VOTE TOMORROW--Don't forget to vote on LCC's Board of Education election tomorrow. Polls are open 8 to 8.

INTERIM REASSIGNMENTS--The retirement of Lew Case is resulting in some interim job changes in Administrative Services. Paul Colvin moves to Lew's office in Campus Services to assume responsibility for planning, construction and major remodeling. He'll hang onto some of his Information Services chores as well. John Wilson of Records Management Services moves into Paul's office to alleviate space problems in the RMS office and to assume a broader role in Information Services duties. Walt Van Orden, director of Plant Services, will supervise grounds and maintenance/operations staff. Dean Tony Birch will study management needs further before announcing permanent arrangements. The interim assignments make it possible to leave one management position unfilled.

SLIGHT DROP--For the first time in 20 years, enrollment in the nation's community colleges is dropping. The drop is slight, however. The fall 1978 total was 4,309,948 compared to 4,304,058 in fall 1979. On a more encouraging note, community education enrollment went up nationally by eight percent in 1979 over 1978. Planners say that community colleges can expect to deal with further increases in services to people who will be in and out of college during their entire lives. --From AACJC Memorandum to Presidents, 3-5-79

FOUR OUT OF FIVE ISN'T BAD--Four more Oregon community colleges won levy elections last week, including Mt. Hood at Gresham (by 3 votes), Blue Mountain at Pendleton, Chemeketa at Salem, and Clatsop at Astoria. Southwestern Oregon at Coos Bay had both operating and construction levies defeated. Umpqua won in March. Portland, Linn-Benton and Clackamas don't have to vote this year. That leaves five--SWOCC, Treasure Valley at Ontario, Rogue at Grants Pass, Central Oregon at Bend, and Lane--who will try to pass levies in May or June.

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BOARD MEETING--By next fall, the College's affirmative action/equal employment opportunity procedures will be up to date. That promise was presented to the Board of Education Wednesday night by the Administration. An updated grievance procedure is to be ready by June 13, an affirmative action plan update by July 1, and completed personnel data systems by September 15. In other business, the Board was advised that 11 contracted faculty may be laid off next fall if enrollment in their specialties is low. Reassignments will be made, however, where possible to avoid layoffs. Art, Science, and Social Science face the big cuts. The Board approved the expenditure of \$11,799 to buy 13 microcomputers. They'll be used, starting fall term, in a new microcomputer sequence in the Data Processing Department.

TONIGHT ON CAMPUS--Several events are scheduled on campus tonight, including two free lectures and a jazz concert. Peter Chan, a plant pathologist and agricultural scientist from Portland State University, will speak on his raised-bed gardening system at 7 p.m. in Forum 308. Chan will also demonstrate the system to students at an organic farm located behind the Harvester Tavern on the UO campus, today at 2:30 p.m....Sterling Ellsworth, a Eugene psychologist, will speak on problems put on a family with the appearance of a baby, and dealing with angry feelings in the presence of a child. His talk is also at 7 p.m., and will be held in Forum 111 (studio A)....At 8 p.m. in the Performing Arts Theater, jazz bands from LCC and South Eugene High School will present a joint concert under the direction of Bart Bartholomew and Larry Gookin.
