PROPOSALS--The Administration is studying three proposals for possible fee changes: 1) Eliminating the \$10 tuition deposit as part of the admissions process. About \$3,000 is generated each year by students who pay the deposit but don't register. But, it costs more than that to collect it; 2) Charging \$1 for adding or dropping classes after the third day of each term. Under the present free system, students add and drop for reasons often unrelated to academic needs; 3) Dropping the mileage offset against tuition for those who commute 30 miles or more. About 180 students claim the differential each year; the registrar finds it impossible to verify their claims.





BOARD PREVIEW--The Board will start the 1978-79 budget discussions with two important questions, "Do we live within the present tax base?" or "What are some alternative resource possibilities?" The final decision on whether to seek voter approval on a tax increase will be made at the April 5 meeting....Also up for discussion is the proposed administrative reorganization. DOWN WITH PROPERTY TAXES--The Community Press in Salem says that Jim Whittenburg, who is identified only as a "state lobbyist," plans to file an initiative to eliminate property taxes for retired senior citizens and deferring them for young families who are buying their first homes. To prevent overburdening those in between, he would limit property taxes to two or three percent of assessed value. Further, property taxes couldn't be increased more than two or three percent annually. He would have to get 61,646 valid signatures on petitions by July 7 to get the measure on the Nov. 7 ballot. Comment: Whittenburg doesn't offer an alternative means to raise monies to substitute for the property tax. Tuition might have to be raised out of sight. Meanwhile, he says getting the necessary signatures will be "a piece of cake."

INCREASE--The Administration is studying the possibility of a tuition raise to help fund next year's predicted cost increases. LCC presently has the highest full-time credit tuition among Oregon community colleges, a part-time rate among the lowest, and a non-credit adult education tuition rate in the middle. One of the proposals would change the part-time tuition to \$12 per credit hour up to 11 credits or \$132, change the full-time tuition from the present \$130.80 to \$132, and change adult education costs from the present \$15 per class to \$16. Percentage increases would be 10 percent for part-time, 1 percent for full-time, and 6.6 percent for adult ed. New revenue might range up to \$100,000.

MORE ON REORGANIZATION--President Schafer is soliciting input on possible reorganization in the proposed Administrative Services Division. Vice President Tony Birch would have a budget specialist and administrative assistant (as at present) and six departments: personnel services, financial services, purchasing services, support services, information services, and facilities services. The latter two are new and might involve Paul Colvin and Lewis Case, who are now in Academic and College Planning. It's all tentative at this point and discussions are continuing.

INTERESTING INTEREST - The college's investment program has reaped earnings of \$108,506 for the first half of the fiscal year. We got 6.34% on \$3.3 million. Most banks in the district at one time or another have shared the action.

VERY NICE EVENING - Social Science Prof Joe Kremers has sent notes of appreciation to Performing Arts and Foodservices for Friday night's staff party. Some 272 people attended, including five Board members. Many good comments on the food were received by Bob Tegge, and Dick Reid says PA got some nice notes about the play. Kremers says the group is talking about making the party a recurring winter social event.

WORK SAFELY - The on-the-job accident record for the period from July 1 through December 31 is "dismal", reports Bill Mansell, assistant to the dean of Business Operations. The half-year total is 41; that compares to an average of 40 per whole year over the past five years. Instruction and Business Operations have already reached their annual average accident frequency. Academic and College Planning recorded three accidents in the past six months, compared to one in the prior five years. Student Services and the President's Complex had no accidents during the first half of this fiscal year. Biggest increase: Maintenance and Grounds with 15 accidents. Sharpest decrease: Custodial and Foodservices. The accident repeater is still with us. Fourteen of the 41 accidents during the six months involved repeaters. They accounted for 38 percent of the total cost and 47 percent of the lost workdays. A bright note, however, is that there have been only 22½ lost workdays this fiscal year. The five-year average is 140 lost workdays per year.

FROM OCCA DIGEST--Linn-Benton CC will start a new dental hygiene program next year....Central Oregon CC will add an associate degree nursing program next fall....Treasure Valley CC's new programs for next fall include associate degree nursing and small business management....The State System of Higher Education will return about \$1 million to students next year through reduced fees or tuition because it collected more tuition this year than expected....Clatsop CC's LDC enrollment is down 11%....The majority of Linn-Benton CC's students voted to abolish student government, but the required 2/3 majority wasn't attained....California is trying to centralize control of its community colleges, which have 104 campuses, serve 1.3 million students and employ 35,000 faculty members and 23,000 support people. The colleges have continued to grow while state four-year schools have declined. Gov. Brown wants to cut down on what he considers adult frill courses.

BOARD MEMBER DIES--Lynn Moore, elected to the LCC Board last year, died Thursday morning at Sacred Heart Hospital of complications resulting from an abdominal aneurism. The 63-year-old Springfield lawyer was a 1937 law graduate of Willamette University. He had practiced in Springfield since 1946. He was the Democratic nominee for state senator in 1966, a past president of the Lane County Bar Association, and a member of the Rotary, Masons, IOOF, Elks, Moose and Ebbert Memorial Methodist Church. He was an avid mountain hiker and swam daily. Survivors include his wife, Mary, and three grown children. Time of the service is to be announced.

REPLACEMENT--A successor to Lynn Moore on the LCC Board of Education is expected to be named in March or April. The Board at its March 8 meeting probably will declare the Zone 3 (Springfield, Marcola and McKenzie school districts) position open and announce procedures for screening applicants for appointment. The appointee will serve through June 30, 1979. The seat will be filled by election in April 1979, with the winner taking over July 1, 1979 and serving the two-year balance of the term.

INELIGIBLE--A recent "space eligibility" document out of the State Department indicates that LCC probably won't be eligible for construction allocations in the next four years. LCC, Linn-Benton, Treasure Valley, Mt. Hood, and Blue Mountain reportedly already have enough space for present needs. Available monies probably will go to Portland, Rogue, Chemeketa, and perhaps Umpqua, Southwestern, Clackamas, Central Oregon and Clatsop.

** DOING BETTER AND FEELING WORSE **

John Hilton Knowles, M.D. is not exactly the most popular physician in the world, especially among his fellow physicians, but he means what he says - and he's saying something to all of us!

In his book, Doing Better and Feeling Worse: Health in the United States, he manages to offend many people. Liberals cry that he has forsaken them and the far right scream that he's robbing them of individual liberty. He believes that "control of the present major health problems in the U.S. depends directly on modification of individual behavior and habits of living."

He believes the first priorities in human health are the things one can do directly to preserve one's full health potential. These include maintaining a normal weight, eating a prudent diet, not drinking too much alcohol, getting some exercise and not smoking.

He believes we need massive public health education. He believes schools are not teaching as many people as adequately as they should about health.

Dr. Knowles' book is thought provoking. It just might lead one to sign up for one of our fine courses here at LCC in Personal Health or Community Health taught by one of our own health educators!

** HEALTH LEGISLATION **

The January 1978 issue of the American Journal of Nursing notes that health topics will frequently be in the headlines from Washington D.C. this spring as the 2nd session of the 95th Congress takes up the heaviest health legislation calendar in the history of the U.S. Hospital cost containment, national health insurance, emphasis on preventive care for mothers and children, health services research, funding for health grants, and a look at the Health Planning Act are some of the legislative chores.

** PRESCRIPTION DRUG ABUSE **

The Community Colleges Health Services Newsletter for February 1978 notes that street drugs are not the sole source of drug abuse. "Those handy sleeping pills (barbituates) in the family medicine cabinet are instrumental in 5000 deaths and many trips to emergency rooms each year. Most of these drugs are obtained through a physician's prescription which says something about the problems with the present system. Keeping sleeping pills 'safely' in the medicine cabinet or the drawer of the bedside stand carries the same risk as having a loaded gun in the house."
