ELECTION - District voters said "yes" last Tuesday to a \$713,605 levy beyond the Oregon 6 percent limitation for LCC's 1979-80 operating year. It was the first time voters had supported the college on the first attempt at the polls on a money issue since May 28, 1968 when they approved a \$1.5 million tax base. The final tally on the June 26 election was 11,457 yes (52%) to 10,680 no (48%). Total votes cast: 22,137. Just under 16 percent of the registered voters went to the polls.

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BOARD OF EDUCATION - Last Wednesday night's Board of Education meeting included the unanimous approval of the college's proposed \$19.2 million budget for 1979-80. It came as no surprise however, since LCC District voters had already put their approval on it in the special election the day before. In other business the Board: approved three new courses, Single Parent Experience, Future of Energy, and Fiber Spinning and Dyeing; accepted a bid by Sani-Pac for garbage disposal. In personnel matters: Jim Ellison was appointed Associate Dean of Instruction, Instructional Services Division, a post he has held on an interim basis for the past year, and approved a Leave of Absence for Business instructor Gordon Wehner, who will reenter the business world to keep abreast of the current changes and discoveries in the accounting field. He will return to LCC Spring Term of the 1979-80 year. The next Board of Education meeting will be Wednesday, July 11 at 7:30 p.m. in the Board room.

BOARD REPORT - The Board of Education met last Wednesday night and elected Jim Pitney, a Junction City dairyman, as the new chairman for the 79-80 year. Ed Cooper, Veneta educator, is the vice-chairman. Pitney is just beginning his second four-year term, representing Zone 2. Cooper is in the third year of his first term and represents Zone 1. In other business: the Board approved a recommendation that the college hire a full-time typewriter repair technician rather than carry a maintenance contract with an outside firm; heard annual progress reports from the college's advisory committees; appointed President Schafer as clerk for the 79-80 year and also named as deputy clerks, Tony Birch and Bill Mansell, Administrative Services, Verne Whittaker, Financial Services, and Nile Williams, Community Education. After some discussion approved payment by the college of PERS contributions for management employees. In personnel matters: accepted with regret the resignations of Jo Wallin, Instructional Developer, and Brian Dwyer, Mechanics instructor; and approved a request for retirement from Howard Zink, Mathematics instructor. The next Board of Education meeting is August 15 at 7:30 p.m. in the board room.

WHAT THEY SAID - Quality instruction, personalized attention and the wide variety of classes were three things Lane Community College district residents said they liked about LCC in a recent phone survey conducted by Community Relations. Sixty percent of the 882 respondents said "yes" when asked if they had received any type of instruction in the last five years. Half of those polled said they took the class at LCC, while only 25 percent attended 4-year institutions. The reason most often given for taking the test was personal development or to advance or change occupations. Asked if they would be interested in taking future classes, some 61 percent said "yes."Slightly more women than men said they will take classes at LCC in the future with the majority of those who said they would be taking classes in the 25-49 age bracket. Most prefer to take classes in the evening. On balance, residents of Eugene-Springfield (where the survey was conducted) think LCC provides an important service to the community. Eighty percent of those surveyed think very favorably of LCC while only 4 percent rated the college below average. The C/CR office will be conducting similar surveys in other geographical areas of the District this fall.
