ENROLLMENT CEILING MAY CAUSE PROBLEMS - The enrollment ceiling placed on LCC this year by the state legislature may result in the college having to turn away new students by spring term, according to Dean of Students Jack Carter. In dollar terms, the college stands to lose some \$500,000. The states bases its calculations on full-time equivalency. LCC's limit this year is 8,230 FTE; actual FTE could be as high as 9,000. Carter says the college has faced similar problems in past years, but the discrepancy between the ceiling and anticipated enrollments has never been this great.

LEADER - LCC's projected enrollment growth this year of 8 to 9 percent or more leads the college members in the League for Innovation in the Community College. Assistant to the President Bert Dotson is just back from a League meeting and reports that most member institutions are just holding their own in enrollment. A number of Oregon community colleges are projected to exceed the enrollment lids imposed by the Legislature. The community college presidents are expected to take the matter to the Legislative Emergency Board for possible additional funding next spring when enrollment figures are firmer.

SELECTED - Dean of Instruction Gerry Rasmussen is the only community college administrator in the nation selected to be part of the 1980 Visiting Administrators Program of the American Council on Education (ACE). He'll be one of 10 higher education people to go to Washington, D.C., during January-February-March to work in an administrative role in an as-yet unnamed federal agency. The federal government will in turn send 10 of its administrators to participating colleges and universities as part of an effort to acquaint its people with higher education and its management procedures. The Dean is to go to Washington next week to find out which agency will be his host. LCC also should be learning soon which federal administrator will be coming here.

FLU SHOTS - Starting Tuesday, Nov. 13, flu shots will be available at Student Health Services for eligible staff and students. The vaccine is supplied by the Oregon State Health Dept., so we must follow their definition of "eligible," which is: persons 55 years of age or older, or persons with chronic medical conditions. Flu shots will be available from 8 to $\overline{10}$ a.m. and from 2 to 4 p.m. There will be a \$2 charge for administering the vaccine. Persons who do not meet the criteria and who wish a flu shot will need to check with their private physicians.

Remember, if you or a member of your family requires a blood transfusion, you are eligible for blood replacement credits through the LCC Blood Donors' Club. From the U of O Faculty/Staff publication, Inside Oregon:

Autumn winds and rains are pushing the mercury toward a point when federally-mandated 65-degree maximum interior temperatures will begin to feel chilly.

The best way to stay warm in the office or classroom is "not to let yourself get cold or wet on the way to work in the morning, especially if you walk or ride a bike to campus," said Mel Jackson, who recently joined the Division of Continuing Education staff as a program coordinator.

Many of the same strategies for staying warm outdoors can be used to stay comfortable in cooler classrooms and offices, said Jackson, who studied outdoor survival training while he was with the Eugene Parks and Recreation Department. He has also taught survival classes at Lane Community College.

Even if you are just walking to the office from the parking lot, your feet and clothing below a raincoat can get wet. It is very important to have good protective footwear, he said, noting several commercial products which can be used to waterproof shoes.

An extra pair of dry shoes waiting at work can prevent a morning puddle disaster from causing an entire day of cold feet.

"Some people overdress for the weather. While they are biking or running to work, they begin to sweat and as soon as that dampness begins to evaporate, they begin to shiver and become very cold," Jackson said.

Even the new "breathable fabrics" can cause body overheating, he added. "Keeping part of the jacket or body covering open will avoid excessive overheating. Also, just walking or peddling a little slower will naturally regulate body heat."

The same overheating condition occurs when "students rush to class, sit down and continue to wear their outdoor clothing. They sit there for an hour, get overheated, begin perspiring and then return to the outdoors and become cold," Jackson said.

Learning to adapt to cooler interior temperatures will require new strategies for dressing, he continued.

"If you can keep your inner core area warm — the chest and abdomen — then the blood supply can keep the extremities warmer," he said. Vests, sweaters, and suit jackets help insulate this vital inner core area.

"Wool fabrics have a much higher insulation value because there are dead air cells in the fabric which reduce air movements the fabric," as well as providing additional protection against dampness, he said.

"The blood flows very near the skin

surface in the head and neck region, so it is important to keep the skin covered to conserve body heat," Jackson observed. Turtle neck sweaters, dickies, scarves or a hat will greatly reduce loss of body heat.

Many people complain of cold feet while sitting, keeping the blood warm enroute to the feet can increase comfort, Jackson said. Wool pants, heavy socks and dancer's tights will keep the chill off of the skin as well as insulating the blood enroute to the feet.

Office chairs that are too high and leave feet dangling in the air, "may be cutting off circulation to the legs and causing cold feet," Jackson said.

Desks located near doors may be exposed to constant air drafts and constructing baffles of light plywood or cardboard around the desk could reduce heat loss from under the desk, he added.

"If your office is located on a basement level or on a concrete floor, the floor may be conducting heat away from the room, Jackson explained. Installation of a floor pad under the desk area will effectively reduce heat loss.

"We are going through a change in our lifestyle and we are all going to have to learn to live and dress much differently," he concluded. "We have to learn to build insulating, protective shells that contain our own body heat." As the clothing manufactuers and designers get more pressure from the public, they will begin to change the styles and fabrics, making clothing more effective in cooler interior environments, Jackson said.



The committee proposes that the 4½ day proposal be implemented for summer session next year. A savings in utility costs of some \$18,000 for the summer is projected. RECIPROCAL AGREEMENT - LCC and Linn-Benton Community College have agreed to a reciprocal tuition agreement, starting next summer, which would allow students from one district to enroll in some programs at the other district at in-district tuition rates. The LCC Board of Education approved the agreement Wednesday night. It pertains only to a dozen programs at each college which are not offered at both institutions. Lane students may go to LBCC to study animal science, crop management, turf management, civil and mechanical engineering, graphic design, printing technology, metallurgical technology, nurse assisting, science lab technology, secretarial education, secretarial legal or water/wastewater technology. Linn and Benton students can come to Lane to study agriculture and industrial equipment technology, aviation maintenance technology, community service, dental hygiene, early childhood education, environmental technology, flight technology, insurance adjusting, legal assistant, practical nursing, radio-tv broadcasting or respiratory therapy.

PEOPLE - The Board of Education has approved contracts for two faculty members and accepted the resignation of a third. Tom Birkenhead moves from part-time to contracted status in the Business Department; Duane Iversen, athletic trainer in the Athletics Department, moves from classified to faculty status. Lori Wurtz, instructor in Health Occupations, has resigned from her dental position to move to Nebraska with her husband.

RESOLUTION - Jeanne Armstrong, Home Economics, wondered why the LCC Board of Education hadn't adopted a resolution supporting the International Year of the Child (this year). It turned out that they hadn't been asked. She asked, the Administration agreed to put it before the Board, and last Wednesday night the Board unanimously passed Resolution No. 190. It supports the right of all children to such good things as affection, love and understanding, free education, adequate nutrition and medical care, full opportunity for play and recreation, a name and nationality, special care if handicapped, relief in times of disaster, help in developing special abilities, a spirit of peace and brotherhood, and to enjoy these rights regardless of race, color, sex, religion, national or social origin.

He says that would avoid traumatic competition for students and ensure that each segment takes its share of retrenchment during the period 1986 to 1991 when the shortage of students is expected to be at its peak. Reaction to the proposal has been mixed.

The new contract is retroactive to last July, and includes a \$40 across-the-board increase for all classified employees, and repayment by the College of the \$9.22 per month insurance rate increase. Beginning Nov. 1, the College will pick up the PERS contribution for all employees, and beginning Jan. 1, 1980, vision insurance and improved dental insurance will be included in the classified employee benefit package. December paychecks will include a one-time incentive bonus of \$250 to employees who have been on step 8 for 3 years or more. Also included in the contract are step increments for each fiscal year through 1981, beginning July 1, 1979, as well as cost-of-living increases of 2% per year plus one-half the average of the Portland Consumer Price Index and the National Consumer Price Index.

NSF TO AWARD PUBLIC SERVICE SCIENCE RESIDENCIES - The National Science Foundation announces that it will award 30 Public Service Science Residencies for fiscal year 1980-81. 

NOTE FROM PRESIDENT SCHAFER - "Gratifying word from the Development Fund. Last month's stellar production of 'LCC Goes to the Movies' brought gifts in excess of \$50,000 from friends of the College. Judging from the many favorable comments I've heard, it appears that participants found this 'evening in the grand tradition' a memorable way to contribute to a worthwhile cause. We think the community will welcome encores to this elegant approach to fund raising. 'LCC Goes to the Movies' will be a tough act to follow. The remarkable efforts of volunteers like Dottie Chase, Herb Person, Dick Chase and so many others have created a precedent that we hope will set the stage for even more unforgettable evenings in the years ahead."

NOT TRUE - A complaint that LCC facilities at Creswell Airport are being used for private gain is simply untrue, says Associate Dean Jim Piercey. Two aviation mechanics alleged that aviation maintenance equipment has been used by students and instructors in private businesses. Piercey says student projects on live aircraft are performed free except for parts. Projects are chosen on the basis of meeting instructional needs and then on a first come, first served basis. Piercey says his own airplane has been rejected as a possible student project on the grounds of not fitting into the instructional program. Faculty are encouraged to do freelance maintenance work in order to keep their skills honed. But, says Piercey, they do it on their own time and use their own tools in accord with Board policy. LCC shares hanger space at Creswell with 3 private businesses, he says, and that may confuse the public as to which activity belongs to each of the 4 "roommates."

IN FINAL STAGES - LCC's collective bargaining agreement with its 300+ classified employees is virtually completed. The Board of Education on Wednesday night voted unanimously to implement the economic aspects of the tentative agreement. Formal ratification was delayed until the Board's December 12 meeting to allow more time for working out contract language. The good news is that the PERS and insurance pickups will mean more take-home pay in the November checks which go out today. Personnel Services is trying to get the retroactive pay increase into the December checks, which traditionally are distributed just prior to Christmas vacation.

APPLICATIONS BEING RECEIVED - The KLCC Advisory Commission has 4 of its 7 positions vacant. Station Manager Jim Dunne is seeking applicants. The Board of Education is expected to make the appointments at its December 12 meeting.
