HEADCOUNT GROWING--LCC's "share of market" has been growing constantly since the college's founding, according to figures developed by Paul Colvin in Information Services. Enrollment headcount per 1,000 population in Lane County has grown from 24.57 in 1965 to 125.95 last college year. The FTE per 1,000 population has climbed from 8.19 in 1965 to 31.19 last year. Obviously, both would be even higher if the population base were restricted to those aged 18 and over.

BIG TIME--LCC's Cooperative Work Experience program is 14th largest in the U.S. among all four and two-year colleges and universities. Northeastern University at Boston has 8,244 students and leads the parade. The largest two-year CWE enrollment is 2,600 at Orange Coast College at Costa Mesa, CA. Lane is the fifth largest community college with 1,453 CWE students. Source of this information is CWE Director Bob Way and the sixth edition of Undergraduate Programs of Cooperative Education in the United States and Canada.
