CRACKLE, SNAP, SWISH--That could be just what happened at the Downtown Center early Saturday morning when a pipe in the sprinkler system broke and flooded all four floors of the Center. The incident apparently went undetected until the surge of running water tripped the alarm system about 1:30 p.m. and brought the Eugene Fire Department to the scene. Plant Services Director Walt VanOrden was notified and headed a custodial clean up crew that worked into the evening on the mopping up operation. The break poured up to two inches of water on the floors in some areas and managed to run, drip, trickle and seep down to all floors of the building. Due to the efforts of our own custodial staff and the Eugene Fire Department damage was minimal and classes began on schedule Tuesday morning.

PAY STUDY--LCC's Board of Education voted Wednesday night to spend up to \$4,000 for a management compensation study. The Local Government Personnel Institute at Salem will review pay practices for the 90 managers and support staff. The report will include pay comparisons with other Oregon community colleges. The study is to be done during February and March. In other business, the Board approved a budget work schedule that calls for completion of the budget document by the end of April, Budget Committee sessions in May, and a budget election, if needed, on June 26. Catherine Lauris was chosen to represent the Board on the Lane Council of Government's Economic Improvement Commission. A letter is to be sent to L-COG, supporting continued existence and funding for that agency. Dean of Students Jack Carter reported that enrollment for Winter Term is at about the same level as a year ago, in spite of icy conditions on some registration days. Though evening credit enrollment is down, daytime enrollment is up. Figures haven't been compiled yet on the number of adult education students.

GRANTS AWARDED--Fourteen grants in 12 different departments have been awarded by the LCC Development Fund as part of the annual Development Fund Trustee Grant Program. Director Lyle Swetland said, "we were able to accommodate half of the applicants." Those receiving grants are: Health Occupations, both the credit program and Community Ed; Student Health Services; Counseling; Cooperative Work Experience; Siuslaw Area Center; Student Financial Aid; Language Arts, the tutorial program and Denali; Performing Arts; Phi Theta Kappa; Admissions; and Special Programs. The money is made available through a fund raising campaign sponsored by the trustees, and other contributions to the Fund.

GOOD NEWS FOR JOGGERS--During the Christmas Holiday, we were able to shut down the heating system and install the valves necessary to allow us to hook up an additional heat exchanger for the Health & PE hot water system. The device, which will be installed as soon as we can purchase and get delivery on one, will help produce more hot water for the showers. The unusual cold this year and the ever increasing use of our facilities has caused a continued problem which we are most anxious to solve.--Tony Birch.
