GROUNDHOG BETTER DRESS WARM--Tomorrow is the day that a groundhog ceremoniously comes out of its winter quarters and, in uncontrollable circumstances predicts our weather for the next several weeks. Our guess is that whether it sees its shadow or not, Groundhog won't stay out too long and will probably wear a fur coat.

BOARD MEETING--A discussion on a possible tuition increase took up most of Wednesday night's LCC Board of Education work session. The first non-quorum in 14 years (only Larry Perry, Jim Pitney and Chaelene Curry were present) wrestled with the quandary of possibly limiting access if the cost of education is raised. On the other hand, it was pointed out, students should help to some extent to meet rising costs. ASB President James Cox said a two percent increase would be about right. Dean of Students Jack Carter recommended an 8.3 percent hike for credit students and a 6.25 increase for non-credit students. Full-time tuition for a term would go up \$11 to \$143. Thirty-hour classes in adult education would go up \$1 to \$17. Additional income for the college generated by Carter's proposed increase would total about \$177,000 next year. The Board could make a decision at its Feb. 14 meeting.

PROBLEMS--Plant Operations staff are having their problems these days. Number 1 boiler in the furnace has its thermostat malfunctioning, Number 2 boiler has its shields jammed and is operating at 50 percent efficiency, there's a major water leak somewhere around the tanks in the building heating system, and parts for repairing a breakdown in the domestic hot water system won't be here for nearly six weeks. RX: A little patience for our fellow employees whose situation has them figuratively "on the hot spot" as they try to keep buildings and water at comfortable temperatures.

ENERGY--Responses to the country's energy crisis haven't been very significant, according to notes brought back from the recent Washington, DC national conference on energy by President Schafer. James R. Schlesinger, secretary of the Department of Energy, said the U.S. must stop importing 48 percent of its oil, that it must shift to internal coal, gas, oil and nuclear resources, and that environmentalists and conservationists will have to accept the consequences. Energy issues must be solved if we're to preserve our social institutions. John O'Leary, deputy secretary of the Department of Energy, said political, environmental and other conditions have thwarted development of a national energy program. There isn't sufficient national consensus to move the Congress or the President. Kentucky Gov. Julian M. Carroll said that education must inform the citizens and provide advanced technology. He advocated more, rather than less, federal support for education.

BOARD MEETING--KLCC radio would be one of 200 stations able to receive satellite transmissions from National Public Radio under a proposal approved last night by the LCC Board of Education. The station will apply for a \$29,431 grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting to fund a dish antenna. A hearing on the complaint will be held later. Next meetings: Feb. 21 for a work session and Feb. 28 for a special Board meeting.

LONG-RANGE PLAN--The Board of Education was briefed on the procedures followed in developing the College's long-range plan in a work session last night. A discussion of the recommendations coming out of the study will be scheduled for a later session. Discussion of a possible April 3 levy election evoked no support from Board members, who apparently want to wait until June 26 to give the College Budget Committee maximum time to study fiscal needs. Information was presented, however, that indicated the College could get by next year on a \$555,000 levy beyond the 6 percent limitation, the same as voters approved for this year. This would mean that the property tax rate for next year could drop, based on predicted increase in valuation in the county.

CONCERNS--The AACJC office asked presidents across the U.S. to list their concerns. Leading issues identified included: 1) finance, 2) mission clarification and loss of local control, 3) proliferation of specialized accreditation and decreasing enrollment, 4) need for faculty development/rejuvenation, 5) unionization and collective bargaining, 6) government regulation, 7) retrenchment management, 8) tax reduction measures and inflation, 9) assessing new markets. Low scores on the concern list were received by attrition, lawsuits, energy conservation, transfer of credit and leadership.
