There will be demonstrations on the use of a braille typewriter, training a seeing-eye dog, and sign language. There will be a wheelchair rally, a blind trust walk, and films and presentations by representatives from Vocational Rehabilitation and the Architectural Barrier Association. TODAY - Drop over to the lawn between the Forum and Science greenhouse at 1 p.m. and be part of the groundbreaking for KLCC's dish antenna. Washington, D.C. officials from the Corporation of Public Broadcasting and National Public Radio will be here, as will other radio people from around the northwest. Local participants will include Senator Ed Fadeley, President Schafer, Board member Charlene Curry and station manager Jim Dunne. The half-hour ceremony will be broadcast nationally over NPR. By September, when the antenna will have been installed and tested, KLCC will be able to pick up transmissions via satellite from around the country. The project is funded by CPB.

BUDGET - The college budget committee unanimously approved a \$19.1 million general fund budget for the 1979-80 year, in action taken at its meeting last Wednesday night. LCC's Board is expected to officially adopt the budget and call for an election measure to raise the \$6.3 million levy needed to balance the budget. The measure proposed to voters will be for a one-year levy of \$713,605 beyond the 6% limitation. Even though the figure is some \$158 thousand larger than the amount requested last year, property taxes for LCC would drop 2¢ per \$1,000 true cash value.

ELECTED - The 1979-80 ASLCC president is Debi Lance, who beat her opponent Jeff Stockett by a four to one margin. Serving with Lance as vice-president is Gary Wilson. Stockett's running mate was Scott Seeley. The new treasurer is Maggie French, and Roger Bronson was reelected as cultural director.
