SPECIAL BOARD MEETING--After 2 p.m. Friday Board Chairman Jim Martin called a special Board of Education meeting for 6:30 p.m. Sunday to discuss the work study program. Up to \$15,000 may be transferred from the Contingency Fund to fund their pay. As a result, work study students may work the rest of this week and finals week as they were scheduled to do.

BOARD REPORT--The LCC Board of Education unanimously approved the 1977-78 budget last Wednesday after a brief public hearing. No levy outside the six percent limitation will be needed, however, as the tax base and other revenue sources are adequate to support the \$24 million total budget. In other business, the Board received a report from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting indicating that KLCC-FM didn't receive some \$28,000 in funds for which it was eligible and must pay back about \$6,000 in already received funds. Those adjustments came as a result of KLCC not meeting CPB requirement during a portion of the year. The Board also tabled a motion to voluntarily recognize the high school completion and adult basic education teachers as members of the LCC Education Association, approved the establishment of the on line computer registration procedure for use next year, and approved the appointment of Jack Powell as the new Language Arts Department Head.
