WE'RE "IN"--A survey of American adults by the Gallup Organization shows that 49 percent of adults would list personal improvement or enrichment as the main reason for going back to school, if they chose to do so. A plurality of those polled -- 39 percent -- viewed community colleges as a place to get good quality college instruction at a reasonable cost. When asked what kind of college they most likely would attend if they went back to school, 27 percent said a vocational-technical school, 25 percent mentioned a four-year college, and 21 percent said they would attend a community college. Only four percent indicated they would most likely return to college to take classes leading to a bachelor's degree. The nationwide poll included interviews with 1,526 persons 18 and older.

FROM OREGON NEWSPAPERS--Linn-Benton CC expected 5,000 of the 7,000 students enrolled fall term to change at least one class on their schedules....Southwestern Oregon CC is fighting termites in two campus buildings....The oldsters carried the day in Clackamas CC's August levy win. Two-thirds of the voters were over 40 and half were over 50. More people over 75 voted than those in the 18-20 range. Proportionately more Republicans were in the 18 percent turnout than Democrats....Umpqua CC has bought a \$185,000 computer which it has nicknamed "Clancey."...Chemeketa CC faculty has agreed to settle for about 9 percent in step raises and fringes....Southwestern Oregon CC sees a 5 percent drop in enrollment this year.
