BOARD MEETING--By a 4-3 vote, the LCC Board of Education Wednesday night raised tuition starting in September. It goes up about 8 percent for credit students and 6 percent for adult education enrollees. It amounts to \$11 a term extra for credit students and \$1 a class more for those in adult education. The hike will increase tuition revenue about 5 percent, some \$150,000. Other business: The college is authorized to work with Lane County and the State Highway Department on a project to add off and on ramps from the west lane of I-5 just south of the present 30th Avenue interchange. Bids are being sought for remodeling of the Downtown Center. A contract could be awarded April 11, with work beginning June 1. Salaries of less than half-time credit faculty will be raised about 7 percent effective Spring Term. And resignations, effective June 30, were accepted with regret from Beth Webb, Health Occupations, and Laura Oswalt, Student Health Services. Webb returns to graduate school after 9 years at LCC; Oswalt leaves after 10 years to pursue other interests.

POWER FAILURE SLOWS REGISTRATION--Several short power failures during a lightning storm Tuesday night caused minor damage to LCC's computer system and as a result brought continuing student registration to a standstill Wednesday morning. By afternoon students were being registered by hand and by evening the system was repaired and registration will go on today as scheduled. Apparently the power outage "blew up" a couple of the modules in the main computer bank and caused the delay.

FROM ALASKA TO MEXICO--Pledges are still coming in for KLCC's "Going on 13" radiothon which ended March 9. The station raised \$13,611 in membership pledges to "Friends of KLCC" as of last Saturday and Development Director Gina Ing says "We are receiving money in the mail everyday. During the week, more than 100 guests visited the studio and we went through a lot of coffee." One of the high lights of the week happened in the early hours of the last day when the staff at KLCC called commercial station KGO in San Francisco which operates at 50,000 watts and is heard from Alaska to Mexico. The call was on the air which means a commercial AM station and public FM shared air time. The KGO staff encouraged listeners to support KLCC and as a result the station has received pledges from various out-of-state friends. Such a Xerox machine exists, but--even in black and white rather than color--it would raise the cost of the publication from $1^{1}_{2}c$ per impression to 3c. And, that doesn't include the cost of leasing the machine.
