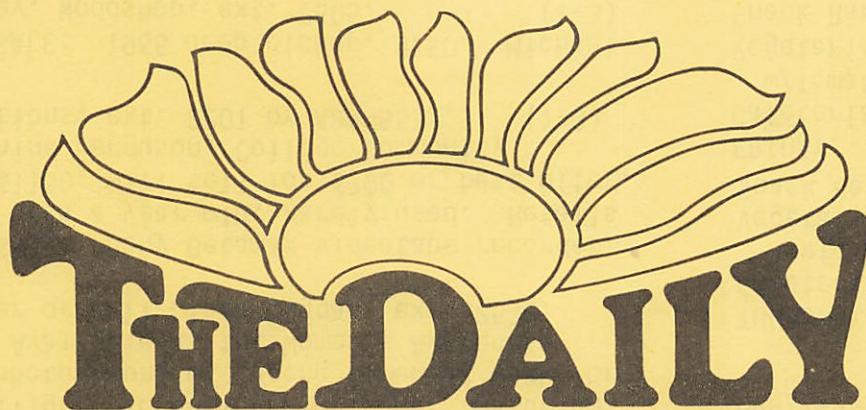

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STILL GROWING - Winter term credit enrollment is up about 100 FTE and several hundred more individuals have enrolled over this time a year ago, says Registrar Bob Marshall. The total is expected to be even higher by fourth week reporting time. Non-credit enrollment is predicted to hit a new high for winter too.

IN THE WORKS - A possible exchange instructional program with Mexico is being investigated by the League for Innovation, of which LCC is a member. Mexico wants technical training for its students and hence has begun talks with the League through its Consejo Nacional de Ciencia y Tecnologia (CONACYT). More details will be offered in The Daily as the alliance is firmed up.

FUNDING - A State Department of Education request for supplemental funds for community colleges which have enrolled more students than the number for which the Legislative funded them could go to the State Board of Education on February 21 and then to the Legislative Emergency Board on March 13. Former LCC President Bob Hamill, now associate superintendent of the State Department of Education, is organizing the presentation of the community college case. LCC could have as much as \$700,000 or more riding on the Board decision, depending on whether any of the over-enrollment will be funded and how much money, if any, is available for distribution.

LCC BENEFITS, BUT DOESN'T PAY - A question was recently submitted to the ANSWER coordinator asking how President Schafer's appointment to the Council on Post-Secondary Accreditation (COPA) benefits the college, and whether college funds are used for his expenses while serving with the organization. For others who might be wondering, President Schafer's answer, in part, is that COPA's purpose is to "promote and ensure the quality and diversity of American post-secondary education....Many segments of the public depend upon accreditation, including government, scholarship commissions, employers, counselors, and most importantly, students." Members of the LCC community benefit from the council's work both as taxpayers and as educators and students concerned with the quality of education. And no LCC funds are involved in the work of COPA--all Schafer's expenses are paid by the Council.

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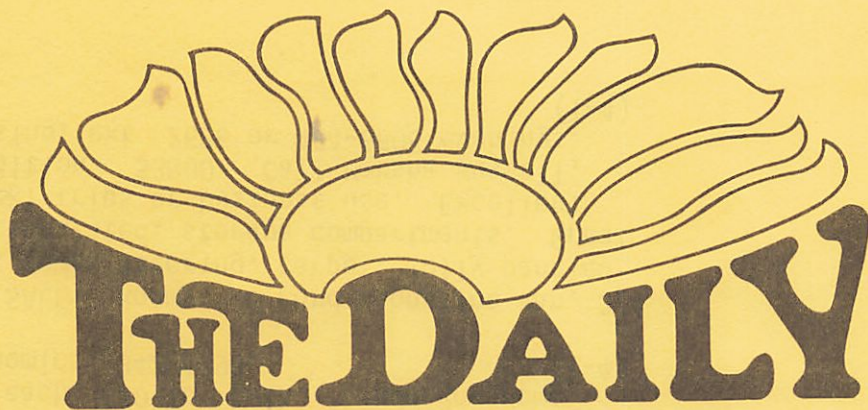

DROP RATE - A study of student drop rates by department over the past 5 winter terms shows that about 80 percent college-wide receive grades for the courses they enter. Dean of Students Jack Carter says his office hasn't come across comparable data for other colleges. Highest completion rates are in Health Occupations (about 95 percent) and Flight Technology (about 91 percent). Carter attributes this to high selection criteria. Lowest completion rates are in Math (about 65 percent), Language Arts (about 75 percent), Study Skills (about 78 percent), and Data Processing (about 79 percent). The other departments are in the eighties. Carter says Math and Language Arts programs across the country face similar drop rates. Many students find math and writing to be particularly challenging.

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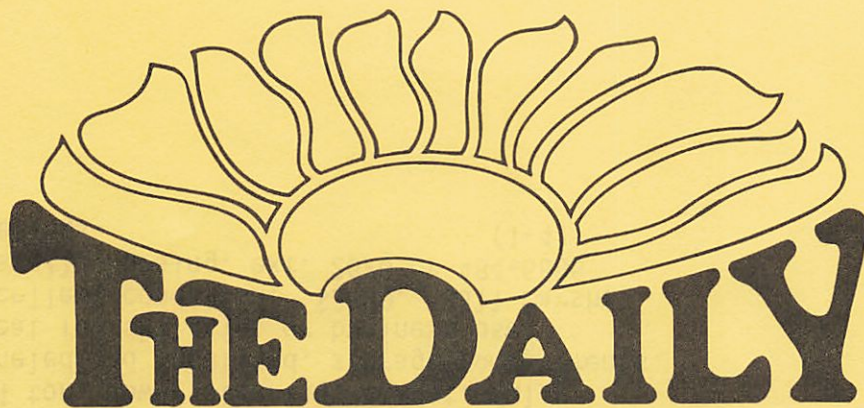

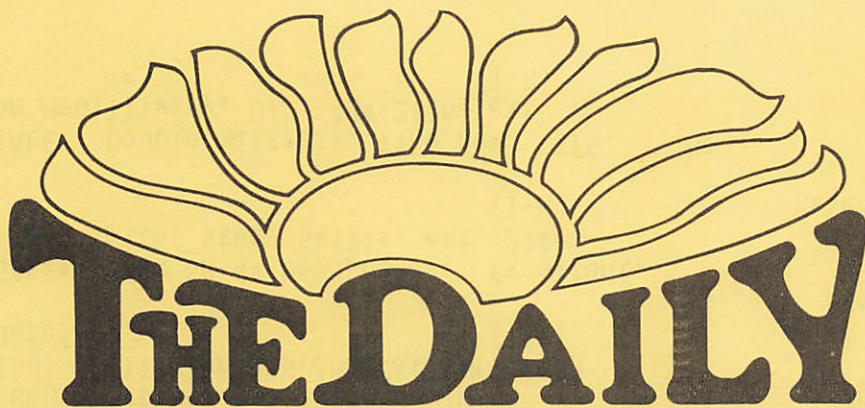

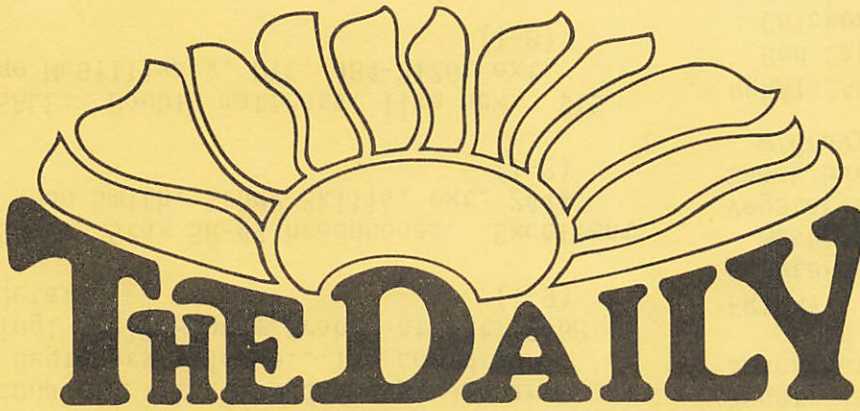

BOARD MEETING - Last night, before being chased home by a spate of snowflakes, the Board of Education received a plaque from Honeywell Corporation in recognition of the college energy management program, learned that recent graduate Jeff Arnold is now a staff assistant on U.S. Senator Mark Hatfield's staff, approved a completed affirmative action plan and was advised that it will be updated yearly, approved a KLCC federal grant application for more than \$100,000 to fund translators at Oakridge-Cottage Grove-Florence, discussed the nearly 13 percent increase in students at LCC this year and the fact that the surplus isn't scheduled to be funded by the Legislature either this year or next, and asked staff to work out a problem with Billy Boone who is a dissatisfied user of aviation maintenance repair services. Terry K. Olson of the Educational Coordinating Commission, in a general discussion of his agencies' activities, remarked that Oregon State University is experiencing an enrollment situation much like that of LCC. OSU also has about 1,000 more FTE students this year than the Legislature has funded.

GRANTS - The Trustees of the Development Fund Corporation met Monday and acted upon the idea paper applications that had been submitted. Sixteen grants were made in the amount of \$8,130. Projects from the following departments will receive whole or in part funding from the Development Fund: Human Awareness Council, Veterans' Office, Mathematics, Small Business Management, Office of Instruction, Phi Theta Kappa, Counseling, Mechanics, Women's Program, Financial Aid, Job Skills Fair, Health Occupations, Library, Performing Arts, and Special Training.

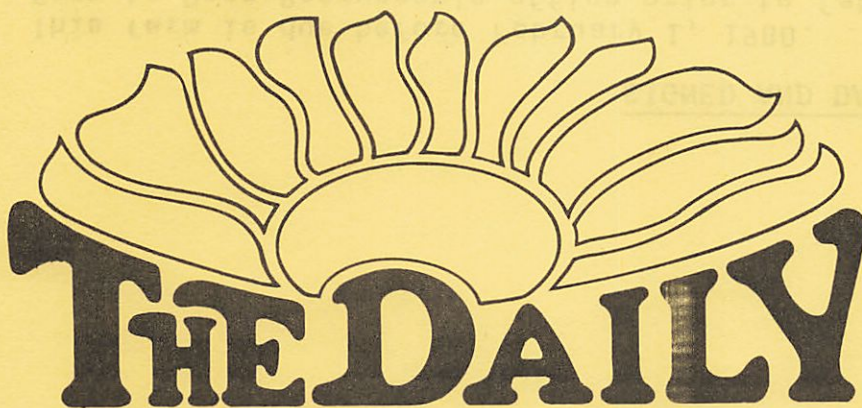

CONTRACTS - The Board of Education has approved contracts for three Language Arts instructors and extended the contract of Merle Ragland, Mechanics, beyond the usual retirement age to June 1981. Ted Berg has a full-time contract and Chinosole (P.A. Thornton) and Ann Marie Prengaman have half-time contracts, effective with this term, to teach composition.

MODIFIED - The reciprocal agreement between Linn-Benton Community College at Albany and LCC has been modified to delete priority to in-district students in the event any of the programs are oversubscribed. Students from each district can attend classes at in-district tuition in the other district in selected programs. LCC students can go to LBCC to study animal science technology, crop management, turf management, civil and mechanical engineering technology, graphic design, printing technology, metallurgical technology, nursing assistant, refrigeration and heating and air conditioning technology, science lab technology, secretarial education, secretarial legal and water and wastewater technology. LBCC students now have an open door to such LCC programs as agriculture and industrial equipment technology, aviation maintenance technology, broadcasting and visual design production, community service, dental hygiene, early childhood education, environmental technology, flight technology, insurance adjusting, landscape development, legal assistant, practical nursing, radio broadcasting, and respiratory therapy. The agreement starts with summer term 1980 and runs for one year, at which time it can be extended if both college's Boards agree.

APPOINTED - The KLCC Advisory Commission now has a full 7-person membership. The Board named Lester B. Hanson of KATR and Alex Stalowitz, occupation not learned, to fill the last two seats.

WHAT THEY WILL DO ON LEAVES - The four faculty members who will be on professional development leaves during spring term will be involved in a variety of interesting projects. Tom Wayne, biology, will work as an independent scientist at Oregon Institute of Marine Biology. He will do research and data analysis for publication. Steve John, chemistry, will study computer-assisted instruction and develop CAI programs to be used in LCC classes. Richard Null, environmental technology, will study applied botany (horticulture) at the University of California and Oregon State University as preparation for starting a horticulture program. Edna Jellesed will revise her business English text for possible publication, make accompanying videotapes, and produce an instructional package for educational television. The four will receive three-fourths pay while on leave.

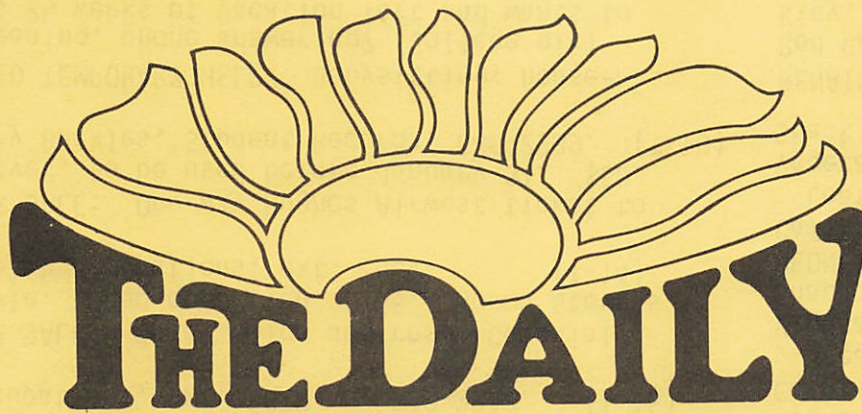

SOME PEOPLE'S TAXES GO UP - As of January 1, there was an increase in the social security taxes withheld from some employees' checks. The tax rate for 1980 continues at 6.13 percent, but it is applied to the first \$25,900 of covered wages. Last year only the first \$22,900 was taxed by social security. The college also has to pay a matching amount on the increase.

RESOLUTIONS - The Oregon School Boards Association has voted to oppose any initiative measure that "would place such restriction on educational financing as to result in an erosion of the capacity of schools to provide quality programs and services to students;" to oppose an educational voucher system because it would cause "profound educational and social damage;" to support an amendment to the state constitution providing for appointment of the superintendent of public instruction; and to ask the Legislature to amend the law so a school board member who moves from one zone to another within a district can continue to serve on the board until the end of the elected term.

REQUIREMENTS - The State Board of Education is seeking public reaction to its proposed stiffening of graduation requirements. High school students would be required to take a year of written composition, a year of U.S. history, a year of global studies, and an additional year of math or science. Also under consideration is a year of foreign language, fine arts or applied arts or a combination of the three. Required units would increase from 21 to 22. An evening meeting in Eugene on January 14 is scheduled to collect input. Watch the Register-Guard for an announcement of the meeting location.

NEWS FROM NURSING - Joann Kranc, nursing instructor, was appointed to the sub-area council of the Western Oregon Health Systems Agency (WOHSA) in Eugene. She was one of two appointees chosen from among 19 applicants. Kranc will serve as a representative of health care providers. WOHSA is responsible for health care coordination and planning in this area.... AND, all members of the 1979 graduating class of the LCC Practical Nursing program passed the state's LPN board exams in October. A perfect record bespeaks a quality program!

NEW PAY PROPOSAL - Chemeketa Community College at Salem will decide next month whether to adopt a plan which would eliminate automatic pay increases for faculty. A faculty-administration committee recommends that pay be based on performance. Instructors would be required to submit an annual developmental plan and submit a performance portfolio every five years, demonstrating recent scholarly and other accomplishments. A 10-member peer committee would decide whether a teacher could advance to the top of the salary scale.

TAX LEVIES - According to Oregon Tax Research, Oregon's community colleges levied nearly \$48 million in local property taxes for 1979-80, as compared with nearly \$41 million the previous year. This is an increase of 17 percent, compared with increases of 10.5 percent for schools and educational service districts, 7 percent for counties and 15.7 percent for cities. Property tax levies for the year for all local taxing districts topped the billion dollar mark for the first time, reaching \$1.014 billion, up \$98.2 million (10.7 percent) from the previous year. That rate of growth compared with the increase of 4.8 percent in 77-78 and 1.7 percent in 78-79. Because assessed valuation (also known as true cash value, or TCV) is increasing so rapidly, however, the statewide average tax rate declined from \$19.87 per \$1,000 of TCV last year to \$17.44 per \$1,000 TCV this year. True cash value for the state this year is \$57.6 billion, up 26.1 percent from a year ago.

RAPID GROWTH CONTINUES - Oregon's population increased by 2.9 percent during 1979, compared with an increase of only .85 percent nationally, the Population Research and Census Center at Portland State University estimates. Some county figures: Deschutes up 9.6 percent; Josephine up 5.1 percent; Clackamas up 5 percent; Washington up 3.3 percent. (The growth was measured from July 1, 1978, to July 1, 1979.) Total population for the state as of this past July 1 was estimated to be 2,544,000, up 21 percent since 1970.

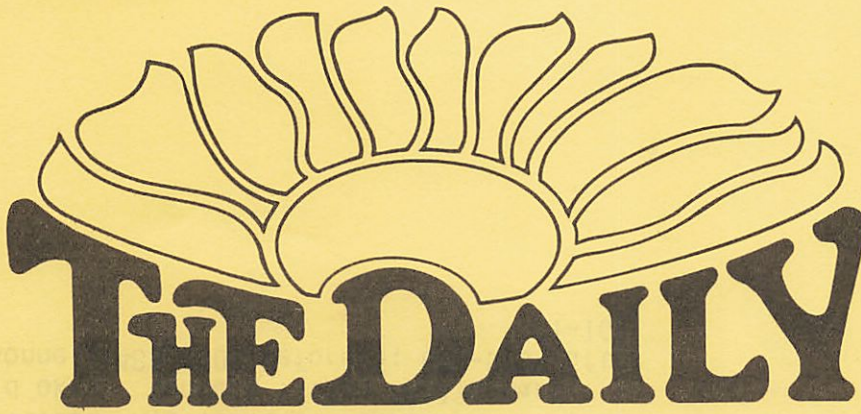

LANE WOMEN'S COLLEGE - An analysis of enrollment at LCC in the 5 years from 1975 through 1979 shows a growing percentage of women. Females, full-time and part-time, totaled 43 percent of the credit student body in 1975. By 1979, that figure had swelled to 56 percent. In numbers, female enrollment in the 5 years grew 46 percent. At the same time, male enrollment decreased 14 percent. If the college had not been willing to exceed its Legislature-imposed FTE reimbursement lid this year, it seems likely that it would have been mostly women who would have had to be turned away.

SAVING ENERGY - The College Facilities office has received an energy audit of the main campus which suggests that a number of options are available for further savings of energy. The ideas from the Eugene architectural firm of Childress & Childress-Ulman include weather-stripping of 300 exterior doors, enclosing several semi-exterior spaces to create airlocks, added insulation on roof surfaces and in attics, double glazing of windows, solar collection, vegetation screens, insulated drapes and shutters, airlocks at major door entrances, energy efficient future remodelings, and education in conservation. Facilities Director Paul Colvin commissioned the \$2,-00 study last month as a required first step in applying for federal grant monies administered by the state for use in energy conservation projects. Paul already has applied for \$40,000 for a laundry dryer exhaust heat recovery system. And he's about to ask for \$23,000 to hire an architect-engineer team to develop concrete proposals based on the Childress recommendations. Those who would like to read the 55-page energy audit may inquire at College Facilities in the Campus Services Building.

THINK INNOVATION - Rising costs of transporting the water in such grocery store products as soft drinks, beer, fresh meat, produce, canned juice, milk, canned vegetables and fruits (up to 95 percent water) are producing innovations in dehydration and irradiation, says the December 28 issue of Marketing News. Watch for ads hyping "the beer you love to reconstitute." Anybody got any fresh ideas for taking the water out of education?

OPPORTUNITIES - According to Fox-Morris Personnel Consultants of Philadelphia, salaries of professionals will be up 50 percent by mid-decade and 100 percent by 1989. More than 1.1 million data processing specialists will be in the field by 1985. Energy engineering will be a hot new career field. Women chief executives will be running many Fortune 500 corporations by the late 1980s. The Fox-Morris survey of 3,597 major U.S. employers is reported in the December 28 issue of Marketing News. P.S.: Skilled secretaries will earn \$28,900 in 1990.

LOTS OF \$\$ - The State Emergency Board will face a \$4 to \$5 million problem in March when it considers requests for reimbursement of community college overenrollment. The Legislature agreed to fund a 2 percent enrollment growth for this and next year. But, statewide FTE enrollment is up about 8 percent. Value of the overrealized FTE this year is expected to be close to \$2 million. Next year, it could be \$3 million. LCC's overrealized FTE this year is valued at \$716,000; it could range next year from \$1.5 to \$1.8 million if the college enrolls the expected 9,259 to 9,527 FTE students.

APPOINTED - Dean Jim Piercey has been appointed to a task force at Linn-Benton Community College which will develop materials for use in implementing a series of workshops for post-secondary vocational instructors working with disadvantaged and handicapped students. Piercey will critique the materials, which will emphasize adapting various vocational environments and curriculums to the needs of handicapped students. The project is funded by the Oregon State Department of Education.
