### \*\* SALT AND HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE \*\*

The Oregon Heart Association Newsletter for January 1978 had an interesting article entitled "Hypertension, Genetics and the SALT Connection." This was abstracted from a thesis written by Lot B. Page, M.C., Chief of Medicine at the Newton-Wellesly Hospital, in Newton Lower Falls, Massachusetts. It maintains that we in the United States could control hypertension (high blood pressure) in one generation by raising our children on a low-salt diet. "Two factors are essential for the genesis of hypertension. One is genetic susceptibility, which 15-20% of Americans have, and the other is a high salt intake." He listed many support incidents for this statement. Dr. Page concluded by saying, "The average person requires no more than 200 mg. of sodium per day, or about 1/10 of a teaspoon of salt. . . . "But the average American takes in 25 times as much salt in his regular diet. It is hard to escape the conclusion that hypertension is largely a preventable disease."

We know a local physician who once wrote to a company producing canned soup stating, "Please decrease the amount of salt that you put in your canned soups. Unless you do, we will soon become a nation of fat-ankled and high-blood-pressured people." He was right on the line, wasn't he.

### \*\* THE COST OF HEALTH \*\*

From <u>Health Values</u>, Vol. 1, #6, November-December 1977, we have a summary on "the cost of health."

- \* The National Health Bill increased from \$12 billion in 1950 to more than \$139 billion in 1976, rising from 4.5% of the Gross Nation Product to 8.5% last year.
- \* Hospital care accounted for 31% of health costs in 1950 to 40% in 1976, while drugs and sundries dropped from 22% to 19% during the same period.
- \* Government is now the biggest bill payer for health, footing 40% of the nation's health care costs, followed by direct pay by the patient (33%) and private health insurance (26%).
- \* Several indication of individual health are included in the report:
  - Infant mortality rates have steadily declined in the past 10 years for both blacks and whites.
  - A rise in violent deaths, primarily accidents, was as high for young males aged 15-24 as it was 25 years ago.
  - Hypertension is substantially more prevalent among black adults than in whites, and higher in men than in women.
  - More than 1/4 of the 12-13 year old male students and 2/3 of 18-20 year old male high school students were classified as moderate or heavy drinkers in 1975.
  - The percentage of girls and boys 17-18 years old who smoke cigarettes has irsen between 1968 and 1974.
  - The nation's poor and minorities are in poorer health than other Americans.

BOARD MEETING--THE SETTING OF a tax base election tops the agenda of the Board of Education at its 7:30 p.m. session Wednesday in ADM 216. The Administration is suggesting that voters be asked May 23 to hike the tax base by \$784,194. Less taxes not collected, that would produce an estimated \$705,775 toward next fiscal year's budget of \$16,818,840. The increase in the tax levy would be 19.9 percent, from \$5.6 to \$6.7 million. Cost per \$1,000 true cash value would go up from \$1.35 to \$1.42. For the owner of a house assessed at \$50,000 property taxes for LCC would climb \$3.50 -- from this year's \$67.50 to \$71.00 next year. Reason for the increase: Personnel and payroll expense. The Board also is being asked to set a June 27 election for the same amount of money outside the 6 percent limitation. If voters approve the tax base increase on May 23, the June 27 election would be cancelled. In other business Wednesday night, the Board will consider appointing a person to fill the Zone 3 Board position between now and June 30, and will review a number of staff reports.

BOARD ELECTION--Incumbent Catherine Lauris led the vote-getters in Tuesday's LCC election getting 61% of the vote to win the Zone 5 seat on the Board of Education. She beat John Hanks 10,751 to 6,785. Leslie Hendrickson gathered 43% of the votes in the race for the at-large seat, ousting incumbent Richard Freeman. The power of the press was demonstrated in that contest; the Register-Guard's candidate ran last. The results: Hendrickson 7,627; Freeman 4,980; Len Wassom 2,822; Bill Watkins 2,279. Former Board member Charlene Curry won the Zone 3 seat with 33% of the vote. Health Occupations Bookkeeper Jane Wojcik proved the value of name familiarity as she finished second in spite of withdrawing a day or so after filing. The results: Curry 5,512; Wojcik 3,092; Alan Scott 2,717; Lawrence Wheeler 1,896; Ron Farmer 1,544; Fran Summers 951; Dan Bosch 717; Jerry Sirois 331.

VOTING TIME--Voters at the May 23 primary election will be asked to hike LCC's tax base by \$784,194. The Board Wednesday night approved an 8 percent increase in the college budget for next year. Virtually all of that would go toward personnel costs. In terms of impact on the property tax payer, the ballot proposal would mean an increase in the tax rate per \$1,000 of true cash value from this year's \$1.35 to an estimated \$1.42 next year. The owner of a house assessed at \$50,000 would pay about an additional \$3.50 in LCC property tax for the year. On top of that would be the cost of any increase in additional assessed value. The proposed \$1.42 tax rate is a penny less than the average LCC rate over the last 11 years. It would produce about 35 percent of the college's proposed \$16.8 million budget for 1978-79. The remainder would come from state support, tuition-which the Board already has raised for next year--and miscellaneous fees, interest, and so on. The budget would accommodate a small increase in the student body, which this year includes more than 27,000 individuals. If the May 23 proposal is turned down by voters, the Board agreed to put an equal levy on the June 27 election ballot. In other business, the Board appointed Charlene Curry of Springfield to represent Zone 3 on the Board through June 30. On July 1, she begins the 3-year term which she won at Tuesday's election.

MORE ON THE BOARD MEETING--Joe Kremers, LCCEA chairman, reported that the union executive committee had rejected the factfinder's report and wishes to begin post-fact finding mediation. Personnel Director Hank Douda, contacted Thursday, said the fact finder apparently recommended less than what the 4 dozen Adult Basic Education-High School Completion teachers hoped for. The fact finder favored continuation of pay by the hour instead of contracts, suggested only a small workload cut, and recommended prorated rather than full health insurance coverage. The two sides will be getting together to search for a compromise position. In other business, the Board approved a one-year leave without pay for Ted Romoser, Language Arts, who becomes president of the Oregon Education Association on July 1; and accepted the resignation of Helen Haynie, President's secretary, effective April 20.



ELECTED--Ken Hills, director of Counseling, has been elected vice president elect post secondary of the American School Counselor Association.

COLLEGE VISITATION--Representatives from Willamette University will be on campus tomorrow from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the cafeteria.

FROM OCCA DIGEST--Funding election results show Clackamas, Clatsop and Chemeketa winning and Umpqua and Blue Mountain losing. Clackamas won a rate-based serial levy, which means they won't have to vote again until 1981. Six colleges will vote May 23: Central Oregon, Mt. Hood, Southwestern, Blue Mountain, Umpqua, and Lane. All except SWOCC and LCC will be voting for the second time this year....Blue Mountain's faculty and Board have concluded bargaining which provides for pay hikes of 6% this year, 7% next year, and a cost of living adjustment not to exceed 9% in the third year....Beginning July 1, contributions by community colleges to the state Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) will increase to 8.75% of the employees gross salary from the present 7.60 percent. And, as of July 1 of each succeeding year, the contribution rate will go up .9 percent to an ultimate rate of 11.44 percent from July 1, 1981 through the year 2005. This is the result of changes in the rate made by the 1977 Legistative Assembly to keep the system solvent. It will of course cause a significant rise in "fixed costs," as did the Social Security contributions mandated by the Congress last year.

COPYRIGHT INFO--Several months ago Librarian Don Ownbey ask for space in the Daily to help simplify the new copyright laws which became effective January 1, 1978. Here is his intoductory statement concerning the law and its interpretation.

The new copyright law has created a great deal of uncertainty as to what can be copied and what cannot be copied. The new law, effective January 1, 1978, has already had its influence at LCC--the Printshop and Word Processing have had to refuse jobs because of possible copyright violations, the Library is putting only one copy of a copyrighted article on reserve, and Library copy machines now have disclaimer notices on them. We will be putting information in the Daily periodically and if anyone has a question about copyright, please send them to Don Ownbey in the Library. Keep in mind that definitive answers may not always be possible since the law contains many ambiguities.

We have a limited number of copies of the <u>Guidelines for 'Fair Use'</u>. These guidelines are <u>not</u> the law itself but an agreement which came out of Congressional hearings and are designed to assist in compliance with the law. FACULTY COUNCIL--A reminder that all staff are invited to a presentation by Dr. Schafer on "The Role of the Community College in the 1980's", this afternoon at 3 p.m. in the President's Dining Room.

FROM OCCA DIGEST--Voting on funding issues May 23, with LCC, are Mt. Hood, Central Oregon, Umpqua, Blue Mountain and Southwestern Oregon. Treasure Valley, Clatsop, Chemeketa and Clackamas have already passed levies. Portland, Linn-Benton and Rogue have tax bases sufficient to meet next year's needs...The OCCA salary study lists the average full-time faculty member's salary at \$17,006. This is based on 1,545 full-time faculty salaries, the lowest being \$9,070 and the highest \$26,232....Clackamas and Portland report declining enrollment this spring. Portland's budget will drop from this year's \$25.1 million to \$24.3 million next year to support 12,240 FTE students. They will cut part-time teachers and clerical people. PCC's personnel expenditures amount to 82.5% of the budget, compared to 76 at LCC....Chemeketa held a high school journalism workshop with Charles Kuralt of CBS Evening News (the "On The Road" host) as guest speaker.

LCC DISTRICT GROWING--Apparently the College District is seeking new horizons according to Jean Shaffer, Admissions supervisor. The Admissions Office regularly sends catalog information and admissions applications to local high school students who tour the campus through the high school relations program. High school relations specialist Jolene Bowers says she stays "pretty much" within the district in recruiting; however, one request recently turned over to Admissions by Jolene from a "local" tour group listed a Newark, Delaware return address.

NEW STAFF--Lynn Jones is the new coordinator/instructor of the Farm Business Management Program at LCC. He succeeds Rod Rood who resigned to take a position in Washington state. The Farm Business Management program is available to area farmers and ranchers, and is offered through the Special Training Programs Department.

FUTURE FARMERS--LCC's Agricultural & Industrial Equipment program hosted a shop skills contest for the Upper Willamette District of the Future Farmers of America yesterday in the agricultural area of the Machine Technology Building. Five high schools participated in the nine-category contest. The first place award in the overall competition went to Lebanon High School; second place, South Albany; third place, Creswell; fourth, West Albany; and fifth place went to Scio. FIDDLER--"Fiddler on the Roof" opens tonight in the Performing Arts Theatre to a full house. Directed by Ed Ragozzino, the eight-night run, has been sold out for several weeks. The Performing Arts Department has scheduled a virtual "rerun" of the production July 7,8 and 10-15, when Ed Ragozzino will direct "Fiddler" with essentially the same cast of performers for Summer Theatre '78 at Lane. The box office for the summer production will open June 12 for LCC staff and June 19 to the general public. If you missed a chance to see the spring production plan to get your tickets early for the summer show.

MORE FROM OCCA DIGEST--A third federal judge has ruled that Title IX applies only to students. In Portland, Maine, a district court judge ruled that pregnant teachers weren't due paid sick leave. Two federal judges in Michigan and Seattle earlier issued the same ruling. HEW says it will appeal all three adverse decisions....The Oregon Court of Appeals upheld the decision of a Douglas County judge who had ruled that Umpqua CC had immunity in a suit alleging that the college had misled a student. The student took some welding courses and alleged that the catalog had led him to believe that this would make him a welder. The jury agreed and awarded the student \$12,500. But the judge overruled the verdict on the grounds that the Oregon Tort Claims Act makes the college immune from such suits. Also, the Appeals Court noted that the catalog made it clear that those taking the program had to take all, not just some, of the required classes.

IN THE NEWS--Pat Freeman, coordinator for the Central Area Outreach program, was a panelist at the Spring Conference of the Oregon Community Education Association last week. Topic of discussion was community schools/community college cooperation. The theme for the conference was "Beyond Competition." Laird Prouty, son of LCC Oakridge representative Gyneth Prouty, was named President-Elect of the Association at the conference.
