PAY SETTLEMENT - An overall pay adjustment of 11.22 percent was approved for management employees at last week's Board of Education meeting. That's the average. Employees on the low end of the scale will get more and those at the top will get less. Some 2.82 percent, on the average, will be in salary. The rest will be in fringe benefits such as the previously approved 6 percent contribution to PERS. Some 1.3 percent will go to annuities. Actual dollar figures for individuals will be set by the Board later. The Board also adopted a management compensation formula developed by the Local Government Personnel Institute at Salem. The plan provides for 15 pay ranges and allocates the 93 management positions among them.

Sandra Ing, former program manager for the Lane County Health Division, was hired as director of Student Health Services. Darlene Turpin, recently with the Eugene Post Office and formerly payroll supervisor at Sacred Heart Hospital, is the new Payroll Manager. Helen Hunter is now administrative secretary in the Office of Instruction. She comes from the office of vice president for academic affairs at the University of Michigan. The resignation of Barbara Stout as coordinator/driver of the Mobile Classroom was accepted. She has moved to Medford with her lawyer husband.

NO SMOKING - House Bill 2529 passed in this year's legislative session prohibits the smoking of any cigar, cigarette, pipe or smoking equipment in a room where a public meeting is held, even if the meeting is temporarily in recess. This relates to any regular or special meeting of a public body, whether or not a quorum is present.

MORE ON SMOKING - A study by John W. Jones of the Psychology department at DePaul University at Chicago has shown that cigarette smoke can make non-smokers aggressive. Subjects exposed to tabacco smoke (but otherwise left alone) proved to be almost as testy as subjects whom Jones (for purposes of the experiment) deliberately harrassed. --From OSBA Outlook & Review of 8-24-79

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

ABOUT THOSE TEMPERATURES - Administrative Services has hired Marquess Engineering of Spring-field to devise a plan for operating the College's very complicated heating/cooling system within President Carter's guidelines. He has decreed that thermostats be set no lower than 78 degrees F for cooling, no higher than 65 degrees F for heating and no higher than 105 degrees for domestic hot water. Our system uses cooling to produce heat for domestic hot water and other space heating or warm up. If we don't cool as much, we lose energy and replacement energy must then be purchased. It may cost us more to be uncomfortable.

LOW RATE - Night crimes against people on the LCC campus have totaled five incidents since 1975, according to Paul Chase, manager of Security & Communications. In 1975 there was an attempted rape near the Performing Arts Building and a knife fight between two males in the south parking lot. In 1977 there was an attempted rape in the south lot and an auto theft at knife point in the west lot. In 1978 there was an attempted rape in the west lot. Security people patrol the campus every night, holding physical violence to a minimum.

CETA STUDENTS - LCC had 358 full-time CETA-sponsored students during summer term. They were enrolled in such programs as accounting/clerical, clerk/typist, secretarial science, welding, automotive technology, electronic engineering technician and practical nursing. About 85 percent of local CETA people in training enroll here. Fall term enrollment is expected to total 400 to 500 full-time students. This level of enrollment all year would bring the College \$669,000 in tuition and state reimbursement, according to Mary Jane Eastman, CETA liaison representative.

CONTINUING - Today is the last regular day of registration for continuing students. New and returning students begin registration tomorrow in the auxiliary gym of the Physical Education Building. No enrollment figures were available at press time, but so far everything looks good.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT - If you didn't get a chance to preregister for the Disabilities Awareness workshop starting at 9 a.m. today, come anyway. It will sharpen your awareness of the barriers and problems faced by disabled staff and students. It meets in CEN 220 from 9-4 today. The new microcomputer lab is holding "open house" all this week. The lab is in room 201 of the Health Buiding. Free lessons today at 10 a.m., 2 p.m. and 8 p.m.

BOARD MEETING - The LCC Board of Education last night learned that progress is being made on the updating of the affirmative action plan. A complaint procedure for those not in the unions and for students has been completed and is being implemented. Some \$7,300 was allocated from construction funds to improve lighting in the drafting lab. A foodservice management contract with Mannings was extended through June 1982. Dollar figures for 94 management positions were approved; raises range from 8 to 13 percent with people in the lowest paid categories getting the largest percentage increases. New hires: Jill Hermanson from North Eugene High School in math, Dr. Dwight Miller from Pasadena City College in math, Dr. Mary Ann Manderino (last year's nursing chairperson) to the nursing faculty, and Cleo Beswick from Lane County to payroll assistant in Personnel.

HELLO - LCC welcomes Christine (Chris) Sajewski to the campus. Chris is the new research associate in the Office of Instruction. She replaces Lee Pettigrew who left in August to work toward a law degree at the UO. Chris comes to Lane from Michigan. She holds an M.P.H. in Health Education & Research from the University of Michigan.

NEW COURSES AND PROGRAMS - The Board of Education has approved the adding of these new courses and programs: Learning Skills Lab, General Pathology I & II, Orientation to Science, Clothing for the Young, Organizing Your Time, and a one-year certificate in Community Services.

CAPITAL OUTLAY - Some \$300,000 of the equipment allocation approved by voters last June is being distributed to departments. Student Services gets \$16,194; President's Complex gets \$2,800; Administrative Services gets \$77,483; and Instruction gets \$203,523. An additional \$100,000 is being held in reserve as a hedge in case revenues fall below projections. It will be distributed later in the year as the revenue picture becomes clearer.

PAYBACK - LCC's share of the payback to Pacific Power & Light, which had its property over-assessed statewide by \$5.5 million, will total \$18,855.84. It comes out of this year's property tax revenue collected for the College. All the Oregon community colleges except Treasure Valley at Ontario are among the various agencies which must share in the refund payment.

BEST WISHES - Dean of Administrative Services Tony Birch is resigning, as of October 19, to become controller at Whitman College at Walla Walla. He has completed five years at LCC and introduced systems and procedures which have given the College one of the best business operations around. Much success in the new job.

MORE WORK AT DOWNTOWN CENTER - The unfinished large classroom, room 302, at the Downtown Center will be completed after all. Savings on the total remodel are proving to be sufficient to finance this additional project. The space is in the neighborhood of 50 by 80 feet. A movable partition in the middle is being considered. A request for bids is being prepared.

ACCESS - Attempts to get the State Highway Department to agree to an access from I-5 to LCC's east side are still being pursued. A direct off ramp was proposed, but talks now relate to simply improving the existing access. But, negotiations will continue.

SALVAGE - Those four large steel-frame windows which used to grace the Downtown Center have found their way to Oakridge. Mike McCulloch of Danielson Architects purchased them and donated them for use in the senior lounge at the Willamette Activity Center. The center is a former elementary school which is being remodeled for social services, recreation and other community activities, including LCC classes.

UNANIMOUS - The LCC Board of Education quickly and unanimously approved the faculty contract for this and next year in a short session Wednesday night. Both sides expressed appreciation for the document, which improves faculty salaries and fringe benefits by an average of 11 percent each year. The College picks up the employee contribution to the Public Employees Retirement System, increases the salary scale by 3 percent, and provides for experience steps. Next year, the salary scale will increase 8 percent and a 3 percent longevity bonus will be paid to faculty who have been at the top of the scale for more than 5 years. Salary talks may be reopened if the consumer price index increases by more than 12.5 percent this year. In other business, the Board accepted the resignation of Dean Tony Birch and voted to send him a letter of appreciation. Larry Perry said the College is in good financial position in large measure because of Birch. Steve Reid declared "a sense of loss." Jim Pitney said Birch has been "often on top of things ahead of the rest of us." Catherine Lauris expressed gratitude "for the reforms he brought about." Next Board meeting: October 17 instead of 10th.

BUSINESS CENTER DIDN'T MOVE BACK - The Business Skills Center, coordinated by Betty James, did not move back to the Downtown Center with the other offices. Umpqua must pay \$12,500 damages to Peter Dizick, who gave up a job to take a welding course based on catalog information which said that he would be trained on equipment which the college didn't have. The moral is that colleges can't make promises, implied or real, that they can't keep.

MORE TRUTH IN ADVERTISING - Oregon College of Education at Monmouth bought a September 11 ad in a Salem paper heralding its Salem Extension Center and announcing that some classes would be held at Chemeketa Community College. OCE doesn't have a Salem center, however, and hadn't gotten Chemeketa's permission to hold classes there. Also, Chemeketa says OCE is trying to offer lower division classes in Salem by giving them upper division numbers. Example: Music 334, Learning to Play the Guitar. The Chancellor of the State System of Higher Education is reportedly investigating.
