TONIGHT--The LCC yocal and instrumental Jazz Ensembles will present a free concert at 8 o'clock tonight in the Performing Arts Theatre. FIRE-FILLED FRIDAY--Two fires within minutes of one another resulted in alarms and fire crews on campus Friday. A motorcycle slipped on the driveway from the west parking lot and fell on its side causing the first fire. The motorcycle, which was owned by an unidentified student, was a total loss, although no one was injured in the accident. As the Goshen Fire Department was responding to the motorcycle fire, a second alarm was sounded in the Apprenticeship Annex (the portables to the south of the Apprenticeship Building). That fire evidently started in the west portable around ll:30 a.m. The two students in the building got help and an unsuccessful attempt to extinguish the fire was made. Goshen was joined by the Creswell, Pleasant Hill, Springfield and Eugene Fire Departments in fighting the fire, which was out shortly after noon. Dean of Business Operations Tony Birch says it is too early to estimate damage to the building, although it will be under \$10,000. The loss is insured. The fire damaged a counter, cabinet, and roof of the structure. Windows were broken to gain entry and clear out the smoke. The cause of the fire is under investigation but early reports indicate it may have been caused by spontaneous combustion.

SEVEN WAYS OF PLAYING SAFE . . . WITH HOLIDAY CANDLES

It wouldn't be a holiday season without candles. But keep safety as well as romance in mind! The National Candle Association would like to share some tips:

A candle is an open flame . . . treat it with respect. When you light the decorative candles in your home this holiday season, remember:

- * When self-starting candles are used (these are usually round shaped and pillar shaped), they should be burned in a holder or container which will give them good support and catch drippings if there are any.
- * Candles should be burned so that they are not in a direct line with drafts from open windows, warm-air heating systems, or air conditioning.
- * When using candles of an inch or less in diameter (tapers, spirals slenderites, birthday candles), remember there are no completely dripless candles in all situations . . . drafts and/or very warm rooms can cause ordinary dripless candles to drip and smoke. So protect surrounding areas.
- * When candles are used with plastic candle rings or floral items or other decorations, extinguish the flame when the candle(s) burns down to three inches.
- * Never burn candles in the middle of or in conjunction with a dried flower arrangement . . . or cut pine, balsa, or holly. Candles can be burned in these settings if a hurricane-type shade covers the candle or if the candle is contained within a glass. Do not allow the flowers to touch the glass. For even greater safety, arrangements of this type can be set in a fire place with the damper open.
- * If there are young children or pets in the home, do not place candles on low tables where they can be knocked over or where the flame or hot wax can burn inquisitive little fingers.

GOOD NEWS IN TIME FOR CHRISTMAS--Members of the classified employees union agreed to ratify the 1977-80 working agreement at an afternoon session yesterday. The vote was 163 to 13. It is anticipated the agreement will be ratified by the Board of Education at its Dec. 14 session. Some highlights of the agreement include: a 6 percent cost of living increase for all classified employees; step increases for eligible employees (separate from the cost of living increase); and a three year contract with a cost of living increase of 6 percent the second year and a reopening of negotiations the third year on salaries, the salary schedule and insurance coverage. The agreement is retroactive to July 1, 1977, and the retroactive salary and insurance payments will be made on the Dec. 22 paycheck. One down two to go...

TONIGHT--LCC's annual free Christmas Concert will be at 8 o'clock tonight in the Performing Arts Theatre. (Under a new policy of the LCC Performing Arts Department, children under six years of age are not allowed in the theatre for concerts or plays.)

BROWN BAG FORUM--President Schafer will discuss some of the ways that LCC has stretched the dollar in the last couple of years on Monday at noon in the Board Room. It's a repeat of a slide-illustrated presentation which he delivered in recent weeks on both the east and west coasts. It concerns some of the things, such as energy management, that we take for granted but which are envied by other community college people around the country. Come and find some of the reasons why LCC's national reputation continues to grow.

COURSE APPLICATIONS DEADLINE--The deadline for applications for new courses, revised courses, or program revisions for implementation spring term is Wednesday, Jan. 4. COUNTING UP--The state's community colleges enrolled about 1 percent more students fall term than they did a year ago, according to the State Department of Education. The FTE is 14,648 and that could represent around 100,000 students. Lower division enrollment is off 2 percent, but voc-tech enrollment is up 4 percent. LCC has an enrollment second only to Portland CC, as has been the case since our first year of operation. The other colleges, in order of size, are: 3) Mt. Hood, 4) Chemeketa, 5) Linn-Benton, 6) Clackamas, 7) Umpqua, 8) Rogue, 9) Southwestern, 10) Central Oregon, 11) Blue Mountain, 12) Clatsop, and 13) Treasure Valley. The top three generate 55 percent of the state's enrollment.

KLCC JOINS CONSORTIUM--KLCC is a member of a new organization, the Non-Commercial Radio Consortium of Oregon. During a Dec. 2 meeting in Salem, 13 of Oregon's 17 non-commercial radio stations established the need for such a statewide consortium. A sub-group then agreed upon the following goals and purposes: 1) facilitate program exchange and development, 2) represent the common interests, 3) act as an information-sharing agency, 4) sponsor professional development seminar, and 5) encourage the extension of the audience for non-commercial radio in Oregon. The establishment of the organization is the result of both a recommendation of the 1976 Telecommunications Advisory Committee and a priority task for the present committee. The Oregon Educational Coordinating Commission is assisting in the establishment of the consortium. KLCC Station Manager Tim McCartney represented LCC at the Dec. 2 meeting as well as an earlier planning session.
