TUITION RAISED--To generate an additional \$100,000 in revenues, the Board of Education Wednesday night raised tuition, effective Fall Term. Part-time tuition goes up 10 percent, from \$10.90 per credit hour to \$12. Full-time tuition goes up 1 percent, from \$130.80 to \$132. Adult Education classes go up 6.6 percent, from \$15 to \$16. Even with the new tuition revenue, however, next year's budget needs will be short \$1.2 million, the Board was reminded. There was talk of a possible levy on the May 23 election ballot of something in the neighborhood of \$900,000. But a decision was delayed until the April 5 meeting. In a two-hour discussion before the meeting, the Board heard the KLCC advisory group ask for more opportunity to influence decisions concerning the station. The Board said that the Administration is in charge of the station, but that more input from the advisory group should be sought.

OPPORTUNITIES--Carol Eliason, project director for the National Center for Women's Opportunities, will climax a morning of mini-celebrations honoring the expanded opportunities for women at LCC, tomorrow, with a talk on "What's Going On Around the Country in Women's Programs and How Does LCC Stack-up?" Included will be an overview of national opportunities for women which was developed from a survey taken by her office. The talk will begin at 12:15 p.m. in the Board Room. There will be an open house in the Women's Awareness Center, second floor of the Center Building, from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m., followed by "From Issue to Tissue," the theme for the restroom dedication in the Auto Technology Building at 11:30 a.m. All staff and students are welcome to attend the celebrations and the program with Eliason.

ELIGIBILITY CHECK--LCC Track & Field and Baseball teams will begin their competitive schedule over spring break. An eligibility check must be carried out on each athlete prior to competition. Duane Iversen, Athletic Eligibility Chairman, is requesting the assistance of instructors in expediting this task. Athletes will be bringing to class with them a verification sheet for current term grades. We regret the inconvenience to instructors, but it is essential that this process be completed before the first scheduled contest. Your assistance is appreciated.

REORGANIZATION--President Schafer asks input regarding a proposed reorganization plan for Student Services. Admissions would take over High School Relations, New Student Orientation, and Veterans Services. Student Activities would assume responsibility for Foodservices, Bookstore, and such Student Support programs as insurance, cultural activities, and support activities for special populations. A new office for Athletics and Intramurals would be added. Women's Programs would remain in the division for another year or two, but would eventually be absorbed elsewhere. The changes, if adopted, become effective July 1. President Schafer has stressed that the reorganization will not involve additional staff. Rather, he is looking for ways to improve services by reassignment or reorganization within the existing staff.

LOTS OF CANDIDATES--Eight persons, including 3 LCC employees, have filed for the Zone 3 seat on the LCC Board. The list includes Fran Summers, invoice clerk; Jerry Sirois, tour guide/accounting clerk; and Jane Wojcik, bookkeeper. The first two are in Financial Services; Wojcik works for Health Occupations. Other candidates: Charlene Curry, former Board member; Dan Bosch, warehouseman; Ronald Farmer, court bailiff; Alan Scott, Jr., lawyer; and Lawrence Wheeler, occupation not learned. All list Springfield addresses. The election is April 4.

DEDICATIONS NEEDN'T BE DULL--Some 40 people turned out for the "fun" ceremony Friday which officially noted the completion of seven new or remodeled restrooms for women in traditionally male voc-tech areas. Women students ripped away toilet tissue ribbons from the door to one of the new restrooms in the auto tech area. Carol Eliason, director of the Washington, DC, National Center for Women's Opportunities, snipped a wire holding a chain in place. Brief remarks were made both by Eliason and President Schafer. In a noon presentation in the Board Room, Eliason reported that a primary need of women in the educational system across the country is for more counseling and information. She said that a survey done by her office turned up fewer than 10 percent of women who had vocational testing before college or who knew enough about training programs and aid available. She advocates teaching women marketable skills for jobs with "viable" incomes. "I equate educational equity," she said, "with economic equity."



**INVESTIGATIONS**--Curt Raynes and Roger Houglum of the Electronics Department have checked out the radio signal that has Eugene buzzing. They say it's a signal that is usually used by industry and public utilities for telemetering and that it could be coming from out of state. Its strength is lower than a citizen's band radio, but it seems to be picked up by the EWEB electrical distribution system and then re-radiated. Houglum says it's so weak that it couldn't possibly have the slightest effect on the health of any individual.

**LEADERS**--Eileen Massey and Norma Stevens of the Health Occupations faculty are co-chairing the annual state meeting of the American Association of Medical Assistants. The group meets April 20-22 at Valley River Inn. About 250-300 are expected to attend. President Schafer will speak at a banquet at which Juanita Selk of Eugene, a member of the LCC MOA Advisory Committee, will be installed as state president of the group.

**MORE ON REORGANIZATION**--Three goals are sought in the possible restructuring of the Office of Instructional Operations: 1) greater effectiveness and efficiency of curriculum, instructional activities and staff development; 2) coordination of all instructional support activities in one office; and 3) creation of a team approach to instructional planning. The changes, still very tentative, would involve an administrative assistant to the vice president for instruction; that assistant would have responsibilities in research, evaluation and planning. The associate dean of instructional services (now DLR) would have a Curriculum and Staff Development Center, Media Production Center, Study Skills Center, and the LRC. The latter would include the Library, DOLLY, Information Retrieval System and Audiovisual Services. Electronics would move to Division I and athletics would move from Division A to the Student Services Division. Reorganization of the Community Education is still under study. If you have reactions to the proposed changes, contact or send a note to President Schafer.
