ELECTED - Bill Dotson and Bill Tweedie, instructors in LCC's Small Business Management program, have been elected to co-chair the 1980-81 group of Northwest Small Business Management instructors. The group meets for three conferences over the course of the year to review and update small business management programs. With Dotson and Tweedie as chairpersons, the 1980 conferences most likely will be held in Eugene. The program uses the University of Minnesota Model of small business management instruction.

APPOINTED - Dan Hodges, Counseling, has been appointed to a 5-member panel which will review Oregon's General Educational Development (GED) testing program. State school Superintendent Verne Duncan appointed the committee to look at such issues as test scores for passing grades and age requirements for the test.

ALCOHOL FUELS - LCC will sponsor an Alcohol Fuels Public Workshop on Friday, June 6, from 9 to 5 in Forum 308-309. The workshop is free and open to the public. Planned agenda items include a keynote address by Terry Edvalson of Eastern Oregon State College, a noted expert on alcohol stills; a demonstration of a portable working still; a presentation by Lane County Agent Mike Stoltz on feed stocks used in the making of alcohol fuels; and a talk by Bob Maxwell and Henry Naessens from the Mechanics Department on conversion of automobiles to alcohol fuel use. 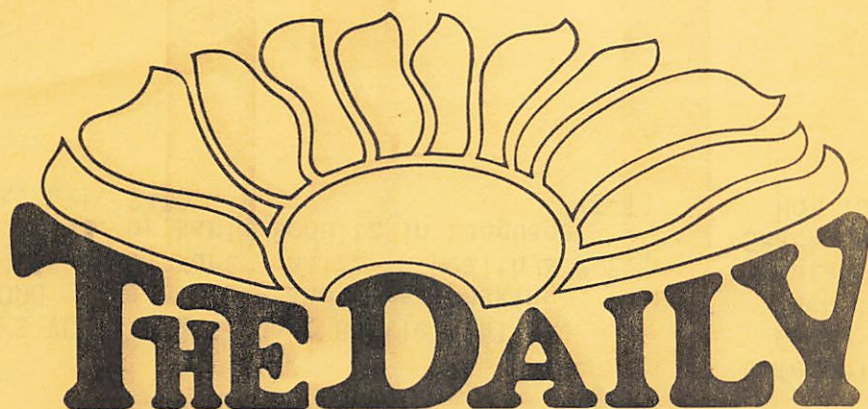

CATALOG - LCC's 1980-81 catalog booklets are now on campus. All but booklets 2 and 9 (Student Information and P.E.) are being distributed. Those two booklets are defective and are being returned to the printer. If anyone has copies of either of those 2 booklets it is essential that they be returned to Admissions immediately.

STUDENT TRANSFERS - The State System of Higher Education says 2,400 of its students enrolled for the fall term of this academic year were transfers from Oregon community colleges. This is up only slightly from the previous year. But the State System's data report says there were 25,530 students enrolled in community college transfer programs during the fall term--up a whopping 10.5 per cent from the previous year. Showing the largest percentage increase in lower division transfer enrollment (at 26.6 per cent) was Southwestern Oregon, following by Chemeketa (up 25.9 per cent) and Lane (up 22.1 per cent).

AWARENESS - "Awareness Today, Act Now" is the theme for a 3-day awareness "happening" this Thursday, Friday and Saturday, aimed at improving communication between two supposedly different groups of people--able-bodied and disabled. "Awareness Today" will include lectures, demonstrations, awareness experiences, panel discussions, and films--all designed to be educational, experiential and fun. Most events will be at LCC, with others scheduled for the downtown mall, Saturday Market, Harris Hall and the LCC Downtown Center. A day-by-day agenda is posted in the Staff Development Office, and is also available from Bjo Ashwill, Counseling, ext. 2239.

FEW ACCIDENTS - Accidents at LCC this year have decreased significantly. Bill Mansell of Administrative Services reports 34 accidents from July 1 to March 31, down from 48 in the same period a year earlier. Cost was \$10,256 compared to \$17,366 last year; lost work days totaled 126, compared to 458½ a year earlier. Custodial, maintenance and grounds--high risk areas--continue to work at a low accident rate. Athletics has been the big cost item this year, with two accidents costing \$5,573. It appears that the College will collect a large insurance premium refund again this year, proving that safety pays.

MAKING PROGRESS - Adjustments to save energy are underway in several areas. All incandescent lights are being removed, replaced, or wattage reduced as each campus area is relamped. Forty-watt fluorescent lamps are being replaced with 35-watt lamps as each area is relamped. Areas where lighting can be reduced are being identified. Ballasts in fixtures which already have lamps removed are being disconnected as electrician time is available. Work is being done by Facilities Services crews.

ENERGY SEMINAR - Staff or students planning to attend the energy seminar on Friday, May 16, are reminded that they need to call Division of Instructional Services, ext. 2360, and leave their names with Carol Clarke. Lee Johnson of the regional office in Seattle will be present to talk about federal programs and a speaker from the Oregon State Department of Energy will discuss the state programs. Anyone with a concern for any aspect of energy issues is urged to attend. There will be a period for open discussion and questions.

RESIGNING - Dr. Clint Nelson, supervising dentist for dental auxiliary programs, and Brenda Smith, clinical supervisor in dental hygiene, will leave the Health Occupations faculty at the end of spring term to pursue other opportunities.

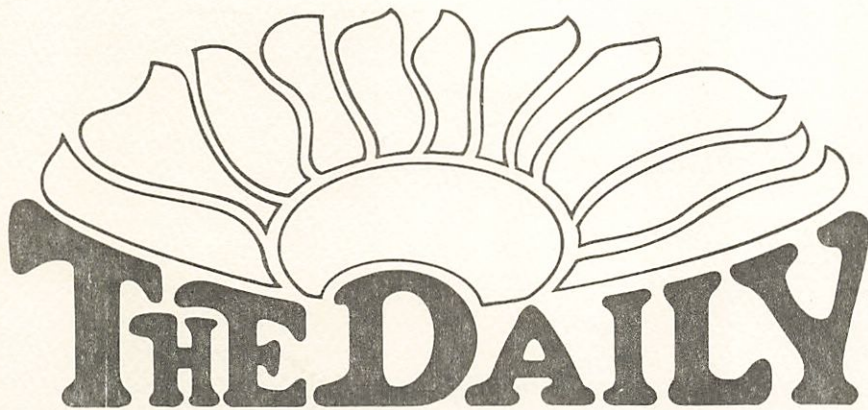

BOARD MEETING - Your LCC Board of Education meets Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in the Boardroom. Freeman Rowe, teacher of the year, will be honored. Also on the agenda are approval of a two-year energy technician program, a construction priorities report, award of Board scholarships to students at the 23 in-district high schools, advisory committee appointments, and approval of an allocation of \$8,862 to install automatic door openers at two Center Building doors. One on the first floor opens to the cafeteria; one on the second floor opens to the lobby. If you'd like to read the Board mailing, inquire at the office of the assistant to the president in ADM 213.

CONSORTIUM - At a recent meeting of Oregon community college deans of instruction, it was proposed that the 13 colleges band together to form a telecommunications consortium. Lane already works closely with Chemeketa, Linn-Benton, Southwestern Oregon, Umpqua and Rogue. And it looks like much more televised instruction, both credit and non-credit, is in LCC's future. It's the trend nationally--73 percent of all two-year colleges use TV in some way. Some 160,000 students are enrolled. At LCC, the courses have been: The Drama of Child Development, Consumer Education, Your Health--Your Choice, and Introduction to Business. Enrollment has totaled 233 people. If you want to get a course you teach onto the air waves, contact Associate Dean Jim Ellison.

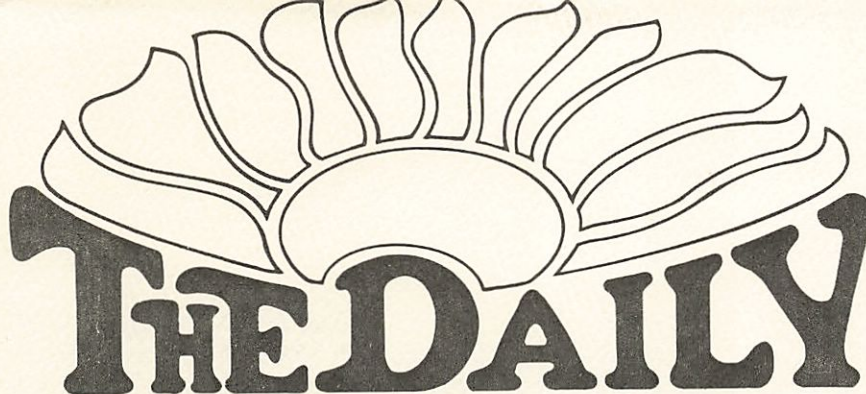

BUDGET ELECTION INFORMATION - Following is a copy of a news release, printed here for the information of LCC staff.

Faced with growing numbers of people who want to attend, LCC is asking voters at next Tuesday's election to approve an increase in the college's tax base from \$5.9 to \$7.9 million.

"We were funded this year for 8,230 full-time equivalent students," says President Schafer. "But we expect 9,230. And that could grow to 9,500 next year."

The college is getting by this year by using cash reserves, Schafer said, and increasing productivity where possible. An attempt to get additional monies from the Legislative Emergency Board was unsuccessful.

"The irony," he said, "is that when funds are scarce everywhere, more demands are placed upon us. It's well documented that when the economy is good, people work. During recessions, they turn to the community college. If the recession remains or deepens, more students will attempt to attend LCC."

To meet enrollment needs and inflation, the college wants to increase its operating budget by 15.5 percent to \$22.8 million. Some two-thirds of that comes from tuition and fees, state contributions and federal and other grants.

The financial impact of the proposal would be greater on individual students than on most homeowners, Schafer said. Students will pay tuition increases next year which collectively will cost them an extra \$457,000. Full-time in-district students will pay \$165 per term. That's 15.38 percent more than this year and is second highest among Oregon's 13 community colleges.

The proposed property tax increase would cost the owner of a \$55,000 home around \$10 additional for LCC for the year.

If voters reject the May 20 tax base proposal, they will have an opportunity to vote on a one-year levy in excess of the 6 percent limitation on June 24. The proposed increase of about \$2 million would remain the same and appear on "A" and "B" ballot measures.

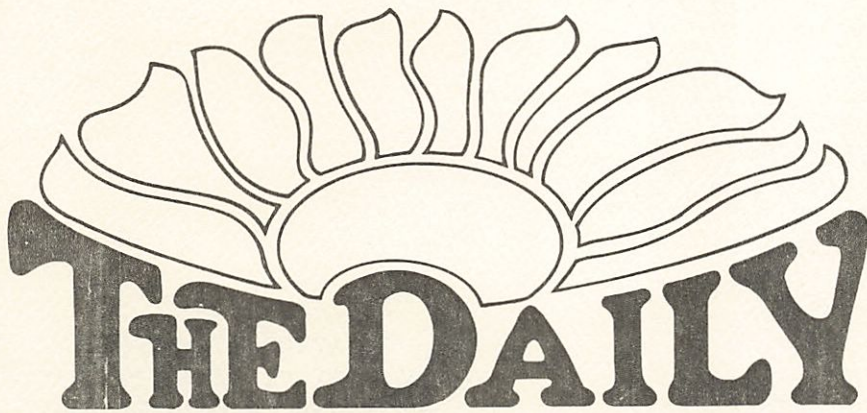

SOLAR WORKSHOP - This September, LCC will host a 5-day solar training workshop for 30 vocational/technical educators from 15 community colleges in the region. The workshop will be the first of 8 such workshops to be conducted nationally by the League for Innovation through a \$907,000 grant from the Department of Energy. A total of 240 community college educators will be trained to teach the installation of solar energy systems. Upon completion of the workshops, participating faculty members will be part of a national network designed to share in a continuing distribution of materials on solar energy, and to assist colleges in implementing programs and instructional aids provided by the project. Participating institutions will conduct in-service training sessions for persons employed in occupations related to solar energy system installation, and introduce solar energy system installation into related vocational and technical courses in their curricula. The DOE grant is the largest single training grant ever given to a community college group.

INTERESTING NEW PROGRAMS - LCC's Board of Education has approved the addition of an Energy Management Technology program and is considering establishing a 33-acre timber management laboratory at the southeast corner of the main campus. Starting next fall, students will be able to enroll in a two-year Energy Management program or a one-year program in Residential Energy Assessment. They will be offered through the Special Training Programs department. The state chose LCC to run pilot programs in energy and will pay most of the costs. The idea of a timber lab came from second-year forestry students. They want to do horse logging to raise funds for equipment. And they want to study effects of such practices as thinning on tree growth. The Board will consider the forestry proposal at the June 11 meeting.

BUDGET - The College Budget Committee met briefly Wednesday night to approve a supplemental budget of \$686,152. The Board of Education now will have the budget on its June 11 agenda. More money has been received this year than anticipated because of the increased enrollment and consequent additional tuition, larger-than-expected earnings on investments, additional funds from the State Scholarship Commission, more cash carryover than planned, more food services income, more Torch income, etc. State law requires the supplemental budget procedure to keep it all subject to public scrutiny.

THE R-G ERRED - A report in Sunday's Register-Guard, which attributed most of this year's enrollment growth to adult education, was in error. The Guard said editorially that "most of the added enrollment has come in Adult Education programs, which are basically self-supporting." In fact, the 1,076.3 FTE growth this year included 707.8 FTE in credit programs and 368.5 FTE in Adult Education. Adult Ed grew by 15.42 percent, compared to 11.92 percent in credit programs. And Adult Ed has a larger headcount. But, when one is talking about costs--as the R-G was--one talks in terms of FTE, not the other numbers.

BOARD MEETING - LCC's Board of Education goes to the Downtown Center for its meeting tonight. The session, which will focus on Phase III of the DTC remodeling, begins at 7:30 in Room 320. Also on the agenda are a report on the state of college finances, review of the May election defeat, discussion of the long-range plan, and a proposal for Management Group salary increases for next year at a rate not to exceed faculty increases.

GOOD SHAPE - Because of additional income from tuition, state reimbursement, prior year's taxes and other sources, the college is in good fiscal shape this year. Financial Services Director Verne Whittaker says there should be \$750,000 in cash carryover to help fund next year's budget, as planned. That amount and the \$2 million on the June 24 election ballot would put the college in strong position to meet next year's anticipated costs.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE GIVES SUPPORT - The Executive Committee of the Eugene Area Chamber of Commerce gave "the very highest recommendation" for passage of the LCC tax base and budget in its May 13 meeting. In a letter to President Schafer, Thomas Hoyt, president of the Committee, cited "actions by (LCC) faculty, staff and students which indicate that they recognize the economic pressures on this area just now, and have responded accordingly with extremely reasonable decisions on faculty salaries and tuition increases."

WHAT THEY DID ON LEAVE - During his fall term '79 professional development leave, Bill Blix of Art and Applied Design did studio work on a sculpture-fountain commissioned by the State of Oregon for the Capitol Mall Area in Salem. Bill describes the fountain as "an abstract work in bronze incorporating wave-like forms that not only imply the movement of water but serve as guide surfaces for the actual water flow." His responsibilities have covered every aspect of the fountain construction (concrete work, plumbing, wiring and lighting) and its incorporation into the city block site (sidewalk access and landscaping). Bill reports that the experience has added a new dimension to his teaching, as a full-time producer of art. The work is still in progress and is scheduled for completion in September.

Delta Sanderson, Language Arts, spent a fall term professional development leave traveling in Europe. She describes her five months of travel--which began last summer--as "a rich experience offering insights which I feel make me a more knowledgeable and effective teacher." She lodged with a wide variety of people in several different countries, allowing her to become familiar with customs, attitudes, goals and lifestyles. She says she found most of her hosts very interested in the community college concept; some European countries, she reports, have extension programs similar to our adult education classes, but none has as extensive a system as in this country. Delta also found time to attend a five-day international poetry symposium at the University of Innsbruck, Austria, and to work in a seminar in London and Brighton in connection with the World Science Fiction convention, attended by about 3500 people from all over the world.

PLANETARIUM - The Lane County Planetarium/Science Center is sponsoring an Open House for LCC Science staff this Friday at 3 p.m. President Schafer, co-host of the event, will be the main speaker; his talk will be followed by a planetarium show and a preview of the Science Center. All LCC Science staff and department heads are invited to attend the Open House.

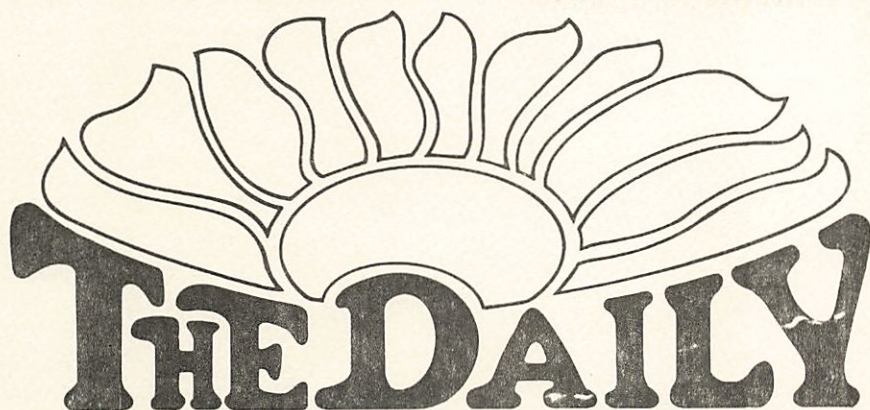

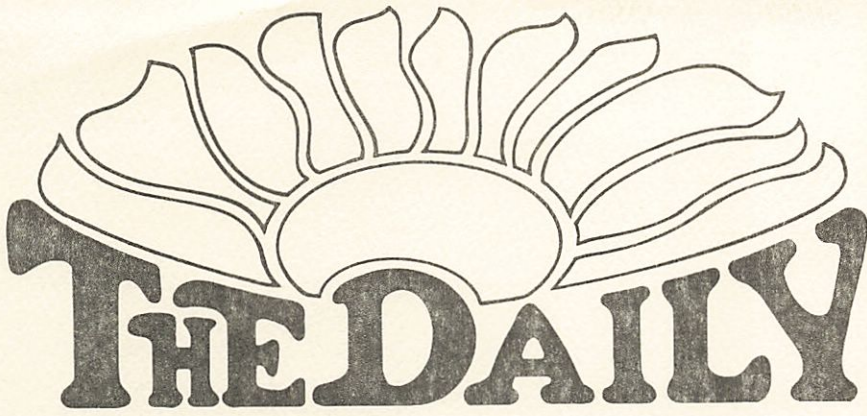
