**WE'VE ALWAYS KNOWN IT WAS SO**--Two English professors in Chicago have concluded that fancy words make for better grades. The profs said they took a basically well-written paper and changed the language (but not the content) to come up with two different versions--one written in straightforward language and the other loaded with verbosity and pedantic terminology. They submitted the two papers to nine high school teachers. The verbose papers were given nearly perfect scores but the straightforward essays were downgraded as too simple and shallow. The professors then submitted the same two papers to 90 more teachers and came up with similar results. Three out of four high school teachers and two out of three college professors gave higher marks to pompous writing. The totality of which provides confirmatory data relevant to the proposition that the majority of didactic individuals are prodigiously pressurized with thermally agitated oxygen. --"Prevention" Magazine, Nov. 1977

# GERMS OF INTEREST

from Student Health Services

**\*\* THIS COULD BE US \*\***

In 1973, hundreds of thousands of Americans died prematurely from causes primarily related to their life style (this term refers only to behavior affecting health). Consider the following:

757,075	deaths from heart disease
115,821	" " accidents
33,350	" " cirrhosis of the liver
25,118	" " suicide
20,465	" " homicide

In the same year, death rates for men were 1,073 per 100,000 and for women, 814 per 100,000.

Life style was an important factor in this difference. Also in 1973, 13,215 children under age 15 died from accidents or homicide.

It is estimated that \$11.5 billion are spent annually in the United States for health care costs associated with smoking. When both parents smoke, children are twice as likely to get pneumonia or bronchitis in their first year of life as when neither parent smokes.

An estimated 9 million Americans are alcoholics or problem drinkers. Drinking among teenagers is now nearly universal and 36% of high school students report getting drunk at least four times a year. Dr. James McGowan, of St. Vincent's Hospital in New York City, reports a 1970 study at the hospital showed as many as 50% of the patients admitted were being treated for illnesses related to alcohol though none had been diagnosed primarily as an alcoholic.

The relationship among death rates, health status, and life style is becoming increasingly clear. Yet individual behavior changes in response to this information have been slow. Smoking, overeating, excessive drinking and unfastened seat belts are still common facts of American life. (From Promoting Health, a report of the task force on Consumer Health Education, Anne R. Sommers, Aspen Publications, 1976.)

## **\*\* FLU IMMUNIZATION RECOMMENDATION \*\***

Influenza shots are recommended this year for persons over age 60, or those who have chronic diseases e.g. emphysema, heart problems, etc. The shots (a combination of A-Victoria and Hong Kong strains) will be available at the Lane County Health and Social Services Department every Wednesday for \$5.00. Persons under age 60 will require a prescription for the shot from their physician.

BRRRRR--If things went well in the boiler room in the last 24 hours, this story will explain why you were cold yesterday. If things didn't go well, it will explain why you're still cold. A chat with electrician Darrel Allyn revealed that little is known about the specifics of yesterday's heating system failure. What is known is that the heating system storage tanks, which were supposed to be full of 60,000 gallons of 210° water yesterday morning, were instead full of 60,000 gallons of 110° water. Allyn speculates that the weekend cold spell probably fouled up estimates on targeting the amount of electricity necessary to maintain minimal building temperature and still heat the stored water. To correct the error, he says, the target amount was increased, allowing a higher demand on the system which, if you're warm, worked, and if you're cold, didn't.

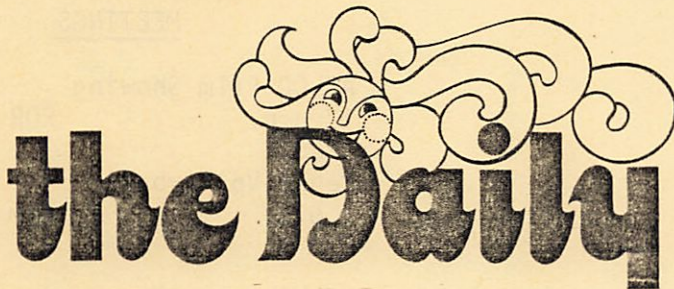

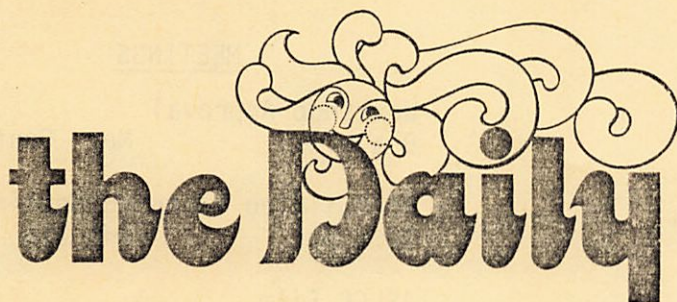

**COLLEGE, LCCEA SIGN AGREEMENT**--Late last Wednesday, President Schafer and Joe Kremers, LCCEA president, signed a memo of interim agreement with regard to the insurance deduction from faculty pay. The agreement states that, beginning with the November paycheck, the College will cease deducting the added cost (over last year's) for employees' (not dependents) health insurance. As agreed to with the classified staff, the faculty will settle (either paying the College the insurance increase or receiving reimbursement for the deductions thus far) after negotiations are completed.

**CHANGES**--The fall term enrollment report from the Institutional Research office indicates that LCC's credit student body has shifted from a large majority of men to a slight majority of women. Three years ago, credit students were 58 percent men; this term we have 51 percent women. And the average age of our credit students is dropping, from the mid to low twenties. The age range this term is 15 to 78, with 2 percent under 18, 63 percent from 18-24, 20 percent from 25-29, 13 percent from 30-50, and 2 percent 60 and over. Other figures remain about the same as in past years. Some 80 percent of credit students are in first year programs; 41 percent are first time students; 94 percent are in-district residents; 99 percent are Oregonians, and 95 percent are Caucasians. The typical full-time load is 12 credits; the typical part-time load is 3 credits. The large enrollment credit departments (in order) continue to be: 1) Business, 2) Social Science, 3) Mechanics, 4) Mathematics, 5) Language Arts, and 6) Science. The six produce about half of the college's FTE reimbursement. Fall term headcount in credit programs is 6,993. Non-credit headcount isn't available yet, but it is expected to be about 7,000.
