ENROLLMENT REPORT--Registrar Bob Marshall reports that although the FTE (Full-time Equivalent) count is down 6 compared to the same period of time for fall term 1977, the headcount, which includes both full- and part-time credit students, is up 80 for the same time period. The projection at this point is that the final FTE count will be slightly higher than it was for fall of 1977. As of last Friday, 6,788 students had registered for classes at Lane in the credit program.

Adult Education classes are still registering, so firm figures for the non-credit program were unavailable, however, Office Manager Virginia Roles says classes are filling and we are growing.

LIVE CHESS GAME--In celebration of National Chess Day, the LCC Chess Club is conducting a life-sized chess game tomorrow on the Bristow Square lawn north of the Center Building. The game which will pit Van Louie, a Data Processing programmer, against Bob Mitchell, ABE instructor, begins at 11:45 a.m. with a 45 minute game limit. Players will be restricted to 30 seconds per move. Their commanded moves will be relayed from the second floor balcony of the Center Building to 32 Performing Arts acting students moving on a replica of a chess board chalked on the lawn. Students from Physical Education Department courses will carry off fallen pieces on a stretcher. Math instructor and Chess Club advisor John Loughlin will act as referee. Loughlin organized the match. In case it rains, the match will be postponed. National Chess Day is Saturday, October 7.

NATIONAL FELLOWSHIP AWARDED--Associate Dean Joyce Hopps has been awarded a 9-month fellowship for study and research at the Advanced Study Center at the National Center for Research in Vocational Education on the Ohio State University campus. The fellowship is federally funded. Hopps will conduct research on the effects of training on stress of the work place and will do a monograph on that subject. REMODEL--Construction crews are expected to be busy next summer at the Downtown Center. The Board of Education has agreed to spend up to \$1.5 million to remodel part of the building. State construction monies will be used to bring the mechanical and electrical systems up to code, including replacement of the elevator. Five new classrooms will be built on the presently unused third floor. And there will be a modest refacing of the building exterior for insulation and appearance. The work will be done next summer because use of the building is normally at its lowest level at that time.

UPDATE--LCC will move soon into "Dimension 2000". It's not a version of Star Wars but rather a new telephone system by Pacific Northwest Bell. The Board of Education has rescinded its July 12 decision to install a system by Executone for something close to \$300,000 and go instead with PNB for about \$90,000 less. A review of comparative costs since the original award produced the change in direction. The new system should be in operation by the time you get back from Christmas vacation. The existing telephone system has been at maximum use for some time and cannot be expanded further.

ENROLLMENT--A 2 percent increase in enrollment is expected this fall term as compared to fall term a year ago. Credit headcount is 6,995 and that's 52 more than a year ago. Community Education is still registering students, but a definite growth pattern is evidencing itself there too. The growth comes at a time when most other Oregon community colleges are reporting fall term drops in enrollment. And the picture is said to be about the same nationwide. LCC must be doing something right.
