ON HOLD - Recent decisions relating to the moving of various office in the Center Building have been put on hold as a result of discussions at Wednesday night's special Board of Education meeting. The Student Senate, in particular, had objected to its planned move from the second to the fourth floor. The Facilities Management Committee will hold hearings in coming days to gather alternate suggestions for solving the Center Building problems of more space needs than available space to meet those needs. The Administration will report its findings and decisions at the February 13 Board meeting. Over the long haul, it appears that some major remodeling will have to be done. In the short run, some temporary relocation must be carried out to get the Career Information System back in operation. It has been shut down as a result of fire safety requirements which forced it out of the second floor foyer. The plan was to move CIS into what has been the Student Senate office, but this will now be reviewed.

AUTHOR - Grace Z. Cameron, supervisor of Student Records, is the author of "Oregon 'Quick-Draw' Transcripts" in the <u>Journal of Micrographics</u> for January-February 1980. The article describes LCC's computerized grade records system and how it makes for quick and easy issuance of transcripts to students.

SURVEY - Some interesting answers came out of a Business Department survey of fall term students in real estate classes. The 225 respondents said overwhelmingly that they want night rather than day classes, and they want classes to meet once a week, preferably on Tuesdays. By a large majority, they prefer lecture/discussions over other teaching methods; they want to hear examples of practical applications, and they like handouts by far over audiovisual materials or chalkboard presentations. They take the courses out of personal interest or for licensing purposes. They learn about the courses through the class schedule in the main, along with mail-out brochures. Only a few saw newspaper ads. Some 30 percent registered by mail. Steve Hamilton of the Business faculty conducted the survey as part of the Department's continuing efforts to meet student needs as perceived by students.

MORE NEWS....

ECONOMICS - The Commerce Department offers these national averages for 1979: Prices up 13%, income up 12%, taxes up 16%, after-tax income up 9%, rate of savings down to 4% of income-lowest rate in 30 years. What sent the CPI up was this group: retail energy up 37%, housing up 15%, food up 11%, medical care up 10% and transportation up 18%.

ANOTHER VIEW - In their new book, The Distribution of the Tax Burden, University of Virginia professors Edgar Browning and William Johnson say it isn't true that low income people pay a disproportionate share of sales taxes. They say that the top 15 percent of U.S. households pay approximately half of all taxes while the bottom 50 percent of households pay less than 15 percent of all taxes. Oregon is one of 11 states which doesn't have a general sales tax. The subject is bound to come up again as the Legislature limits property and income taxes.

MORE OF JARVIS - Howard Jarvis has his proposal to cut California income taxes by half on the ballot in June. Jarvis II would lop off \$5 billion annually, necessitating drastic layoffs for local governments and apparently community colleges. Jarvis was the proponent of Proposition 13, the 1978 measure which passed overwhelmingly and drastically reduced local property taxes. The prediction is that Jarvis II is likely to be approved, too.

TUITION - The Administration is making no recommendation at tomorrow night's Board of Education meeting, but a discussion is scheduled regarding a possible tuition hike. LCC is presently fifth highest in the list of in-district tuition rates among Oregon community colleges. Chemeketa is highest at \$150 per term and will not increase that rate this year. Umpqua already has raised its rate from this year's \$145 to \$170 next year. Central Oregon is considering a raise from \$125 to \$144, Linn-Benton from \$128 to \$141, and Mt. Hood from \$125 to \$150. Blue Mountain will stay at \$132. The State System of Higher Education will go from \$286 to \$315. If LCC were to increase tuition by \$1 per credit hour, the rate would climb from \$143 to \$154 per term for a full-time student, just under an 8 percent increase. A \$2 per credit hour increase would raise the rate to \$165, a 15 percent climb. The first option would add about \$206,000 to College revenues; the second would add \$412,000. A \$1 per class increase in Community Education would generate about \$15,000 and raise the tuition rate from \$17 to \$18, a 6 percent increase.

EARNINGS - Another record-breaking year seems assured for interest earnings on College investments. Projections by Acting Dean Bill Mansell indicate earnings of \$750,000 to \$800,000 by next June 30. The money will be divided 60-40 percent between the general fund and the construction fund, the latter getting the lesser amount. A total of \$7.7 million is presently invested, \$4 million in time certificates of deposit and \$3.7 million in repurchase agreements. Latest interest rates on some of the TCDs have run as high as 13.38 percent.

The E-Board will consider the request at its March 10-11 meeting at Salem. LCC, with its 1,000 FTE overrealization of enrollment this year could get the largest chunk of any monies granted. The request includes a new enrollment base for next year plus growth of 4 instead of 2 percent.

BOARD MEETING - If LCC doesn't get the nearly \$2 million being requested of the Legislative Emergency Board for this and next year, a budget increase of 44 percent would be required next year to serve 9,000 FTE students. Hearing that last night, LCC's Board of Education voted to serve 9,000 only if the money is granted. With it, the budget increase could be under 20 percent and the property tax increase about 11 percent. A decision on the amount of money to go on the May 20 ballot will be made March 26. In other business, the Board agreed to set next year's tuition at its March 12 meeting. And it was advised by President Schafer that he has placed Athletic Director Dale Bates on a year's probation and suspended him for a week without pay for arranging a one-credit P.E. class for a U of O football player without requiring him to earn the credit.

APPOINTED - Counselor Jack Shadwick has been appointed to a two-year term on the Oregon Commission on Indian Services by Oregon Senate President Jason Boe and Speaker of the House Hardy Myers. The Commission is an advisory body which serves as a liaison between the State of Oregon and Indian communities and groups.

ELECTED - Dean of Instruction Gerry Rasmussen was elected to represent the Northwest on the 13-member executive committee of the AACJC's National Council of Instructional Administrators. The group is for individuals involved in providing instructional leadership.

SEMINARS - Contact the Staff Development Office for information on Summer Seminars for College Teachers through the National Endowment for the Humanities. There are special seminars for community college teachers in anthropology, composition and rhetoric, English and American literature, history and political science. Stipends are \$2,500. Deadline for applying is April 1.
