MORE ON COPYRIGHTS--prepared by Librarian Don Ownbey, ext. 211.

FAIR USE: Fair use involves the production of copyrighted materials for purposes such criticism, comment, news reporting, teaching (includes multiple copies for classroom use), scholarship, or research. There are four criteria to be considered in determining fair use.

- 1. Purpose and character of the use, including whether such use is of a commercial use or is for nonprofit educational purposes. This criterion also includes whether or not the use is "spontaneous" and at the volition of the teacher, not at the direction of the administration.
- 2. The nature of the copyrighted work. A news article from a current newspaper or a portion of a book would be judged differently from the score of a musical composition, a textbook, a 'consumable' such as a workbook, or a motion picture.
- 3. The amount and substantially of the portion used in relation to the copyrighted work as a whole. This allows copying of extracts or portions but not multiple copies of the same work on a repetitive basis or for continued use.
- 4. The effect of the use upon the potential market for or value of the copyrighted work. Be careful if there is a fee or charge for copied materials.

All four factors must be considered together, although it is generally conceded that the last criterion is the most important consideration. There will be more information later about such phrases as multiple copies for classroom use', 'spontaneity', and 'amount and substantiality of the portion' (referred to in guidelines as brevity).

Fair use implies that there is a limitation on the exclusive right of copyright and that there will be some copying permitted. The concern of the law is not in the copying but in the abuse of the privilege.

SOLAR GRANT--LCC is among 9 League for Innovation districts which will be part of a \$95,000 federal grant to provide training for faculty members in selected occupational/technical areas in skills and knowledge related to solar energy systems installation.

EVENING COLLEGE--Dean Rasmussen reports that the evening college is slowly growing. Some 13% of credit sections are offered in the evening; 17% of all credit courses offered are in the evening; 6% of the credit FTE occurs in evening classes; and 41% of part-time credit students are registered for evening classes. These statistics are based on this term.

INVESTMENTS--At the close of the third quarter of the 1977-78 fiscal year, the college's investment program has earned a total of \$246,574 in interest income. This is nearly  $2\frac{1}{2}$  times the earnings realized at this time last year and eclipses all earlier investment income predictions. This year's increase in investment funds is due to the receipt of more than \$3.1 million in state-allocated construction funds plus an improved cash operating base. Bill Mansell, assistant to the dean of business operations, manages the investments.

SI IS HERE--Next week, May 8-12 is National Metrics Week and the Mathematics Department has some special memorable activities scheduled for Monday through Wednesday. To set the stage, there will be a mock New Orleans style funeral for the English Measuring system Monday at 11 a.m. on the lawn North of the Center Building. The Performing Arts Department will provide music for the processional before the service and also during the service. John Loughlin, math instructor will offer the eulogy. On a more serious note, three two-hour workshops on use of the metric system have been planned for Monday and Wednesday at 1 p.m. in Math 209 and Tuesday at 12 p.m. in room 20 of the Downtown Center. To register, just call the Math Department at ext. 386. Also, several displays on metrics, numerous hands-on activities (including learning metrics on the computer), and a continuous showing of the video tape, "Just Think Metric", will be available in the main hall of the Math Building Monday-Wednesday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Student ID cards with weight and height in both metric and English will be available at a reduced cost, and petitions supporting the change-over from English to metrics will be circulated. Other items include a metric bake sale and metric cookbooks.

HOUSEKEEPING--In a short meeting Wednesday night, the Board of Education approved an allocation of \$7,100 from construction funds to build a classroom for welding and sheetmetal students on the first floor of the Apprenticeship Building; bought 2 TV projectors for \$4,257 and a TV character generator for \$3,350; adopted a new construction priorities list; certified the results of the April 4 Board member election; authorized the sale of about \$3,375 worth of surplus property; and accepted 3 resignations and approved a parental leave from Oct. 1 through June 30, 1979 for Jeanne Harcleroad, associate head of Health Occupations. 

PERSPECTIVE—An outstanding statistical summary of what's happening to America's 2-year institutions appears on the back cover of the April issue of American Education. The number grew from 865 in 1968 to 1,154 in 1977. There were 919 public and 235 private 2-year colleges in 1977, an increase of 325 public and decrease of 36 private. In the fall of 1977, these 1,154 schools reported more than 4 million students in attendance, nearly 36 percent of total postsecondary enrollment. Most students—3,943,000—were in public colleges. For the first time, there were more women students than men, 2,098,000 to 1,987,000. Enrollment is concentrated in California, Illinois, New York and Texas, which account for 50 percent of the enrollees. California alone has 27 percent of the national total. Average annual 2-year, public college tuition is \$407, compared to \$598 at public 4-year colleges, \$741 at public universities, \$1,758 at private 2-year colleges, and \$3,403 at private 4-year institutions.

Cost of the Downtown Center remodeling, including elevator and various safety changes, could ultimately run to half to three quarters of a million dollars. State construction monies for the project are in the bank drawing interest.

BUDGET PROCESS - The college Budget Committee continued its review on Wednesday night of next year's proposed expenditures. They got to about page 51 in the budget working document, so they'll have to go lickety-split at next Wednesday night's session if they want to finish the chore without a fourth meeting. One thing they focused on Wednesday was a need for additional travel and staff development monies for faculty. The Administration agreed to search for ways to bring next year's allocations closer to amounts budgeted for this year. Travel had been among the first items to go in attempts to balance next year's budget.

APRROVED--LCC's Budget Committee on Wednesday night put its stamp of approval on the college's proposed \$16.8 million budget for next fiscal year. The go signal is subject, of course, to voter approval May 23 of the \$705,000 needed to balance the budget. In a Board of Education session preceding the Budget meeting, course revisions to update a half dozen tech-voc programs were approved. The Board also bought a used 15-passenger van for the Health & Physical Education Department to replace two vans presently leased.

DECENTRALIZATION--Deaprtments will have their own telephone monies in the new fiscal year budget. Campus Support Services is redistributing the approximately \$36,000 spent annually for telephone equipment and services. Department heads will be able to make their own decisions as to expenditures for such things as out-of-state long distance calls. Campus Support Services will continue to have central authority for the switchboard and WATS line.

GRANT AWARDED--A \$20,000 apprenticeship grant has been awarded to LCC, Umpqua and Roque community colleges according to Carl Horstrup, LCC apprenticeship coordinator who developed the proposal. The grant, awarded by the State Department of Education's Career and Vocational Education Section, will be used to develop methods of providing registered apprentices in low-enrollment trades or in isolated areas the opportunity to participate in classroom training. LCC's share, which totals some \$15,000, will be used to explore the feasibility of using phone conferences, correspondence and cooperative work experience as a means of providing classroom training.

RUST TO SPEAK--Jerry Rust, Lane County Commissioner, will present a film, "Alternatives to Herbicides", which was produced by two LCC Mass Communication students. He will also speak to some of the other issues currently under discussion in Lane County. The session is scheduled for 1 p.m. today in Forum 301. The talk is free and open to the public.

BOARD MEETING--The administrative placement of KLCC apparently will be decided at the Board of Education's July meeting. Board members Wednesday night agreed to wait for a report from the KLCC Advisory Board before making their decision. Instructional Dean Gerry Rasmussen has recommended that Mass Communication Department head Jim Dunne succeed him as KLCC general manager. In other business, the Board bought a \$7,714 character generator for the Printing/Graphics department, learned that 21 CETA-paid staff members will lose their funding and qo off staff in June and July, praised ASB President Tom Ruckman for his accomplishments in office this year, and approved 3 personnel moves: Dick Newell from Health and P.E. Department head to community education coordinator to succeed Bud Proctor, accepted with regret the resignation of Molly Holsapple as adult basic education coordinator, and granted a leave without pay fall term for ceramics instructor Bruce Wild.

ELECTION--Tuesday's 47 percent yes vote was the strongest first election support received by LCC in the 1970s. The low was 25% in 1970 and the support has been climbing ever since. The college has never won at a first election in the 1970s and only twice have we won a levy in as few as two elections. Also, LCC has never won a primary election tax base measure in the 1970s, but we've never lost a tax base measure in a general election. Tuesday's support would seem to suggest that a win could be just around the corner.

JOURNALISM CONFERENCE--About 40 high school and community college journalism students will meet on campus tomorrow as LCC's Mass Communication Department hosts a high school journalism conference. The day-long session will begin with a coffee hour at 8:30 a.m. in the Board Room. Students will share information and discoveries about their publications and discuss reporting ethics and procedures. Speakers include Jim Dunne, Mass Communication Department head and Dr. Dan Rothwell, LCC communication instructor. A 2 p.m. panel discussion will feature five former LCC students who are now employed as journalists in Oregon. All LCC staff and students are welcome to attend. There is no fee for the conference.
