



In priority order, they are: (1) to investigate and increase productivity in all areas of the college; (2) to improve the effectiveness of all staff members; (3) to improve the economic stability of the college; (4) to explore methods by which educational services can be conveniently offered to all residents of the district; (5) to concentrate on the establishment of a strong curriculum development capability; (6) to develop, implement, and maintain a continuing, comprehensive public information program which maintains the college's image throughout the district; (7) to improve information processing and reporting systems; (8) to improve the quality and quantity of physical facilities. To read the full report, inquire at the Facilities Services office in the Campus Services Building.

GOOD SHAPE - Eight months into the fiscal year, the college's financial picture looks good, Dean of Administrative Services Bill Berry reports. Lane County property tax collections are approximately 5 percent slower than last year. The attempt to build a \$750,000 cash carryover for next year's budget is moving along well, with most of that already assured.

SUMMER RENEWAL FOR FACULTY - Stanford University is sponsoring a faculty renewal workshop, August 4-15. The Melon Foundation is covering all costs and LCC will pay travel for two participants. MOST DEPARTMENTS GROWING - The projected FTE student gain of 1,277 this year is spread among most instructional departments, according to a study by Juanita Foellinger in the Office of Instruction. Division A grew by 215 FTE, Division I by 321 FTE, Community Services by 706 FTE and Instructional Services by 35 FTE. Big gains included 319 in ABE/ESL, 220 in Adult Education, 104 in Business, 98 in Special Training Programs, 85 in Mathematics, 68 in High School Completion, 51 in Data Processing, and 50 in Language Arts. Cooperative Work Experience grew by 52 FTE, though the gain was credited to participating departments. The only drop in credit programs is in Mass Communication, which is 4 FTE behind last year.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION - The Office of Instruction has completed modification of its affirmative action goals. It now has four main objectives. Because there are no minorities among the 38 instructional administrators, an attempt will be made to hire at least one minority in the next 5 vacancies. Because there are only 8 females among the 38 instructional administrators, an attempt will be made to promote or hire at least 3 women among the next 8 appointments. Because several departments are comprised totally of Caucasian staff members, an attempt will be made to hire 2 or 3 minority faculty members in the next 10 vacancies. Because some departments are either all male or all female, an attempt will be made to hire 3 or 4 opposite sex staff members in the next 10 vacancies.



FOURTH UNION - LCC's Board of Education has recognized the Part-Timers Association as the fourth collective bargaining unit on campus. The state Employment Relations Board will be asked to make a unit clarification, meaning a decision as to those eligible to be in the union. Then the college and union representatives will negotiate a contract. About 60 to 70 teachers apparently will be eligible for membership. Spokesman for the group has been John Duncan of Study Skills.

HOLDING THE LINE - Art Tegger, Faculty Association president, told the Board of Education Wednesday night that his group will forego its right this year to renegotiate salaries. That right apparently accrued because the cost of living increase exceeded 12.5 percent. Tegger says faculty members don't want to be in the position of saying to their neighbors: "We're sorry you're out of work; we want more money." He asked that the Administration continue to work with the Association "to avoid using retrenchment as the first line of budgetary defense. Candidly, I don't think anything would so violate the spirit of what we are announcing tonight, or make the faculty more militant." He invited the Management Group, which is informally negotiating salaries for next year, to "follow our leadership."

REELECTED - All three officers of last year's college Budget Committee were reelected Wednesday night to serve again through this year's budget process. Edna Wooten is chairperson, Ken Parks is vice chair, and Jim Pitney is secretary. The Committee will meet at 8 p.m. in the Boardroom on each of the next two Wednesday nights to continue the review of the proposed budget for next year. Financial Services Director Verne Whittaker is conducting the tour through the numbers.

LEARNING - Ways to help students in the lower third academically to learn are described in a new innovation abstract by K. Pat Cross, "New Education for the New Student." She advocates teaching skills that deal with working with people, things and ideas and offers a checklist of conditions for effective learning. Instructional department heads have copies, as does the Staff Development Office.

READING - A simple method for "Determining the Readability of Your Teaching Materials" is described in an innovation abstract by that title. Read it at the office of instructional department heads or in the Staff Development office. The abstract details the method developed by Edward Fry at Rutgers University.

The Board of Education will consider the suggestion further at one of its spring meetings. The approved total budget is 16 percent greater than this year, in recognition of inflation and enrollment growth. Property taxes needed to fund the budget total \$7.9 million and that amount will be placed before voters May 20 in the form of a request for an updated tax base. The owner of a home assessed at \$55,000 would be asked to pay an estimated \$10 additional next year for LCC.

TOP TEACHER - Freeman Rowe, Biology, is LCC's 1980 Outstanding Instructor of the Year. "Considering all the great people who work at LCC," said Rowe, "it's really a great honor." He will receive a plaque at the May 14 Board of Education meeting. At LCC since 1967, Rowe was part of the 1978 League for Innovation summer study in the Mohave Desert. He has taught the popular Natural History of Baja class the last two Christmases in Mexico, following a professional development leave in that area in 1976. For the past five summers, he has taught Plants of the Wallowa Mountains for Eastern Oregon State College. His long list of memberships includes the Mt. Pisgah Arboretum Society and the National Mycological Society. He was selected Tuesday from a list of student-staff nominees by a committee which included three past winners of the award: Sheila Juba, Language Arts; Leland Halberg, Mathematics; and Jay Marston, Science. Also on the committee were Gary Wilson, student; Pat John, Study Skills; Jim Piercey, associate dean, and Larry Warford, assistant to the dean of instruction.

"A GREAT LOSS" - The death Tuesday morning of diesel instructor Merle K. Ragland was termed "a great loss to the Mechanics Department" by Howard Dull, department head. He described Ragland as a high caliber teacher who had been in heavy equipment-truck repair almost all his life. TRYING AGAIN - The issue of increased funding for Oregon's community colleges toward next year's budgets goes before the Legislative Emergency Board today and Friday. Because of higher than anticipated enrollments, the State Department of Education requested \$4.8 million at the E-Board's March meeting. That was rejected and a compromise plan suggested by Senate president Jason Boe. It would provide limited funding only for those colleges which exceed next year's appropriated enrollments by 6 percent or more. The Boe plan was defeated last month, but pops up again this week with the State Board and the community colleges supporting it. LCC had the largest enrollment gain in the state this year and stands to get the largest bite of the new money, if any is approved.

Participating agencies paid 25 percent of the cost.

GROWING USAGE - The Board policy which permits citizens 62 and older to take classes tuition-free is attracting a growing number of retirees and near-retirees to LCC. This year, 1,863 people signed up for Adult Education classes. That's a 30 percent increase over last year. And 277 people this year enrolled in credit classes, a 49 percent increase. Tuition waived this year was worth \$66,776. The numbers were generated by John Wilson and the Information Services staff.

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

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

ELECTED - Bob Way, CWE director, has been elected to a one-year term as vice president of the 1,200-member national Cooperative Education Association. Part of Bob's job is to be in charge of the program for the group's April 1981 national conference in Boston. The organization includes members from public and private 2 and 4-year colleges and universities and a few employers. Bob says the Boston Marathon is scheduled to be run past the conference meeting site at the same time part of his programming is to take place.

NO MONEY, PROBABLY - The hope that LCC would get something in excess of \$400,000 from the state for overrealized enrollment may not be realized. The Legislative Emergency Board for the second time has turned its back on the request, though leaving the door open for a third try. However, the votes don't appear to be there.

INELIGIBLE - Community college and education service district employees are not eligible to serve on their governing boards, says the Oregon Government Ethics Commission. The law doesn't specifically mention the two type of employees, but they are covered by the doctrine of incompatibility of public offices, since one office is directly subordinate to the other. The same argument was offered earlier in Attorney General Opinion No. 7532. The Ethics Commission position was stated in an April 8, 1980, letter from Executive Director Betty J. Reynolds to Associate Superintendent Milt Baum of the State Department of Education.
