ELECTION INFORMATION - People have been asking for data to share with friends, etc. Here tis:

LCC seeks voter approval of a one-year \$555,000 levy beyond the Oregon constitutional 6 percent limitation at the September 19 election.

"We're asking for a 7.8 percent increase in our operating budget at a time when inflation is more like 10 percent," says LCC President Eldon Schafer.

"Not only will we be maintaining present services within that budget, we'll also be staffing our new Downtown Center," he said.

A yes vote would increase the local property tax for LCC from last year's \$1.35 per \$1,000 assessed value to an estimated \$1.37 for this year.

This 2-penny increase would cost the owner of a \$40,000 home an estimated additional 80 certs in total LCC property tax for the year.

"We've reduced our levy request some 29 percent from the \$784,000 rejected at May and june elections," Schafer said. Allowing for uncollected taxes, the college would net about \$499,500 of the proposed September 19 levy.

"For the third year in a row," Schafer said, "departments will get no increases to cover inflation in materials and services and capital outlay accounts."

Student tuition was raised 5 percent to make it among the highest of Oregon community colleges.

Schafer said voter approval of the September 19 proposal would raise the total property taxes for college support to \$5.8 million. That is about 35 percent of the proposed operating budget of \$16.8 million. State support, tuition and fees, and some federal monies generate the other 65 percent of the budget.

"The average local property tax rate has been \$1.47 per \$1,000 assessed value over the past 10 years." he said. "We're asking for a rate for this year that's 10 cents lower than that average."

Schafer pointed out that Lane is the only Oregon community college still seeking a levy approval.

WHAT LCC'S PROPOSED TAX LEVY WOULD COST YOU

INFLATION HITS FOODSERVICES--If you've been frequenting the Snack Bar in the last week or so you probably noticed an increase of price in your favorite dish. Prices on meat items and salads were forced up due to the rising cost of raw foods. Here are a few of the changes: cheeseburgers went from 60¢ to 75¢ and hamburgers were 50¢ and are now 60¢. In the salad line, the small "make your own" salad was 60¢ and is now 75¢ and the large salad went from \$1.15 to \$1.25. Prices on soup and chili were also increased. Most of the meat entrees in the cafeteria line will show a 5 to 10 cent price increase. Foodservice hours during this week of in-service will remain the same. FROM THE RAGAN REPORT--Reflecting on communication, editors of Southeast Missouri Hospital's Synapse, quote two studies: one shows that typical managers spend 90 percent of their time communicating; the other states that communications make up at least half the cost of running the economy.

SPEAKING OF ECONOMY--Here's a look at what LCC does for the county economy. This year we bought \$1.6 million worth of supplies, instructional materials, equipment, and services from 600 local merchants. We estimate that \$7.1 million of the \$10.6 million paid in salaries was spent locally. We spent more than a million dollars (mostly from federal sources) on construction this year. Our students received \$4.9 million in state and federal financial aid and spent it here.

COPYRIGHT INFORMATION: Guidelines for Single Copying for Teachers

Remember that the guidelines are suggestions to assist in compliance with the copyright law and are not the law itself. They are not designed to limit fair use copying but to make certain that the copying privilege is not abused.

A single copy may be made of any of the following for a teacher at his or her individual request for his or her scholarly research or use in teaching or preparation to teach a class: (1) A chapter from a book, (?) An article from a periodial or newspaper, (3) A short story, short essay or short poem, whether or not from a collective work, and (4) A chart, graph, diagram, drawing, cartoon or picture from a book, periodical or newspaper.

Strict compliance with the guidelines may cause considerable problems and/ or inconvenience. The guidelines seem to imply that, if an instructor has a copy of <u>a</u> (interpreted as one) chapter from a book, then it is not permissible to copy a different chapter from the same book. If one takes a (one) graph from a book, then it may not be permissible under the guidelines to copy a second graph from the same book.

If one reads the four criteria listed in the law under fair use and compares it with the guidelines, a case can be made that taking two graphs from the same book is fair use even though the guidelines would prohibit it. Again the basic rule seems to be reasonable copying for educational use if there is damaging economic effects.

FROM OCCA DIGEST--Between July 1977 and July 1978, the cost of living in Portland's metropolitan area, as measured by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, increased 9.2 percent. Using 1967 as the index year, the cost of living in the past 12 years fell just short of doubling (199.2 percent increase). For the two-month period ending July 31, prices in the Portland metro area shot up two percent; translated into an annual inflation rate, this increase would be 12 percent. Housing costs continue to rise faster than most other prices. Food price increases, however, have been slowing down somewhat compared to the early part of the year.

ON MEASURES 6 and 11--Today's question: Are there expenditure limitations contained in the measures? Reply: Measure 6 contains no expenditure limitations, only a limitation on property tax income. Measure 11 contains expenditure limitations on both state and local government. Increases in the state operating budget are limited to an amount not greater than the increase in personal income over the just completed biennium. Local government is limited to an increase based on the cost of living adjusted by population increases unless that amount is exceeded by the voters of the district, or unless the district is operating with a tax base approved through the provisions of Article 11 of the Constitution and the 6 percent allowable increase is greater than the amount that would have been provided by using the CPI plus population adjustment.

Classes Begin MONDAY September 25, 1978

ANALYSIS--LCC's win in last Tuesday's election resulted from dramatic increases in the number and percent of Yes votes in all school districts, as compared to the June 27 election. District-wide, the Yes percentage went up from 45 to 54. In Eugene 4J, the increase was from 51 to60; in Springfield, from 41 to 51; in Lowell, from 41 to 62. In Blachly, LCC lost by 11 votes in June and won by 4 this time; in Marcola the June loss was by 100 votes and the September win was by 3; in McKenzie, LCC lost in June by 51 votes and won this time by 8 votes. Besides those 6 wins, LCC was close in 4 other districts and tied in Linn County where the college lost by 20 votes in June. In this latest election, LCC lost by only 1 vote in Oakridge, 8 votes at Pleasant Hill, 2 votes in Crow-Applegate, and 27 votes in South Lane.

LCC won in 69 of 107 precincts (61 percent). The college got 1 percent fewer Yes votes in 4J than that district, but won 1 more precinct there. LCC lost in only 3 of 56 4J precincts, 4J lost in 4. Eugene 4J gave the college 56 percent of its district-wide Yes vote. Springfield and 4J together provided LCC 74 percent of its district-wide Yes vote.

Q and A ABOUT MEASURES 6 and 11--What happens in the future if there is a surplus in the General Fund Budget? Under Measure 6 the disposition of the funds is left to the State Legisature. Under Measure 11 any surplus over 2 percent of the General Fund Budget must be refunded to taxpayers as a personal income tax refund.

** USE A LITTLE RESTRAINT **

Traffic accidents are the number one killer of young Americans from 1 to 35 years of age. In 1977, 21 infants and small children (up to age 4) were killed while riding as passengers in cars in Oregon. 1,132 children in the same age group were injured. No disease has a comparable impact. Of the 21 deaths, at least 50% could have been prevented through the use of education to encourage adults to properly restrain their children in the car. In spite of the obviously increased safety level achievable for small children with the use of restraints, the use is not widespread. The Multnomah County Health Education Section (248-3704) has a pamphlet available that lists the approved seats and where they can be obtained.

In order to generate a life style change that will significantly increase the use of infant restraints, all concerned agencies and professional groups involved in the education of adults should advise and teach the use of restraints in autos. The slogan, of course, is: Use a Little Restraint! (From Oregon Nurse, August 1978)

The FDA Bulletin for May-July 1978 issues the warning that very low calorie protein diets may cause serious illness or death. DO NOT USE FOR WEIGHT REDUCTION OR MAINTENANCE WITHOUT MEDICAL SUPERVISION. Do not use for any purpose without medical advice if you are taking medication. Protein diets are not for use by infants, children, or pregnant or nursing mothers.

CONSTRUCTION - Summer rains have slowed construction of the Health & P.E. addition. The contractor has requested a 20-day extension to the scheduled December 15 completion date. It means a probable move-in after January 1; the facility is supposed to be ready for Winter Term classes.

OTHER CONSTRUCTION - Some 13 projects are in progress, including: Apprenticeship Annex, where plans for landscaping are now ready; Apprenticeship welding exhaust system, for which plans are half completed; Machine Tech independent study area, schematics completed; Air Tech power plant lab partitions, working drawings being prepared; campus interior signing, now underway; Air Tech woodshop exhaust connections, working drawings half completed; Science Building biology fume hood, utilities being connected; Boiler Room electrode shield drives replacement, project almost done; Apprenticeship first floor classroom, awaiting delivery of light fixtures; Science Building venting, in progress; Student Health room, awaiting delivery of fixtures; Women's restrooms in vocational labs, grab bars now being manufactured; Energy Management System, drawings in progress for valve access structure for energy tanks.

BOARD MEETING - The LCC Board of Education meets at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Board Room. The agenda includes requests for \$10,000 to erect a storage quonset hut at the Siuslaw Area Center, \$7,500 for facilities planning, and \$2,900 to finish a new Apprenticeship classroom area; award of a \$16,558 bid for two Mag Card II typewriters for the Business Department; and four appointments to the KLCC Advisory Commission. Discussions will include the architects' design feasibility study for the Downtown Center; proposed cost for Phase I is \$1.8 million. Personnel items include the retirement request of Lewis Case, former dean of instruction.

FALL TERM ENROLLMENT DATA - As of last Friday, according to the dean of students, enrollment in credit classes looked like this: Sections offered--1,552 (up 136); Courses offered--760 (up 40); Course openings (seats)--37,119 (up 1,633); Course enrollment--22,670 (down 993 compared to a year ago); Head count--6,181 (down 78); Full-time students--4,137 (down 207); Part-time students--2,048 (up 129); FTE--1,680.5 (down 34.7). Departments showing the most gain: Special Programs, up 15.2 FTE; Mass Communication, up 5.1; Language Arts, up 4.8. Departments showing the most loss: Social Science, down 22.9 FTE compared to a year ago; Science, down 18.0; Art & Applied Design, down 9.1.

EXPENSIVE--An architect's proposal that a \$2.1 million remodeling be done at the Downtown Center didn't generate much enthusiasm at Wednesday night's Board of Education meeting. President Schafer suggested that the college could get by with less, maybe \$300,000 to correct building code deficiencies. The Board decided to talk about it further at its October 18 meeting. In other business, the Board decided it won't try for an updated tax base at the iovember election, and learned that LCC will be the lead institution in producing an ACCESS television course on energy management. Four people were appointed to the KLCC Advisory Commission: attorney Alan Scott Jr. of Springfield; Sharon Genasci, Eugene filmmaker; KVAL-tv newsman Mike Makela, and Charles Kraus , owner of a Eugene media services company. Jim Rear of Junction City was appointed to the college budget committee.

LCC IS HAVING AN ANNIVERSARY-It's 10 years since the first classes were held here on the main campus. And we thought this summer was a wet one. We moved out to the campus the last of June in 1968 and it rained until the first of July for a late spring. The contractors were planning on a good hot summer and late fall to continue with construction, and what happened--the rains came. It began raining the 9th of August and continued, with $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the amount of rain we had during the past month of August.

To refresh memories of staff who were here in 1968 and to give newer employees a visual background of construction of the total campus, a photo display, including 100 photographs and memorablia is on exhibit in the Mezzanine Gallery of the Library through the month of October. The display, arranged from the college Archives, also includes a number of aerial photos from Bert Dotson's collection.

REPLACEMENT NAMED--Mary Ann Manderino has been named as acting associate department head for Health Occupations for 1978-79 replacing Jeanne Harcleroad who is on leave. Manderino was most recently a community health nurse for Lane County in 1977-78 and before that was assistant professor of a graduate program for psychosocial nursing at the University of Utah in Salt Lake. She holds a B.S. and M.S. in Community Health Nursing from the University of Colorado and received her PhD. in Counseling/Psychology at Arizona State.

EVERYTHING IS COMPARATIVE--If you think LCC sometimes has problems, consider the latest at the U of O. Those who want to travel out of state must submit a request two months in advance and have it approved by the department head, dean, vice president, president, the UO business office, the State Board of Higher Education, and the State Executive Department. Anyone along the way can veto the request. Further, the UO's house publication, Oregon Week, has just been cut to every two weeks. IN COMPARISON--A comparison of voting in the 16 Lane County school districts during the last two September elections indicates that support in Eugene-Springfield has remained about the same while support in the outlying areas appears to be growing. The percent of Yes votes was 54 for both elections; however, LCC won only two school districts--Eugene 4J and Pleasant Hill-- in September 1976. In September 1978, LCC won six districts: Blachly, 4J, Lowell, Marcola, McKenzie and Springfield. In 1976, 4J gave the college 64 percent of its district-wide Yes votes; the percent this year was 56. Some people think a larger turnout in a special election produces a larger number of No votes. That didn't seem to be the case in the 1978 election. Bethel, Lowell, Marcola and Springfield had greater turnouts in 1978 and also greater percentages of Yes votes, compared to 1976. There were 7,160 more voters in 1976, but the district-wide No percentage was 46 in both elections. Eleven of the 16 districts had larger percentage Yes votes this year than in 1976. Five districts had smaller percentage Yes votes this year: 4J, down 1 percent; Junction City,

districts had smaller percentage Yes votes this year: 4J, down 1 percent; Junction City, down 8 percent; Mapleton, down 1 percent; Pleasant Hill, down 2 percent; Siuslaw, down 11 percent.
