KLCC TIME AGAIN - The Board of Education will meet Wednesday night at 7:30 in ADM 216 to decide where KLCC-FM will sit in the administrative structure. The KLCC Advisory Board wants the station directly responsible to the Board of Education; the College Administration asks that a station general manager report to the President. It is recommended that Mass Communication head Jim Dunne be named general manager. Also on the agenda are some bid awards, advisory committee appointments, etc.

PROPOSITION 13 - The property tax limitation in California is cutting "only" 8 to 9 percent at community colleges this year because of the state's \$5.8 billion surplus. The cuts are expected to be much more next year unless the state comes up with another surplus. Cuts to date have affected classified staffs most severely, along with part-time faculty members. There have been across-the-board salary freezes, cuts in both tech-voc and LDC, and some children's centers have been closed. There is talk of centralizing some administrative chores at the state level, chopping out much of adult education, raising fees, and imposing admissions requirements to limit enrollment.

AGAINST BALLOT MEASURE 6 - The Oregon Tax Relief Committee is forming to oppose the proposed property tax limitation. Roger Martin and Stafford Hansell are co-chairing it. A Portland office is to be opened soon, and a fund raising campaign will follow. Attention will be given to tax-supported organizations because half the public employees in California voted yes. Oregon polls show about 47 percent of public employees presently inclined to vote yes.

ANOTHER 'ANSWER' QUESTION - "If excess property is so good as was reported in the paper, why is the college ending the program and firing the head of it?"

Answer: An analysis of the program's financial health for the fiscal year just past as well for the first quarter of the current year has been requested. The program was set up on a self-sustained basis with the salaries of the Coordinator and other expenses being met by a service charge. Through changes the Federal Government has made in the regulations and procedures for the program, it is becoming much more difficult for the College to acquire items. The budget uncertainty for the College also makes it unclear even if items were available whether departments would have the ability to pay the service charge necessary to support the office. The administration has asked that all billing, inventory, and other paper work be caught up on and that the many items stored at various locations on campus be disposed of or reassigned. If it cannot be demonstrated that the program can continue to be financially viable, the staff would have to be reassigned if feasible or terminated.

COOLING SYSTEM - If you've been hot under the collar (and elsewhere) about the malfunctioning of the air conditioning system, take heart. The Plant Services people will be repairing the condenser in the chiller this Friday, August 18. That involves a shutdown of the system for the day. Think cool.

PARTNERS - KLCC-FM radio is now being operated by a partnership consisting of an administrator and a 7-member advisory commission. That compromise was hammered out last Wednesday by the LCC Board of Education. Mass Communication head Jim Dunne is wearing a second hat as KLCC general manager. The station is separate from Mass Comm., however. In the general manager role, Dunne will report directly to President Schafer. The advisory commission had sought governing powers, but college attorney Ed Harms told the Board that it couldn't lawfully delegate those responsibilities. The commission, however, won the right to have input on major operating decisions, including the right to have a voting representative on screening committees for full-time positions on the station staff. In working out the agreement, the LCC Board also clarified the station's purpose. It's neither a public radio station nor an educational station; it's both.

BEST OF LUCK - Dr. Ken Hills, director of counseling, leaves his duties today (Monday) to become dean of students at Point Loma College in San Diego. He says he was lured by the "challenge of establishing a career planning counseling program" there. A farewell luncheon will be held tomorrow noon (Tuesday) at the International.

AND THEN THERE WAS ONE - Lane is the only Oregon community college still seeking a levy approval for this year. The others either have won already or are living within their tax bases. In elections last Tuesday, Umpqua CC won a \$1.1 million levy with an 81 percent yes vote; Central Oregon won a \$2 million levy with a 56 percent yes vote. Neither college has a tax base, so it was win or else; both conducted vigorous campaigns. Umpqua sent dismissal notices to staff, telling them not to report to work if the levy was defeated. All staff earlier had voted to take a  $\frac{1}{2}$  of 1 percent cut in raises negotiated this year.

TROUBLE IN SALEM - Chemeketa CC granted its 58 administrators an average salary increase of 12.7 percent this year. The Oregon Statesman published a list of names, positions and salaries. This was followed by an editorial titled, "Bureaucrats are slow to get protest message." The editorial said the average salary of \$25,560 appears high and that taxpayers compare and get mad; "Chemeketa's board and administrators need to get their house in order." Interviewed a few days later, board chairman Mike Holland promised a reorganization by January that will eliminate a "significant" number of positions and freeze salary increases for many that remain.

FROM OCCA DIGEST - The Legislative Emergency Board has granted Linn-Benton CC a 4-year interest-free loan of \$400,000 to repair its heating system. The loan will be repaid by withholding \$100,000 in each of 4 years from the college's state support. Plastic pipe in the system collapsed; the college is suing the contractor but the litigation could take years. The cooling system also isn't working, but the state told the college to solve that problem on its own.

FREEZE - President Schafer has been instructed by the Board of Education to freeze all hiring except for those positions he has reviewed and found crucial to effective operations. The action was taken because the college hasn't won voter approval of an operating levy and because of the possible impact of passage of the property tax limitation measure on the November ballot.

MARK YOUR CALENDAR - Plan to attend a no-host "meet the Board of Education members" dinner on Wednesday evening, September 13. RECOGNITION - Governor Straub has proclaimed the week of October 30 through November 3 as "Classified School Employee Week." ANOTHER ANSWER - Question: "Will the installation of our new 'ultra-sophisticated' phone system mean that I can phone '800' (toll free) numbers without going through the switchboard?" Answer from Mark Rocchio, director of Campus Support Services: Yes. We will be able to make all of our long distance calls without the aid of our switchboard operator.

SURPRISE! - Mt. Hood CC lost 3 election tries this year and thus cut its budget by \$1.7 million. President Steve Nicholson says he received not one protest from the district's patrons.

SALARIES CRITICIZED - Salem's newspapers continue their editorial attack on managerial salaries at Chemeketa CC. A piece by editorial page editor William Bebout August 13 had a 3-column headline, "High salaries fuel for tax revolt". The opening paragraph read, "If you haven't decided how to vote on the property tax limitation measure, consider the extraordinarily high salaries paid to administrators of the Salem School District and Chemeketa Community College. I don't question the qualifications of the administrators when I say they aren't worth what they're getting paid. They may be worth it in the eyes of the school board and their families. But they aren't worth it to me....The issue is how much we ought to pay school administrators. Assuming that we need all of them, and I don't believe that for an instant, we should hire the best available at the lowest possible cost. Given the popularity of public education as a career, the law of supply and demand is in the public's favor. And I am not convinced that the supply would diminish significantly if administrative salaries were cut by one-third tomorrow."

NO MORE MAJORITY RULE - If Ballot Measure 6 (property tax limitation) passes at the November election, the majority of voters could approve a tax levy without effect. It would require a 66 2/3 vote to pass. Oregon has never had a 66 2/3 "yes" vote on anything relative to taxes.

NEW CHIEF - John Bernham has been appointed interim director of the Counseling Department to serve through June 30, 1979.

ALL ABOUT SIX - Learn about Ballot Measure 6, the 1½ percent property tax limitation, at a meeting Thursday, August 31, 7 to 9:30 p.m., at the Lane Education Service District conference rooms, 1200 Highway 99 N. No speeches, no campaigning. Just discussions of specific provisions of the ballot measure, interpretation of the measure as contained in the recent Attorney General's opinion, and potential fiscal impact data prepared by the Legislative Revenue Office. The session is co-sponsored by the Oregon School Boards Association, Association of Oregon Counties, and League of Oregon Cities.

COMPARING US AND THEM - Oregon's total tax burden is 22nd highest in the nation. California is third; assessed valuation increases have been higher there than in Oregon in the last 4 years. Oregon has a tax relief program for households with low incomes; California has not. California had a \$5 billion surplus to bail out local taxing districts; Oregon has not.

RETIREES RETURNING - Bill Cox '75, Helen Loomis '75, and Ellene Goldsmith '72 will join Jonathan West of Personnel Services in a presentation on "Getting Ready for Retirement" on Monday, September 18 at LCC. It's part of the fall in-service program. Your In-Service Committee, chaired by Vern Ho, is lining up lots of goodies for September 11, 13, 18, and 19.

FROM THE MAILROOM - The mailroom has been receiving intracampus mail with only the name of the receiver listed. They need to have the department listed as well. In addition they ask that the sender and the sender's department be listed. If they can't find the person to whom the mail is addressed, they need to know where to return it. Regarding outgoing mail, they're receiving many pieces without the department billing number in the lower left corner of the envelope. ACCIDENTS - Accidents on campus went up sharply this past year, but their cost went down, advises Safety Coordinator Bill Mansell. There were 86 accidents, compared to 46 the year previous. Total cost in 1977-78 was \$10,699, compared to \$13,072 in 1976-77. Maintenance/ Grounds led the accident parade, with 25 costing \$2,724. Custodial had 13 at a cost of \$413; Foodservices had 9 and \$751; Community Education, 7 and \$1,312. Most improved records were those of Health & P.E., which went from 3 accidents to none last year, Foodservices and Custodial. Falling, slipping and tripping caused 22 accidents last year at a cost of \$6,275. Moving and lifting objects caused 22 mishaps at a cost of \$987; working with machinery and tools, 17 accidents and \$1,445; struck by moving or falling objects, 10 accidents, \$1,160.
