RECAP--Dean of Students Jack Carter says it now appears that LCC will generate 7,350 FTE students this year. That's 147 fewer than last year, a 1.9 percent decrease. And it's 283 fewer than this year's budget was built upon, a 3.7 percent drop. The cost of this unrealized FTE is about \$283,000. This means that the College must underspend by that amount to make this year's budget come out even. As for next year, LCC is budgeting for 7,633. We'll need about 300 more FTE to make the goal, about a 4 percent increase. Prospects are for a greater influx than usual of June high school graduates. And Lane County is growing about 4 percent a year.
