



BOARD OF EDUCATION--In a five-minute session prior to the Budget Committee meeting last night, the Board approved the hiring of Jim Dunne as Head of the Mass Communications Department, and named John Wilson as the Director of Records Management Services. Dunne comes from Washington State University in Pullman where he is an instructor and has served as the town mayor. He will take over July 1. Wilson has been at LCC since 1975 as a programmer in Data Processing. He took over May 1.

BUDGET COMMITTEE--The 14-member Budget Committee got its first look at the \$14.9 million proposed general fund budget for the 1977-78 fiscal year last night. The Committee indicated it hoped to make a decision on the proposal at its next session May 11. No tax levy in excess of the tax base will be needed to support the budget as the tax base passed last November will provide adequate tax support. The proposed budget represents the lowest (6.65 percent) increase the College has had in the past five years. In his budget statement, President Eldon Schafer said the budget will provide instruction for 7,633 full-time equivalent students or about 300 more FTE than are attending LCC currently. Personnel salaries and benefits are budgeted at the current level in the proposed document. At the completion of the negotiations process, funds will be reallocated from the proposed budget to fund the contract settlements.

BROWN BAG FORUM--Dr. Khalid Babaa of San Francisco, information officers for the Arab League, will speak on "The Arab-Israeli Confrontation" in the Board room at noon on Wednesday, May 18. He will be on campus as the guest of Social Science Chairman Paul Malm. Paul describes Babaa as a politically moderate, highly articulate speaker.

BIRD NESTING POLICY--This new policy has been included in the Business Operations Manual: "Nesting places on the north and south ends of the Center Building, the cooling tower of the Physical Education facility, and other locations will not be disturbed during the time the birds are nesting. Other nesting areas that do not affect access to the structures, obstruct mechanical systems, or prevent planned maintenance to the buildings will be left undisturbed. Nests constructed above entry ways or other areas that create a hazard to pedestrian traffic will be removed, as well as those obstructing mechanical systems or planned maintenance. Nest removal, if required, is under the direction of the Director of Plant Services."



FROM OREGON NEWSPAPERS--Mt. Hood CC's April 19 election defeat was its fifth in a row over two years. President Stephen Nicholson says there are no more places to cut the budget. "We cut everythink out last year." Board Chairman Rick Gustafson (a legislator) says the College will hold a June election and, if that loses, may quit trying this year. "Optimism is scarce," he said, "it's really demoralizing." The Gresham Outlook editorially supports the college but suggests that some voters resent real or imagined overbuilding in earlier years, insufficient emphasis on tech-voc courses, overemphasis on athletics, "sumptuous" new swimming facilities, scholarships to out-of-district students, and supposed plans to become a four-year school. ...One problem that Mt. Hood shares with other colleges is government-mandated increases in fixed costs. The Outlook reports that Mt. Hood must increase its present retirement contribution to PERS from \$561,250 to \$931,233 by 1981. The difference could support 357 FTE students. Nine Mt. Hood departments have budgets of less than \$500,000. "Which department," asks the paper, "should MHCC eliminate to take care of the retirement program mandated by the state?" The Outlook's editorial answer is that, "If the legislature wants to impose new burdens, perhaps they should provide the money to pay the freight."

FROM OREGON NEWSPAPERS--Clatsop CC at Astoria has signed a 2-year contract with its faculty. Teachers get a 2 percent increase in base pay in September and another 4 percent in April 1978. The second year of the contract calls for a 6 percent hike. The new pact increases base pay from this year's \$8,894 to \$9,994 in 1978-79.... In a bylined column in the May 6 Oregonian, Steve Jenning swipes at community colleges for alleged "less than rigorous" enforcement of the in-state, out-of-state tuition assessments. And he says that "Duplication of course offerings at the university and community college levels also undermines higher education's attempts to pay its own way."
