WELCOME BACK--The freezing rain didn't deter staff and students from returning to campus for the start of winter term yesterday. Late registration continues through Friday for those students wishing to enroll in winter term classes.

HONOR ROLL--A total of 1,837 students, including 327 with perfect 4.0 averages, were named to the fall term honor roll at LCC. Of the total, 667 are on the President's List (3.5 to 3.99) and 843 are on the Dean's List (3.0 to 3.49). Fall term's honor roll is the first such listing in recent years where the number of students named dropped from the previous year. In fall of 1976, 1,976 students were named to the honor roll -- 139 more than this fall.

STILL NO SETTLEMENT--The LCC Board of Education officially accepted the factfinder's report in the contract negotiations with the college faculty at the Board's Dec. 19 meeting. But the LCC Education Association announced that it had voted to reject the factfinder's recommendation by a count of 157 to 45. LCCEA president Joe Kremers said parts of the report were acceptable but some important items were not. He said the teachers were especially upset with the second year salary formula. Negotiations between the two groups are expected to reopen in the near future.

THANKS TO YOU IT'S WORKING--The LCC United Way campaign was a partial success, according to Mark Rocchio. We raised the same monies as last year's campaign with both bargaining units without contracts during the campaign. We had fewer givers but those who gave pledged more than last year. Two hundred eighty-four people gave \$7,812 in 1976 (\$2,440 from management, \$1,752 from classified, \$3,620 from faculty) compared with 252 people contributing \$7,885 this year (\$1,915 from management, \$2,260 from classified, \$3,710 from faculty). George Alvergue, Bob Way, Mike Convey, and Eva Ashenhurst did a marvelous job considering our non-contracted condition, Mark says.

TAKING HEAT--"The Plant Services staff has requested that all the 'heat' directed at them due to the recent cold buildings situation please be returned to the heating system for reuse. Joking aside, the recent inconveniences are most regretted though apparently not totally avoidable. One heating boiler has a large leak which causes the chemicals in the heating system to dilute to such an extent that the electricity in the boiler won't produce heat. The other boiler has had mechanical problems with the device that raises and lowers the shield inside the boiler. The problem has now been fixed, at least temporarily. In any case, staff should dress warmly and hope these and some other related problems soon are brought under control. Your patience has been most appreciated."

** LUNG CANCER EPIDEMIC **

Now that the day of the American Cancer Society's Great American Smoke-Out has come and gone (Thursday, November 17, 1977) with it's challenge to not smoke for that one day, it is time to note we are in the midst of a declared epidemic of lung cancer in the United States. Professor Bernard M. Kramer, Department of Psychology, University of Massachusetts at Boston, states, "Convincing evidence has long been available to demonstrate that cigarette smoking contributes a great deal to preventable death and disability. Smokers and nonsmokers are aware of this fact and support action to reduce cigarette consumption in themselves and in the public at large. This support acts as the foundation for federal and state actions already taken to reduce smoking. And, indeed, cigarette smoking has declined since the mid-1960s. At the same time, however, ominous signs tell us that all is not well:

* A very large minority of the adult population still smokes.

* The absolute number of smokers has increased.

* The proportion of heavy smokers has increased among the

smoking population.

* Most ominously, too, smoking among teen-aged women has risen to about the same level as found among teen-aged men. Taking this into account, the American Cancer Society's Task Force on Tobacco and Cancer has placed a high priority on efforts to reduce smoking among teen-aged women.

In sum, the, the paradox is that in spite of the available scientific information and in spite of widespread public awareness the public health movement has been unable to move beyond the incremental reductions characteristic of the 1960s and '70s." Maybe each one who made good on a resolution to not smoke for one day can extend the resolution to an extended time.

** PAIN TREATMENT **

The Portland Pain Center, under the direction of Dr. Joel Seres, offers patients with chronic pain an alternative to surgery. Treatment is provided during a two to three week stay at Portland's Emanuel Hospital. Since the center opened, over 1000 patients, all of whom must be referred by their personal physicians, have been treated. Most patients are injured workmen. The goal is to help patients live as normal a life as their condition will allow without the need for analgesic medications and over-use of medical resources.

BOARD MEETS TONIGHT--It could be a relatively short meeting, although the practice has been that short meetings sometimes take longer. The big item could be the 1976-77 audit and its implications for this and next year. In a nutshell, we should be all right this year in spite of an enrollment drop that could cost us \$240,000 and salary increases in excess of what was budgeted. But, next year could be another story unless some money is found to carry over and more tax money is approved. Other items on the agenda: upgrading of computer system; reports on facilities work, foodservices, repair of fire-damaged portable; bid award on college catalog; budget preparation calendar; advisory committee appointments. The meeting starts at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room.

RATIFICATION VOTE TODAY--All faculty are invited to attend a union meeting in Forum 301-2 at 4 p.m. today to hear a presentation on the tentative contract agreement. A ratification vote will follow. Faculty and Administration bargaining teams reached tentative agreement in a nine-hour mediation session Monday night and into Tuesday morning. Personnel Director Hank Douda characterized both sides afterward as "equally happy and equally disgruntled." The tentative agreement, which may be considered by the Board of Education tonight, gives the faculty about one percent (perhaps \$40,000) additional pay to divvy up next year beyond the factfinder's recommendation. The personal development leave fund goes up \$1,000 and teachers can decide for themselves whether they want to be paid over 10 or 12 months. Improvements in the dental program will be delayed until March 1 and there would be no retroactive pay for those who left the college's employ prior to contract settlement.

COMING YOUR WAY--LCC's mobile classroom is expected to be on the road this week, according to Facilitator/Driver Barbara Stout of Special Training Programs. The bus will serve the outlying communities of Blue River, Leaburg, Marcola and Oakridge, offering both credit and non-credit classes. It will make available a wide variety of information on programs and activities concerning LCC. The unit will feature four video viewing carrels, two typewriters, a calculating machine and a CB unit. The bus has its own 1500 watt gasoline-powered generator. Students will have access to 1200 audio and video programs from the Information Retrieval System. Non-credit programs include Adult Basic Education and HELPS for Homemakers. Credit classes include Business, Mathematics, Science. Registration will take place on the bus when students come for the first class. Daily hours for the bus are 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

BUDGET PICTURE--The college budget looks OK for this year, Dean of Business Operations Tony Birch told the Board of Education Wednesday night. But, revenue next year could be, "very roughly," short by \$1.1 million dollars. Firmer figures should be available for the February 8 Board meeting. Meanwhile, as the college goes into the annual budget process, Board Chairman Catherine Lauris says she wants to approach the process "as if we were not going to have an election."

On the other hand, there was some good news. Probable increases in Community Education enrollment this year may partially offset the drop in credit programs enrollment. LCC won't generate the 7,633 FTE budgeted for, but we could reach 7,500 FTE. That's a drop of only 133 FTE below the budgeted amount instead of the expected 300.

And the Board approved a contract settlement with the LCCEA. The faculty voted Wednesday afternoon 151 to 3 in favor of ratification. The negotiation process took 10 months and 25 days, noted LCCEA President Joe Kremers.

The computer will get hardware to increase main memory, disk storage and tape drives. To avoid a budget increase, the computer purchase will be refinanced and paid off in 7 instead of 3 years...The boathouse at Christensen's Resort on Siltcoos Lake south of Florence has been renovated at a cost of about \$3,000 for materials. Plant Services fixed the wiring, lighting, ceiling, handrails, and put in a window and did some painting. The Science Department uses the facility almost weekly for field trips. WIDER RAMIFICATIONS--The Department of Health, Education and Welfare apparently wants to make a class action out of the civil rights complaint of Veterans Office Clerk Carol Stiles. Now on a one-year maternity leave, Ms. Stiles complained to HEW that LCC didn't cover maternity in its insurance benefits. An Oregon law requiring such coverage went into effect October 4, 1977, and LCC then added the benefit. Ms. Stiles had a baby on December 19 and thus will receive monies from the insurance carrier and the college. HEW, however, wants LCC to pay for employee pregnancies back to July 20, 1975, when it adopted regulations requiring pregnancy benefits based on Title IX legislation. It might cost LCC about \$25,000 and would set a precedent that could result in Oregon schools and colleges paying out as much as \$1 million in back benefits. College attorney Ed Harms advised the Board of Education last Wednesday night to do nothing for the present. He says HEW is applying legislation to employees which was intended only to affect students. Three federal district courts have agreed. The college, says Harms, has no legal authority to pay. He criticized HEW for "the attitude that the end justifies the means" and for an "excess of zealotry." Trying these cases represents, he said, "a staggering expense to the public."

MORE FIGURES-"Ya pays yer money and takes yer cherce." A release out of the State Department some weeks back indicated that the statewide community college enrollment is up a little this year, though Clatsop and Lane are down slightly. That had to be based on FTE figures. Now comes a release from OCCA, which talks about headcount, and it says that Fall Term enrollment at the 13 colleges was up 11½ percent. The headcount was 101,678 compared with 91,158 a year earlier. Umpqua was up almost 31 percent, Lane was up 26 percent; and Rogue was up 14 percent. The largest numerical increase was 3,134 at Portland. Treasure Valley was down 8 percent and Clatsop dropped 5 percent. Wasco Area Education District at The Dalles had 529 students; it's new this year. LCC during Fall Term is reported to have had 2,111 more individuals than a year earlier. And LCC's total headcount for the 1976-77 year was reported to be 27,441. Portland had 55,540; Chemeketa, 26,532; Clackamas, 20,494; Mt. Hood, 19,162; Linn-Benton, 16,193; Umpqua, 7,990; Central Oregon, 7,294; Southwestern, 7,254; Clatsop, 6,571; Rogue, 5,925; Blue Mountain, 4,515; Treasure Valley, 3,044.

GERMS OF INTEREST

from Student Health Services

This is the season of warm wood fires in stoves and fireplaces. Along with the dangers of fire, be alert to the problem of carbon monoxide poisoning. The Communicable Disease Summary from Oregon State Health Division for December 24, 1977 printed the following information:

CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING, PORTLAND

A six-year-old boy got up in the middle of the night because he felt nauseated and ready to vomit. His father heard a noise in the bathroom and went to find his son unconscious and unarousable on the floor. The mother then got out of bed, fainted and fell down every time she tried to stand. The father then took his wife and son to a local hospital emergency room (it was 3:55 a.m.), and he also felt nauseated. He blamed their illness on venison which they had eaten for supper. All three were admitted to the hospital for observation. Physical examination was unremarkable. All three had severe headaches and nausea but no diarrhea.

Investigation by the county sanitarian revealed additional history. Just before retiring the night before, the father had extinguished a presto-log in the fireplace with water and closed the flue. The fire had apparently continued to burn for some time afterward. All three family members sleep on the first floor. The son's room opens out into the living room where the fireplace is.

A carboxyhemoglobin level was then drawn on all three patients about 36 hours after the onset of their symptoms. Father and mother both had less than 0.5% saturation (normal for non-smokers is less than 0.8% saturation). The son, however, had 3% saturation which strengthens the diagnosis of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Editorial Comment

Carbon monoxide poisoning has very characteristic signs and symptoms which are closely correlated with blood carboxyhemoglobin (COHb) concentration:

COMb Concentration	Signs and Symptoms
Less than 10% 10-20% 20-30% 30-40%	Usually no symptoms (chronic smokers ofter live with 3-8%) Frontal headaches Severe headaches, dyspnea on exertion Very severe headaches, nausea, vomiting, weakness, dizziness, dimness of vision, possible collapse, cherry red skin and mucous membranes
40-50% 50-60% 60-70% 70% and over	Ataxia, syncope, collapse, tachycardia, tachypnea Coma, intermittent convulsions, Cheynes-Stokes respiration Deeper coma, clinical shock, possible death Cardiorespiratory collapse and death

Because of the insidious nature of the early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning and because of the unrecognizable properties of carbon monoxide gas, it is imperative that we bank our fires and tend our flues with care - then enjoy the fire!
