TUITION - LCC's Board of Education will decide at its March 12 meeting how much to increase tuition for next school year. Figures of 8 to 15 percent have been discussed. Over the past 4 years, credit tuition has increased an average of 3.25 percent or a total of \$17. Non-credit tuition has increased \$2 per 30-hour class over the last 4 years, also a 3.25 percent increase. A \$2 per credit hour increase would raise an estimated \$412,000 in additional revenue and raise the full-time rate from the present \$143 a term to \$165, a 15.38 percent increase.

ACCESS - The State Highway Department has proposed that a direct access to the campus be added from 30th Avenue to the northeast parking lot. Lane County is now studying the proposal. An earlier idea of an access from I-5 to the northeast lot apparently has been abandoned.

EXPULSION UPHELD - The 1976 expulsion of a student from the LCC high school completion program has been ruled constitutional by a U.S. magistrate. The student, Dean Grazier, had alleged that the College denied him due process by expelling him for one year, and sought a court order declaring LCC's actions unconstitutional, and also asked for \$18,000 in damages. Grazier was expelled for disrupting a class and for intimidating students and faculty members by carrying a knife on campus. U.S. magistrate Michael Hogan said LCC presented persuasive evidence that officials involved in disciplining Grazier acted in good faith.





SECOND TRY - State Department of Education representatives go before a subcommittee of the Legislative Emergency Board today to seek a higher FTE student reimbursement level for state community colleges for next fiscal year. A request for \$4.8 million for both this and next year was flatly rejected Monday. That means no money for this year's overenrollment. If LCC could get some \$750,000 to \$1 million toward 1980-81, however, it would do a lot to solve next year's expected higher costs. Without that help, the College will have to drop enrollment levels for next year.

BOARD MEETING - The agenda for tomorrow night's meeting of the Board of Education includes a tuition increase for next year, discussion on next year's budget, and discussion of a request for formation of a part-time instructor bargaining unit. Dean of Students Jack Carter is recommending a 7.69 percent increase in tuition for in-district credit students, an 18.5 percent hike for out-of-state and foreign students, and an 11.8 percent increase for non-credit students. The increases would generate about \$220,000 in additional revenues for next year. The budget discussion will focus on whether the Legislative Emergency Board granted LCC additional funds for overenrollment at its meeting in Salem Monday and today. Without that aid, the College could have to ask for an increase in the local property tax levy ranging up to 38 percent. Open to the public, the LCC Board meeting begins at 7:30 in the Boardroom.

DEADLINE APPROACHES - The Lane County Fair is coming. LCC's booth will be located in the new Convention Center during Fair week, August 12-17. By now, departments should have received a memo giving information about how to become involved in the Fair project. The deadline for departments to submit their ideas and requests for funding is Friday, April 11. If your department has not yet received a memo, contact Jolene Bowers at ext. 2680.

TURNED DOWN AGAIN - The Legislative Emergency Board again rejected a state community college request for funding of overenrollment at its Tuesday meeting. The community colleges will now prepare a third proposal for submission to the E-Board at its April 10-11 meeting. LCC's share of the proposal will drop from the original \$1.9 million to, perhaps, several hundred thousand dollars toward next year's budget. That's IF we get anything. The forecast: higher tuition and reduced spending.

ROMANEK REACHES INDIA - Richard Romanek, Electronics instructor, has received a letter of thanks from a 72-year-old retired physics professor in New Delhi. The letter commends Romanek's book, Introduction to Electronic Technology, which the letter writer, C.L. Vohra, says he found after a search of many days, and has studied intensively. Vohra requests the names of more books to feed his new interest, and closes his letter with a bit of advice: "To live a fuller and meaningful life, no man should be concerned by his date of birth."

MORE APPRECIATION - President Schafer has received a letter of thanks from Ralph Rands, Associate Professor of Education at the U of O, for assistance given him in a seminar on Community College Programs by Community Education staff members Nile Williams, Carl Horstrup, Dick Newell, Bob Way, Naomi Soules, Al Owens and Loretta Daniel. Rands says his students were "very favorably impressed and spoke highly of the calibre of people Lane Community College has in this very important component of the college."...Bill Dotson was commended in a letter from Tom Hagg, instructor of Business Management at North Eugene High School, for his presentation on starting a business given to a Business Management class.

ELECTED - Buck Bailey, Counseling, was elected to the Credit Committee of Selco Credit Union in its February meeting. With Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts and Ron Edelman on the Selco Board of Directors, LCC has a healthy representation at Selco.

PROPERTY TAX LEVIES - On March 25, five community colleges and the Treaty Oak Education Center in The Dalles will ask local voters to approve 1980-81 property tax levies. Only one of the five, Southwestern, has a tax base. The base would generate \$1,472,120; SWOCC is asking its voters to approved a levy in excess of that by \$567,799. Treaty Oak is after a 3-year rate-based serial levy that would generate about \$140,000 in its first year. Blue Mountain is submitting a levy of \$2,335,439; Central Oregon, \$2,852,524; Clatsop, \$1,551,556, and Chemeketa, \$7,112,926.

STATUS OF FACULTY BARGAINING - Southwestern Oregon became the first community college to declare an impasse in bargaining a faculty contract for 1980-81 with a mediation session held March 6. Central Oregon was not far behind, scheduling its first mediation session for March 11. Negotiations continue at Blue Mountain, Treasure Valley, Rogue and Umpqua. LCC and others are in the midst of multi-year agreements. Portland CC's faculty has agreed to a one-year extension of its contract, which was scheduled to expire at the end of this year.

MT. HOOD FACULTY AFFILIATES WITH OEA - The Oregon Education Association (OEA) picked up its third community college affiliate of the year as the Mt. Hood faculty association voted to join. OEA now represents nine of Oregon's 13 community colleges, including LCC.

CHEMEKETA COULD LOSE - Marion County's Investment Pool, funded by money from local governments within the couty, is facing a loss of about \$20 million as the result of speculative investments. Chemeketa Community College faces the prospect of losing about \$1.7 million of the money it had invested in the pool; as a result, Chemeketa has begun a hiring freeze, eliminated out-of-state and is discouraging out-of-district travel. President Art Binnie has said he does not anticipate any staff layoffs as a result of the crisis.

KLCC - This week and next, KLCC's film and theatre reviewer John Mitchell presents 10-minute reviews of the winter/spring season of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival in Ashland. The reviews, aired at 8 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, will include audio portraits of the events recorded live last week on the stage in Ashland. CALIFORNIA HAS MONEY WOES, TOO - California's community colleges are facing the prospect of charging tuition for the first time ever if the state income tax initiative known as Jarvis II is passed by the voters in June. The initiative, which basically cuts the state's income taxes in half, is expected to produce a revenue drop of nearly \$5 billion. Gerald C. Hayward, chancellor of the California community colleges, says his schools face a revenue loss of between \$100 and \$360 million, and unless they limit enrollments tuition is almost a certainty. Community colleges received about 80 percent of their operating budgets from the state this year.

It is to include a tuition increase ranging from about 8 to 16 percent and a speculative \$400,000 allocation for overenrollment from the Legislative Emergency Board. RUNNING AGAIN - Board of Education incumbents Steve Reid and Ed Cooper have announced they'll seek re-election via the June 24 ballot. Reid has been on the Board since 1971 and Cooper since 1976. Each seeks a new 4-year term.

BOARD MEETING - Budget development and a tuition increase head the agenda of tonight's Board of Education meeting. Open to the public, it begins at 7:30 in the Boardroom. Up for consideration is a proposal for a \$22.8 million budget for next year. It is 16 percent greater than this year and would need a 26 percent increase in local property taxes (less state offsets) to fund it. On May 20, the public will be asked to approve an increase in the LCC tax base from \$5.9 million to \$7.9 million. If that request is rejected, the June 24 ballot will carry requests for \$1.7 million on an A ballot and \$338,879 on a B ballot. The latter two amounts are beyond the existing tax base. Proposed tuition increases for next year include \$22 per term for full-time credit students, \$110 per term for out-of-state and foreign students, and \$3 per class for adult education students. At these rates, tuition next year should generate an additional \$457,000 in revenue.

IMPACTFUL TEACHING - Every activity in use in teaching is presumed to have some influence for learning. Deciding which activity has the greatest impact is the subject of an innovation abstract, "Choosing Learning Activities for Greater Impact," now available at instructional departments and the Staff Development office.

STILL GROWING - A new Spring Term enrollment record is forecast by Registrar Bob Marshall. As of last Friday, enrollment was 167 full-time equivalent students ahead of spring 1979. By the completion of registration this term, he expects the old record to be beaten considerably.

FACULTY MEETING - A meeting for all contracted faculty is scheduled for Thursday at 3 p.m. in Forum 308, to discuss opening negotiations for next year's contract. The discussion will include the LCCEA bargaining committee and Al Hein, chief negotiator.


