HELP! ART SLEUTH NEEDED - The Art & Applied Design Department has an unusual situation that can be resolved with the cooperation of College departments. MORE ADULTS ENROLLED - Associate Dean Nile Williams hasn't any formal figures yet, but be believes that Community Education enrollment this term is up. If the surge in both credit and non-credit enrollment continues through the year, the College will exceed the legislature-imposed lid by perhaps 700 to 900 full-time equivalent students. That means no state reimbursement for the overage, unless the Emergency Board can be pursuaded to allocate more funds.

LITTLE EFFECT - An attempt to pursuade students to boycott the College Foodservices because of a 9 percent average rise in prices hasn't seemed to have much effect. "We've had the biggest week ever," says Dean of Students Jack Carter. LCC prices are still below comparable area food outlets, he says. The issue is expected to come up at the October 17 Board meeting.

BEEP, BEEP. BEEP. In our telephone system that is more commonly referred to as a confirmation tone--you have completed a correct procedure. It is used in different instances and usually is associated with the automatic queuing feature. If you dial the 9 for access to an outside line and you get the three short beeps (confirmation tone) just hang up your receiver within five seconds and when the next free outside trunk is available the system will call you and you can complete your call. The same procedure is true for using the wats lines. If you do not wish to to be in the queuing line, when you hear the confirmation tone, keep the receiver off the hook for more than 5 seconds.



IT WILL COME BACK TO YOU - The money you donate to "LCC Goes to the Movies" will return to LCC staff in many ways during the coming months. Twice yearly the Development fund requests idea papers from departments and offices for awards to be used from these monies. The idea papers are reviewed and approved by the Board of Trustees. For example a couple of years ago, the C/CR department was awarded a grant to cover the cost of developing a system and then implementing it for numbering the rooms of all buildings on campus. NEW EDITOR - Daily editor Kathy Dave has left LCC employment; her successor arrives next Monday. She is Jeannine Ferguson, former LCC student who has been a part-time writer here since January 1978. She is a U of O journalism graduate with some 10+ years experience in that field and in clerical roles. This week's interim Daily editor is Dona Dillon. The extension is still 2201.

LET US KNOW - If your office or department is sponsoring a special meeting or seminar, etc., which brings people to the campus, please notify the staff at the Information Window on the first floor of ADM. Visitors tend to stop at the window to ask directions and it's frustrating for both guests and staff if the latter does not know where your meeting is being held. The extension is 2201.

BOARD MAILING - Most of the material prepared for Board of Education meetings is open to public (and therefore staff member) scrutiny. The Library and each department is sent the agendas and minutes. Some 25 copies of the full mailing are sent to various managers, such as deans, associate deans, etc. If you can't find anyone in your area who has the full mailing, less confidential material, you can see it at the office of the assistant to the president, Bert Dotson, second floor, ADM.

CREATIVE MANAGEMENT - The Oregon Academy of Community College Managers is holding a seminar November 29-30 at Mt. Hood Community College. Dr. Robert Schwartz will speak on "Creativity in Management." LCC managers who'd like to attend should contact their deans immediately.

ENROLLMENT UP STATEWIDE - It appears from early, incomplete figures that statewide community college enrollment will be up at least 4 percent this year. State Department of Education estimates indicate that Lane, Linn-Benton and Umpqua could grow from 6 to 8 percent, Chemeketa could be up 4 percent, and Central Oregon and Rogue could grow 1 to 2 percent. Possible downward trends are seen for Mt. Hood, Clatsop and Blue Mountain.

BUDGET PROCESS - College Budget Committee work on the 1980-81 College budget could begin as early as November 28 this year. A document will be needed before the May 20, 1980, primary election if the College chooses to seek and increase in its tax base at that time.

SMOKING - Board policy forbids smoking in classrooms when classes are in session, in the Library, and in posted areas. Instructors are not to smoke while instructing a class. Instructors are asked to remind students of these rules at the beginning of each term.

WE'RE IMPROVING - Accident costs are going down, reports Bill Mansell, who among other duties is College Safety Coordinator. There were 48 accidents last year costing \$17,366. That compares to 86 accidents 2 years ago, costing \$26,475. Lost days last year totaled 458½, compared to 601½ the year previous. Falling, slipping and tripping have been reduced, but moving and lifting objects and working with machinery and equipment have been causing more mishaps. Plant Services, a high risk area, has improved its record significantly.

MAKING MONEY - The College investment program last year earned \$611,891. That was a gain of \$256,000 over the 1977-78. Annual yield rate was 9.08 percent, compared to 6.91 percent the year previous. Average daily investment during the year was \$6,648,000.

AGENDA - Tonight's Board of Education meeting agenda includes these items: budget preparation calendar, Budget Committee appointments, progress on Affirmative Action Plan, discussion of College long range plan, Adult Education instructor salary scale, course and program revisions, a number of personnel actions, discussion of serving beer and wine in the cafeteria, and a host of other reports. What could be a long meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. in the Board room.

ARCHIVAL WORKSHOP - Archivist Margaret Knutson recently attended an archival workshop at the University of Washington. She discovered that LCC's program stacks up with the best of them. Our records retrieval and microfilm programs are far advanced, she says, over most regional colleges and universities.

PRODUCTIVITY - Instruction college-wide generated 430 more full-time equivalent students last year than the year before, a 5.59 percent increase. The big gains were registered by Community Education, up 19.7 percent; Flight Technology, up 39.5 percent; Data Processing, up 14.7 percent; and Mass Communication, up 9.4 percent. Five departments lost emrollment, including Art, down 9 percent; Social Science, down 7.6 percent; Health Occupations, down 5.8 percent; Science, down 9.2 percent; and Mathematics, down .8 percent. Within Community Education, ABE/ESL grew 44.2 percent; Special Training grew 22.8 percent; High School Completion grew 23 percent; and CWE gained 14.1 percent.

CONFERENCE - A number of LCC people are on the program at the conference on "Serving The Needs of The Handicapped Through Community Colleges" being held today and tomorrow at the Eugene Rodeway Inn. President Schafer is presenting greetings and an overview of the conference; his assistant--Bert Dotson--is chairing the northwest section of this national meeting; Counselor Steve Hanamura is respondent to a video presentation by the U.S. Commissioner of the Rehabilitation Services Administration; Jean Bell, work activities coordinator, DTC, is part of an exemplary program demonstration; and Jan Mariano and Debbie Dorfler, students, will join with graduates Larry Craig and Chris Cassidy in a panel discussion by disabled people. The Conference is being conducted at 10 sites across the nation through videotapes and telephone hookups. Sponsor is The League for Innovation in the Community College. It's a new, experimental approach at hosting a national meeting without the heavy costs in time and money when all participants gather at one site.

STAFF DEVELOPEMENT - Carol Raney, regional coordinator for the Kellogg Foundation Project in which LCC is participating, has written a long, highly complimentary letter to President Schafer in which she identifies possible areas for staff development arising from her impressions from her recent visit here. She suggests these major areas: clarifying the direction of the college for faculty and staff not usually in contact with other program areas, clarifying and developing additional competencies required of middle managers, increasing organizational adaptability to meet new enrollment trends, providing new opportunities for faculty to develop additional teaching strategies to meet changing student populations, and improving information and marketing systems of the college. She suggests a series of workshops toward these ends. You'll be hearing more as concrete plans are developed.

The Board 1) adopted a draft of the College Affirmative Action plan, with additions and refinements to come; 2) approved a resolution asking the state to reimburse taxing bodies which have had to pay back Pacific Power & Light for overvalued properties (LCC's loss was \$18,855; statewide, the payback was \$5.5 million); 3) allocated \$10,000 for gravel and improvements to the southwest dirt parking lot; 4) learned that the ASLCC is investigating the running of a shuttle bus on a 30-minute schedule from 30th and Hilyard over the hill; 5) allocated \$40,132 to repair the heat recovery machine, refrigerant compressor, main air compressor and the main chiller; 6) allocated \$11,170 to remodel the former wrestling room into two classrooms; 7) approved buying a color tv camera and switcher for Media Productions at a cost of \$12,383; 8) approved revisions in a number of courses and changes in required credits for A.S. degrees from 120 to 112 and two-year certificates from 105 to 97; 9) reappointed Lester Zook of Springfield and Beverly Ficek of Eugene to 3-year terms on the College Budget Committee.



VALUE OF CAMPUS - Somebody asked what the College's tangible assets are worth. Part of the answer is that our total buildings and equipment are insured at \$41 million. That doesn't include the land. Interestingly, the cost of insuring all this is only \$71,794 this year and that's nearly \$6,000 less than it cost last year.

REPORT COMING - Data was collected from students at Fall Term registration regarding their child care needs. Data Processing is doing tabulation work now; a report should be out in the near future from the Child Care Task Force, a group chaired by Jeanne Armstrong of Home Economics.

THE BLACK BOX IS WORKING - Recent enhancements of the College's computer system are paying off. On-line registration financial data input has now been integrated with on-line student registration, accounts receivable and financial aid systems. It's too complicated to describe here, but it adds up to far less hassle for students and staff. The first use of the integrated system was at Fall Term registration and the report is that the system functioned smoothly and responsively. It also cuts down the staff needed at registration. About 1,000 more people were registered this year than last with no increase in staff. Kudos to Data Processing, Financial Services, Registrar's Office and Financial Aid staff.

WORKING SAFELY SAVES MONEY - The reduction in accidents among employees this past year, combined with a different payment plan to the State Accident Insurance Fund, has resulted in savings to the College of \$44,000.

STILL EFFECTIVE - The College's energy management system continues to save energy and dollars. Last winter's number of heating degree days was 12 percent greater than the 30-year average, meaning that it was cold. Thus, consumption and cost were up, but the average monthly cost per square foot was still lower than the 1976-77 year when mechanical adjustments to the system were started.

MORE DONORS SOUGHT - Jack Powell, head of this year's LCC United Way drive, says he's looking for increased participation. Last year, 34 percent of the classified staff donated, 39 percent of the faculty gave, and 61 percent of management helped out. The goal is to raise those percentages. Some 58 volunteers are helping contact staff members and Jack plans a report for each Friday during the next month on how the drive is going. Watch this space for details and be ready when the volunteer in your department contacts you.

AROUND THE OREGON COMMUNITY COLLEGES - Clackamas at Oregon City has signed a 2-year contract with its faculty at a 10.2 percent hike (including the PERS pickup) in the first year and 4 percent plus one-half of the Portland Consumer Price Index increase in the second year...Strong support has been identified for a bachelor's degree program conducted by Oregon State University on the Central Oregon CC campus at Bend...Umpqua CC President Bud Hakanson has been appointed to the 11-member Oregon Commission on Public Broadcasting.... Blue Mountain CC's radio station, KRBM, may hook into the OEPBS radio network next year.... Mt. Hood CC Board Chair Barbara Roberts will run for a legislative seat next year.

MORE ON OCE/CHEMEKETA FLAP - When the executive director of the Oregon Educational Coordinating Commission, T.K. Olson, was interviewed by Salem newspapers, he had this comment on Oregon College of Education's efforts to promote off-campus classes in Salem: "It isn't OCE's finest hour. The ad was really dumb. The headline was unfortunate, the text was unfortunate, the course descriptions were unfortunate, and the timing was bad. Other than that, it wasn't bad."

OEA SAYS THEIR PAY HIGHEST - The Oregon Education Association says it gets more bucks for its members. OEA says faculty pay raises at OEA-represented community colleges during the past four years averaged 6 percent higher than for non-OEA colleges. The OEA said all six of its represented faculties (Chemeketa, Blue Mountain, Clackamas, Lane, Rogue and Clatsop) exceeded the 37.6 percent statewide average pay hike for the four years. It notes that all but one of these colleges (Clatsop) granted pay hikes in excess of the Portland CPI as measured from January '75 to January '79. OEA says its members also get higher insurance contributions than faculty members at non-OEA colleges.

AVIATION MAINTENANCE - The Aviation Maintenance Technician program has been revamped to provide greater emphasis in the critical areas of Return to Service and electrical systems. Students will work on "live" (in-use) planes at the Creswell Airport instead of "dead" (out-of-use) planes as in the past. The rearranged curriculum will provide students more hands-on experience in the repair and maintenance of aircraft.
