PUBLIC EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEM--As a result of a recently completed actuarial study of the Public Employees Retirement System, it appears that school districts will face substantial increases in retirement contributions in the future. While the state and other local governments also face substantial increases, the potential increase for schools is much greater than that for other local governments. While specific information on why this is happening was not available, the actuary speculated that school employees live longer, retire earlier, and that there is a much higher percentage of female employees than in other units of government. --OSBA Outlook and Review

The winner of the Linn-Benton - LCC game will meet the winner of the Chemeketa - Umpqua game tonight for a berth in the Region 18 tournament at Twin Falls, Idaho. We will have the results tomorrow.

NUMBER OF STUDENTS DROPS, NUMBER OF TEACHERS GETTING JOBS INCREASES--The number of students Oregon colleges and universities are preparing to teach has dropped more than 25 per cent during the last four years, according to the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission. A higher percentage of recent graduates are getting teaching jobs in Oregon schools. The Commission said that new or improved teacher education facilities are needed at the University of Oregon and Portland State University.

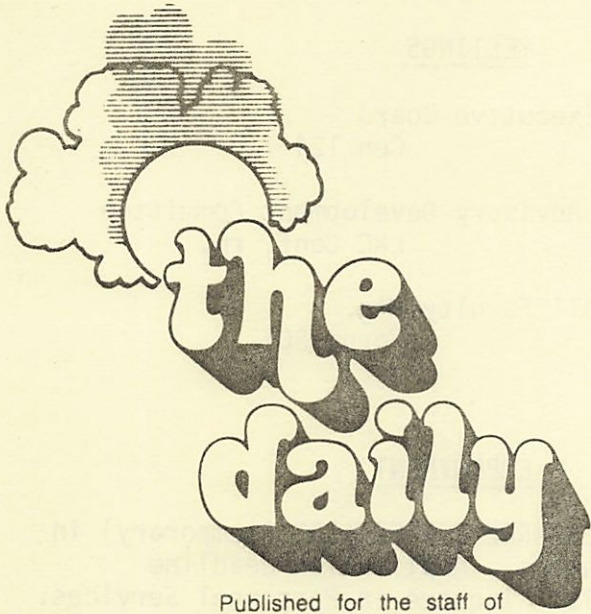

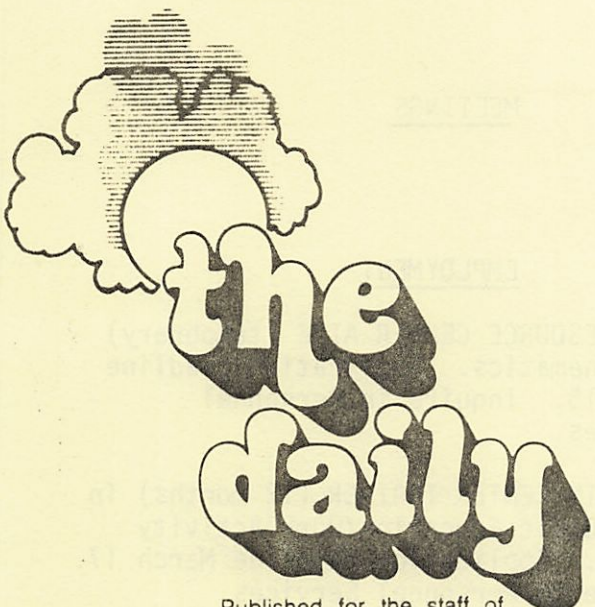

SHUTTING DOWN--LCC's Valley River Center kiosk will close March 31 due to budgetary constraints. Negotiations with VRC are underway, however, to have the kiosk reopen for short periods ahead of each term. The kiosk has been very successful; attendants talked to more than 8,000 people about LCC in three months. The project was conducted by the Counseling Department.

NEW OFFICE HOURS--The Department of Health and Physical Education is now open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday. The extra two hours on four days of the week will help the department better serve those seeking information.

FRIDAY CAN'T BE FAR BEHIND--March payroll worksheets can be picked up in Financial Services on Friday, March 18, from 2 to 5 p.m. Completed and signed worksheets, with timesheets attached, are due back in Financial Services by 5 p.m. on Monday, March 21.

"BIRD DROPPINGS"--Now completing its first year in the federal excess property program, LCC has collected several thousand items worth about \$1 million at used prices. (The feds bought the stuff new for \$4 million.) Cost to the College has been about \$79,000 for administration and freight expenses. The harvest has included a \$200,000 never-used microwave relay station, a \$49,000 hydraulics laboratory, two giant storage tanks which have become part of the College's heat conservation program, oscilloscopes, milling machines, turret lathes, aircraft, vehicles, furniture, and on and on. Howard Bird, screener/coordinator, says the harvest should continue at least through October. After that time, non-federal agencies will be assigned lower priorities and the pickings may be leaner. Until then, Howard is on the run because the acquisition process is competitive; when materials show up at a federal depot, it's first-come, first-served.

TIMBER SUPPLY SHORT--President Schafer advocated a broader economic base for the area in a February 28 appearance before the Eugene City Council. Supporting the request of an electronics firm to move to Eugene, Eldon quoted the 1976 Report of the Legislative Interim Committee on Revenue and School Finance: "...Can Oregon continue to harvest timber at its current rate?' The study finds that for the state as a whole this is not possible in the next three decades unless increased amounts are harvested from public lands. The study indicates that some timbersheds will have particular problems maintaining their current cut. Eugene is the area to be most adversely affected."

FROM PRESIDENT SCHAFER--"Because of the expressed interest by some of our women staff to participate in the International Women's Day activities to be conducted at the downtown Eugene Mall from noon to 1 p.m. on Tuesday, March 8, I have joined with President Boyd of the University of Oregon in granting an additional 30 minutes to the normal lunch hour for interested staff to attend. As a point of clarification, it should be noted that this action does not include cancellation of scheduled classes."

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY--A holiday which salutes women as women rather than appendages will be celebrated at noon Tuesday by the fountain on the Eugene Mall (in the Atrium if it rains). Native costumes, singing, music, dancing and cultural displays are scheduled. Those going by bus may catch the 11:30 or 11:40. Rides also will be provided through the Women's Center; be at Center 221 by 11:30 a.m.

ON KLCC-FM--Tune to 90.3 Tuesday for morning-to-night women's programming.

IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN--Tomorrow, Central Oregon CC and Treasure Valley CC have levy elections. Also voting: Oakridge School District, which is asking if its constituents want to close an elementary school and eliminate the junior high program. The move would eliminate 8 teachers and 6 classified staff and cut \$190,000 from next year's proposed budget.

PLAY IT AGAIN, SAM--March payroll worksheets can be picked up in Financial Services on Friday, March 18, from 2 to 5 p.m. Completed and signed worksheets, with timesheets attached, are due back in Financial Services by 5 p.m. on Monday, March 21.

FROM OREGON'S NEWSPAPERS--Umpqua CC President Bud Hakanson is stumping for passage of SB 543, which would allow community colleges to seek approval of a set tax rate per thousand dollars of property value. Voters could approve such a rate for up to a 10-year period. The Oregon Community College Assembly has passed a resolution urging its 13 member institutions to cut back on the use of water. A Georgia-Pacific vice president told an Astoria audience that schools should turn out "a graduate educated to fulfill his potential in the real world. Too many schools today are aimed toward turning out high-style Cadillacs instead of needed pickup trucks." Rogue CC President Henry Pete just missed trophies in various joggers' runs this year, so students gave him a sportsmanship award. Said Pete: "They just didn't want to see a grown man cry." He vows he'll win the spring run. Seven community colleges and two four-year colleges in Oregon have associate degree nursing programs. But, they're asking the Educational Coordinating Commission to allow them to start an ADN program too. Kids using Rogue CC walks and parking lots for skateboarding have had to be stopped due to danger to pedestrians.

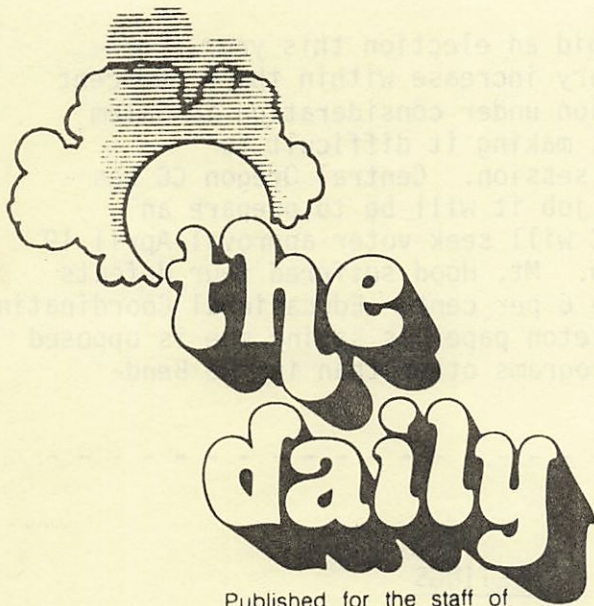

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY--Celebration of a day for women will begin at noon today by the fountain on the Eugene Mall (in the Atrium if it rains). Native costumes, singing, music, dancing and cultural displays are scheduled. Those going may catch the 11:30 or 11:40 a.m. buses or a ride through the Women's Center at 11:30 a.m. President Schafer has granted an additional 30 minutes to the normal lunch hour for interested staff to attend (classes will not be cancelled, however). And KLCC at 90.3 will have morning-to-night women's programming.

PERFORMING ARTS EVENTS--Thursday the choirs of LCC, Sheldon High and South Eugene High will present a concert in the Performing Arts Theatre. The choirs will sing separately and then combine the nearly 200 voices for the final two songs. The concert is free and starts at 8 p.m.

A Student Segue concert will be held Thursday from 11 a.m. to noon in the Performing Arts Theatre. The free concert features woodwind and recorder ensembles, and saxophone and vocal solos.

Friday in the Lab Theatre the second year acting students will be presenting their final acting recitals. John Jones and Debbie Roberts will perform in "The Death of Bessie Smith" by Edward Albee, and Karen Boylan, Todd Crump and John Luckey will present "The Marriage Proposal" by Anton Chekov. The Industrial Orientation program is a series of four recommended courses, including a new lab/lecture exploring nine vocational areas, designed to increase career options for women. SCHOLARSHIP CANDIDATE--LCC student Patricia B. Quinn has been notified that she has been nominated as a candidate for a Harry S. Truman Scholarship. Final selection of the Truman Scholar and of the alternate for each state will be made by the Foundation's Board of Trustees on April 18.

FROM OREGON NEWSPAPERS--Southwestern Oregon CC will avoid an election this year (and hopefully in the next two years) by holding its budgetary increase within the 6 per cent limitation. There are at least 250 pieces of legislation under consideration in Salem that would affect the operations of community colleges, making it difficult to analyze what may happen during the current legislative session. Central Oregon CC has named 17 people to a Council of Senior Citizens, whose job it will be to prepare an education action plan for retired persons. Mt. Hood CC will seek voter approval April 19 of a \$1.6 million levy beyond the 6 per cent limitation. Mt. Hood suffered four defeats last year and never got approval of anything beyond the 6 per cent. Educational Coordinating Committee member Elizabeth Johnson is quoted by a Pendleton paper as saying she is opposed to the starting of any more associate degree nursing programs other than in the Bend-Redmond area where she resides.

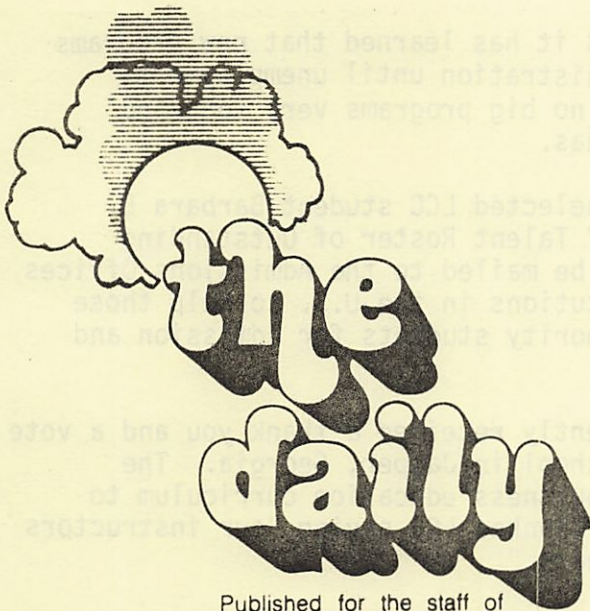

BOARD OF EDUCATION--The Board of Education will meet at 7:30 tonight for a regular public meeting. Included on the relatively brief agenda are some housekeeping-type business matters (change orders and equipment sale), discussion of a Board policy for funding of the Torch, Student Health Service, and athletics through the College's general fund, and discussion of open collective bargaining.

FRUSTRATED--An LCC Political Science prof tried to join the system by calling President Carter Saturday during the afternoon call-in show. He and his wife tried 345 times -- unsuccessfully. Maybe next time Oregon and Washington will get some special priority because not one call from the two states even made it to Washington, D.C. All the lines were busy.

LOCAL ECONOMY IMPROVES--Total unemployment declined in January for only the second time since 1958, according to the State Employment Division. Unemployment dropped only 250 to 11,300 for a seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 8.5 percent compared to 9.7 in December. The number of resident jobholders in the county stood at 100,000 in January, up 5,150 or 5.4 percent from one year ago. This winter's warm, dry weather is credited with the upward trend.

LOW PRIORITY--The Oregon School Boards Association says it has learned that new programs in education will not be started under the Carter Administration until unemployment, inflation, and welfare reforms are met. There will be no big programs very soon and public education will have to fight to retain what it has.

TALENT ROSTER--The College Entrance Examination Board selected LCC student Barbara D. Pacheco and Thomas E. Younker for inclusion in the 1977 Talent Roster of Outstanding Minority Community College graduates. The Roster will be mailed to the Admissions Offices of all accredited, baccalaureate degree-granting institutions in the U.S. to help those institutions identify outstanding community college minority students for admission and possible scholarships.

HELPING HAND WELCOMED--The LCC Business Department recently received a thank you and a vote of confidence from Pickens Area Vocational-Technical School in Jasper, Georgia. The LCC department provided samples of its individualized business education curriculum to the Georgia school. The Pickens Curriculum Specialist thanked LCC saying "our instructors have been more impressed by your materials than any others."

CHANGED HIS MIND--Speaking before the Oregon Community College Assembly on March 11, Gov. Bob Straub had a good word for adult education. "At one time," he said, "I thought the main purpose of community college education should be to satisfy only the vocational and technical needs of our communities. But I must confess, I no longer feel that way. Times change. The needs of our communities change. And our values have to change. Our responses to the conditions of life must be different. I believe that adult education and self-improvement courses are of great importance to our citizens today. That is why it pleases me to see the broad range of your courses. Courses that serve not just the vocational and intellectual needs of our people. But also their emotional and practical human needs. Courses for people who because of death or divorce have had to re-enter the work market. Courses on how to deal with grief caused by loss of a loved one. Guidance courses for those whose careers have vanished and in midlife must retrain themselves. Homemaking courses for men who serve as the only parent. Parent effectiveness training. Simple auto or home repair for women. Energy conservation. Career counseling. Courses that equip us to deal with the practical, everyday matters of living in a world of rapid change. Such courses fill important gaps in the lives of the people of our communities."

** PREGNANT WOMEN AND TRANQUILIZERS **

Pregnant women in their first trimester should "almost always" avoid taking such tranquilizers as meprobamates (Miltown, Equanil, etc.) and benzodiazepine (Librium, Valium, etc.) even though there is still no conclusive evidence that they cause cleft palate or other birth defects.

* DANGEROUS HERBS *

Herb aficionados beware: the herbal and spice teas you drink and the herbal cigarettes you substitute for tobacco may be a hazard to your mental health. According to Dr. Ronald K. Siegel, associate research psychologist at UCLA School of Medicine, many of these preparations sold in health food stores and by direct mail order contain considerable amounts of psychoactive or mind altering substances. Herbal teas or cigarettes containing the following ingredients should be avoided because of their possible side effects: catnip, juniper, kava kava, mandrake, nutmeg, prickly poppy, periwinkle, sassafras, scotch broom, thorn apple, wild lettuce, wormwood, and yohimbe.

** WISE EATING **

The U.S. Senate's committee on "Nutrition and Human Needs" believes current eating habits are as damaging to the nation's health as contagious diseases were 70 years ago. The committee recommends more fruit, vegetables, and grain products and less fat, salt, and sugar for the average diet.

They recommend that people: 1) reduce their fat consumption from 42% to 30% (10% saturated fats and 20% unsaturated fats); 2) that people reduce their sugar intake from 24% to 15% and 3) that people reduce their salt intake to three grams a day.

The committee supports the idea that proper nutrition will reduce heart disease and bowel cancer. People will look better, feel better, and do better with proper nutrition. They suggest labeling cafeteria food in this way:

White bread - 10¢ a slice
100 calories - junk food

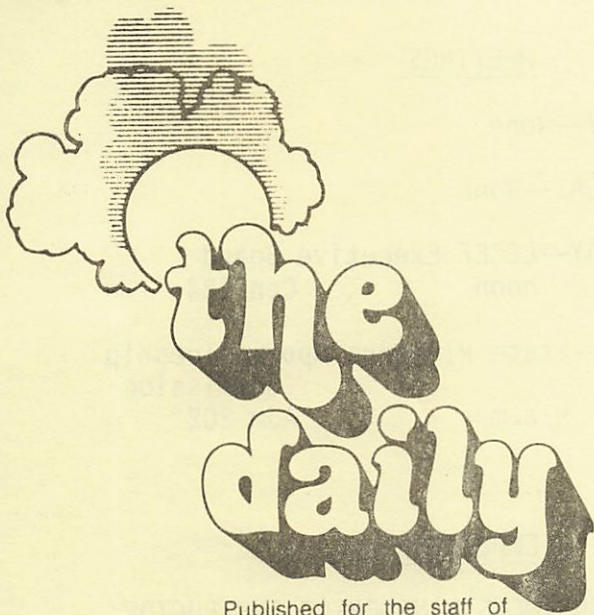
Salisbury steak - 90¢
300 calories - 20% saturated fat

Apple pie - 65¢
400 calories - junk food

Whole grain bread - 10¢ a slice
100 calories - good food

Roast chicken or fish - 80¢
300 calories - low saturated fats

Yogurt - 35¢
65 calories - good food

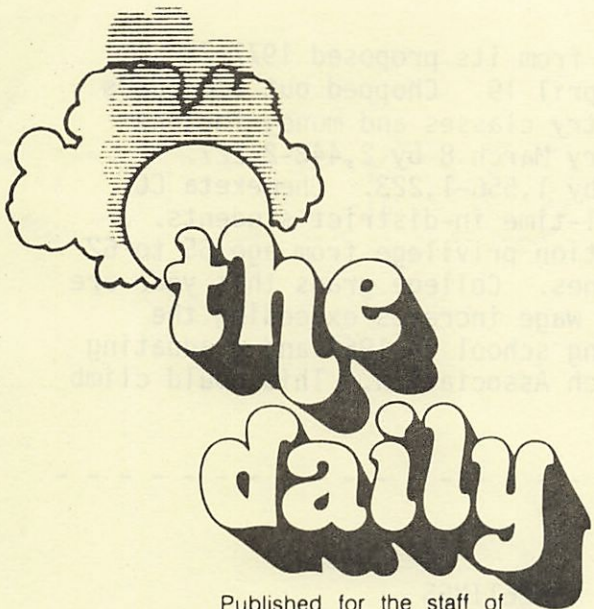

BOARD OF EDUCATION--Expected discussion over the Corporation for Public Broadcasting's audit of the KLCC failed to materialize at the Board of Education meeting last Wednesday. The College has responded to the audit which found KLCC in violation of term in the public radio grant on several counts. In its response, the College indicated agreement with some of the violations and explained its efforts to remedy the violations, and disagreed with others. President Schafer told the board it would be three weeks before CPB indicates its response to the College's answer to the audit.

In other business, Dean of Students Jack Carter told the Board enrollment is slightly below a year ago thus far for spring. He said, however, enrollment in evening credit classes has increased over winter term. The Board also accepted the resignation of Respiratory Therapy instructor Richard Lillie.

WINTER TERM HONOR ROLL--A total of 2,088 students, including 437 with perfect 4.0 averages, have been named to the winter term honor roll. Of the total, 738 are on the President's List (3.5 to 3.99) and 913 are on the Dean's List (3.0 to 3.49). Enrollment last term was about 6,800 students so about one-third of the full-time students (those carrying 10 credit hours or more) earned honor roll status. Next fall a student will have to carry 12 or more hours to be on the honor roll. Twelve hours coincides with the tuition definition of full-time.

FROM OREGON COLLEGES--Central Oregon CC has cut \$49,000 from its proposed 1977-78 budget levy in preparation for a second levy election April 19. Chopped out are funds for paved parking lots, sabbatical leaves, night chemistry classes and money for one career planning instructor. COCC lost its first levy try March 8 by 2,448-2,227. Treasure Valley CC won a levy on its first try March 8 by 1,556-1,223. Chemeketa CC has raised tuition for next year to \$130 a term for full-time in-district students. Linn-Benton CC directors declined to lower the free-tuition privilege from age 65 to 62 and refused to allow culinary arts students to taste wines. College grads this year are expected to find 16 percent more jobs than last June at wage increases exceeding the inflation rate. Public school costs for a child entering school in 1964 and graduating in 1976 was \$10,845, according to the Oregon Tax Research Association. This could climb to \$35,830 for 1988 graduates.

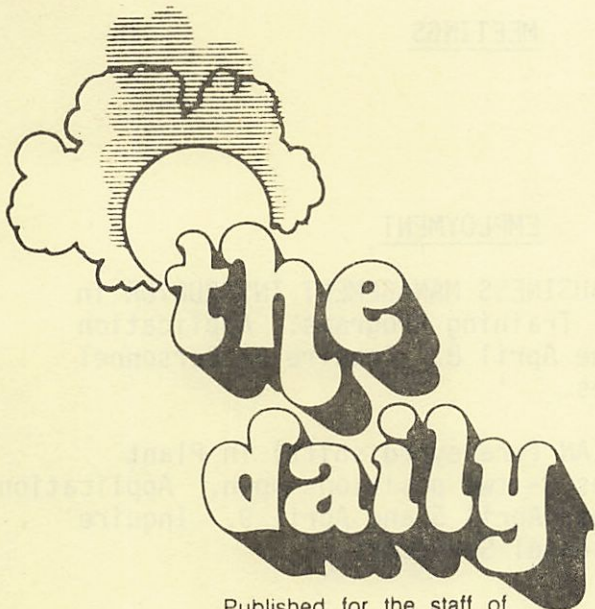

The president of Eastern Oregon State College wants Blue Mountain CC to withdraw its request for an ADN program so that EOSC can have a four-year nursing program; but, BMCC is saying, "no way." The Klamath Falls newspaper says that giving OIT a local board of education would "downgrade" it to the level of a community college. The Ontario paper says that people are accepting a 200 percent increase in the cost of fuel and energy, while griping about a 20 percent increase in the cost of education.
