Late registration will be conducted Monday through Thursday, September 26-29 (the first week of classes) in the lobby of the main gym from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. and on Friday, September 30 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Mail-in registration will be accepted Tuesday through Friday, September 6-9. Letters postmarked later than September 9 will be returned to senders. Those who miss their assigned registration time may register any time at subsequent sessions.

BOARD OF EDUCATION--The LCC Board of Education officially named the recently purchased Downtown Center at its meeting last night, and oddly enough, the Center will be called the LCC Downtown Center. The Board approved acceptance of a \$1 million Economic Development Administration grant which will go toward construction of phase one of the physical education building addition. The 20,000 square foot building will house weight and combative activity areas, office space and classrooms. The project is expected to cost nearly \$1,095,000 and construction will begin Nov. 30. The Board also heard a report that some 38 CETA employees will be terminated Sept. 30 since CETA funding has not been reallocated for the positions. And Lester Zook of Springfield and Richard Charters of Eugene were appointed to the LCC budget committee, and Tom Lichty was appointed to the KLCC advisory committee.
