were in fact a public body. The OSBA intervened in the case and filed a brief on behalf of all school districts.

Judge Herbert Schwab in writing the decision reversing the Circuit Court held "a retained labor negotiator is neither a member of a public body nor a governing body -- consequently the Public Meetings Law has no applicability to negotiations conducted by a retained negotiator." Judge Schwab concluded by stating "Even accepting that the Public Meetings Law is ambiguous, we cannot see how adopting the plaintiff's position aides in providing an 'informed public aware of the deliberations and decisions of governing bodies' when the governing body may forbid the news media from reporting any or all discussion which occurs." --Reprint from OSBA Negotiations Update, Feb. 14.
