BOARD MEETING - In case you missed media reports on last Wednesday's Board of Education meeting at Florence: It appears that the boathouse at Christensen's Resort near Canby will be adequate for LCC's instructional purposes. The Administration is to look for non-College funds for possibly fixing up the old store building for use as a community center....A Student Senate request for a mandatory student body fee was turned down until such time as students vote assessments upon themselves for specific activities. The ASB budget was increased by \$1,750 for office supplies and travel....KLCC-FM got \$10,848 additional funding for equipment and operating expenses....LCC will cooperate with the Eugene Public Library in seeking grants for videotape acquisitions and in sharing tapes.

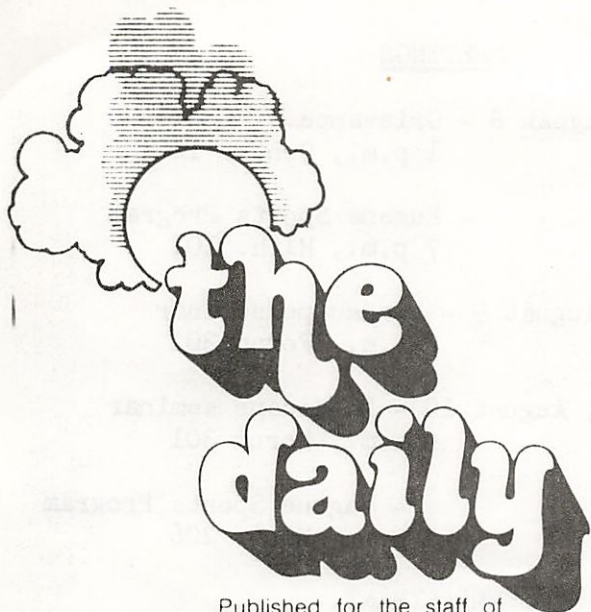

TUESDAY NIGHT - "Lost Wax Bronze Sculpture," with Bill Blix, will be aired on Channel 7 at 7:30. This is the last of the four LCC-produced art videotapes.

TUESDAY - Another round of levy elections for 18 school districts and Clackamas Community College. We're down to 35 of Oregon's 333 districts which still need levy approval. Voting Tuesday are Mapleton and Lowell. Other Lane districts will wait until September 20 to vote, including Pleasant Hill, Fern Ridge and Bethel. Clackamas CC has reduced its request from \$3.6 to \$3.2 million for tomorrow's election and appears to have much stronger community support than earlier. The college has no tax base, so will have to vote again on September 20 if it loses tomorrow.

AUGUST PAYROLL SCHEDULE - Payroll change notices must be received in the Personnel Services office by next Monday, the fifteenth, for the change to appear on payroll worksheets this month. Payroll worksheets will be cut August 19 and must be returned by August 22. Payday is August 31.

RESULTS (?) - The vote is now 8 to 7 in favor of distributing The Daily at the rate of two copies per department instead of one per employee. For the present, we'll give each department what it wants. Notify the Mailroom at extension 281 if you want to cut your number of copies.

CORRECTION - This note was received from ASLCC President Tom Ruckman: "The ASB (ASLCC) budget was not increased at the last Board meeting as reported in last week's Daily. All funding will be budgeted through the (Administration) Student Activities Office. According to the proposal adopted, any fee-funded programs would be 'housed, supervised, and budgeted under the appropriate college office,' not the ASLCC. The ASLCC treasury remains absolutely broke."

ANSWER - The following question from a staff member was answered by Dean of Business Operations Tony Birch. It's shared here because of some general interest. The ANSWER program is administered through College/Community Relations.

"My question is: What is the status of the area of woods south of the South Parking Lot? I am concerned with the lack of preservation of this area for use by LCC classes. Although LCC's property extends only 200 feet beyond the dirt road, classes involving tree identification, surveying, botany, cross country running, birdwatching and general biology use or study this area. The current effects of off-road vehicles is quickly eliminating the unique opportunities made available by this property. Couldn't there at least be some signs posted to discourage motor vehicle use? Also the old dirt road south of the South Parking Lot serves no purpose but to invite such activity. Could access to this dirt road be blocked from the South Parking Lot? I think that a few signs strategically placed where vehicles enter the woods from the road, and installed out of reach on large trees, would be a big help. Thank you for your attention."

Dean Birch's reply: "Our goal is also to preserve the woods up there in as natural a state as possible. We have attempted some ditching in the area to create barriers, but with little success. They usually go around barriers we create, which makes the problem worse. Motorcycles contribute to the problem greatly. The signs on the property to the west of the College have not kept the motorcycles off the jogging trail. Now that we have access to a large earth-moving tractor, we will attempt to create some larger barriers on the south property. A few new signs in that area will be tried also. Thank you for your interest."

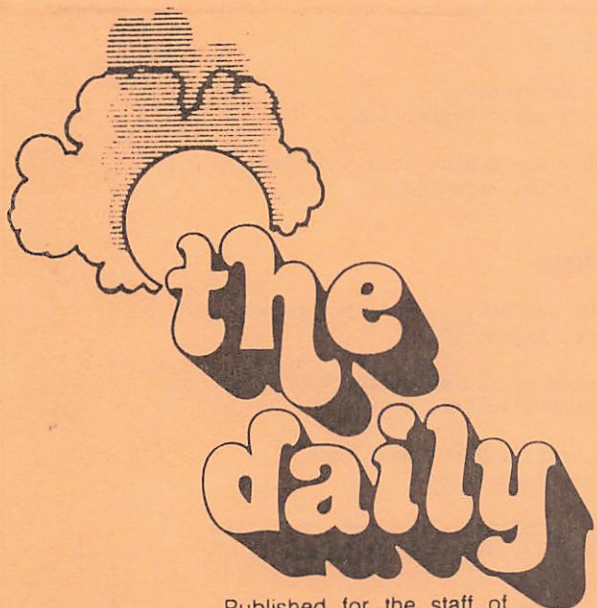

FROM OREGON NEWSPAPERS - Chemeketa CC is considering limiting the number of foreign students admitted to 30 in any one term. No more than five could be from a single country. Linn-Benton CC is said to limit foreign students to 20 a term....Clackamas CC will keep its football program. The dean of students says the college would lose \$11,000 in FTE reimbursement from the state for players enrolled in football classes....Clackamas CC's Board has approved up to 72 days of sabbatical leave for administrators....Portland CC's Board raised President Amo DeBernarsis's salary from \$42,000 to \$49,500 and approved a nine percent pay raise across the board for all other administrators....Rogue CC has approved a 6.4 percent increase for the half of its classified employees who have been with the college less than two years. Others get a 10 percent increase as scheduled in an earlier contract....Linn-Benton CC expects to have a 500-seat theatre within a year....Central Oregon CC held a Campus Day for Women to focus attention on what the college offers women.

PERFECT RECORD - All dental hygiene graduates who took the state licensing exam in June passed. It was 18 for 18; two other students moved out of state and took their exams there but their results haven't been learned yet. All 20 also passed the national dental hygiene science exam administered in March by the American Dental Association.

HARD TO GET OUT THE VOTE - While glancing at results of the June 28 school levy elections, the Oregon School Boards Association staff noticed that the Harris School District in Linn County won its election by a two-to-zero margin. Among the district residents who failed to vote was a majority of the school board.

STILL NO PROOF - Class Size and Teacher Load, published by the New England School Development Council, pulls together existing research about class size. Conclusion: "In light of the research summarized and analyzed in this review, the designation of the single optimal class size or optimal pupil/teacher ratio is without foundation in fact. The widely accepted ratio of 25 students to one teacher or to one classroom rests upon experience, intuition and practice. In empirical research, however, the number 25 has no more educational validity than do the numbers 20 or 30." 

A LETTER is still cheaper than a long distance call, according to a study by the manager of office services at Eastman Kodak. A machine-dictated letter will cost from \$1.35 to \$1.48 depending on the equipment used to type it. A 6-minute telephone call conveying the same information as the letter, made on any WATS band, will cost from \$1.75 to \$2.58. Letters written in other ways--dictated to a stenographer, written by hand, etc.--cost significantly more (\$2.61 to \$3.71) and are less economical than a WATS band call. The researcher is quick to point out that a long distance toll call (\$3.15 to \$4.37) can be considerably more expensive than any letter.
