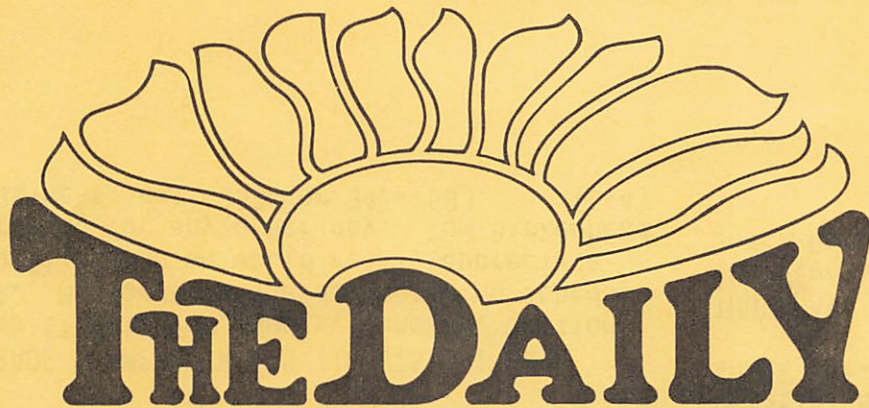

**SUPPORT FROM BUILDING TRADES COUNCIL** - The Lane County Building Construction Trades Council has gone on record in support of LCC's proposed 1980-81 operating budget levy. They support both A and B ballots. Doug Dinsmore, Secretary of the Council, points out in a letter of support to the Eugene Register-Guard that "The college, like all agencies, is caught up in the current inflationary spiral."

**SOME WON** - Three of the four community colleges which sought tax bases in the May 20 election were successful, including Umpqua, Rogue and Mt. Hood. Umpqua's voters established a first-ever base of almost \$1.8 million. Rogue's base was increased from \$722,000 to more than \$1.6 million. Mt. Hood's base was increased from \$2.6 million to almost \$6 million.

**LEVY UPDATE** - Three community colleges will be seeking voter approval of 1980-81 levies on June 24. LCC's tax base will generate about \$5.9 million; the June 24 A Ballot will be for \$1.7 million in excess of that, and the B ballot for another \$338,266. The state will reimburse homeowners for up to 30 percent of the A ballot amount but will not share in the B ballot amount. Mt. Hood is the only other college that has put the split-ballot concept before its voters, and was successful with both ballots.

Central Oregon C.C., which has no tax base, will submit a levy of \$2,848,423 on June 24. It lost a previous levy attempt on March 25. Treasure Valley C.C. which lost in February and again in May, will submit a levy of \$1,391,780 on June 24.

Calls may be made from your home phone, or at a get-out-the-vote phone calling session at the First National Bank on East Broadway between 6 and 8 p.m. on the 24th. Thanks for helping.

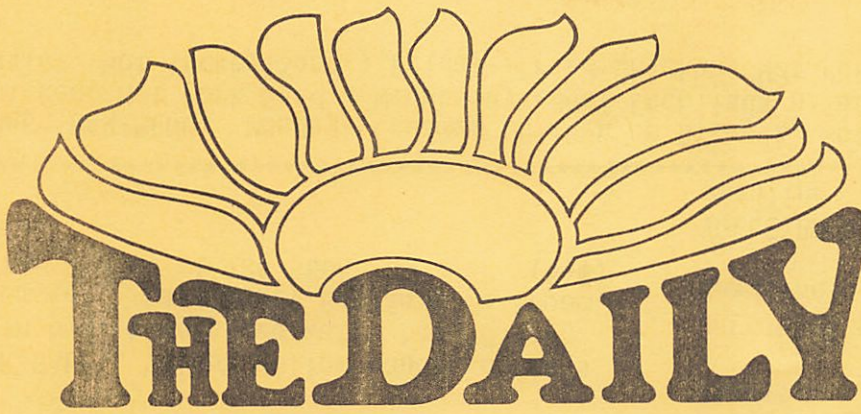

AL AID - Ninety percent of all federal funds earmarked for postsecondary educational aid goes to student financial aid, but community colleges are not the chief beneficiaries. The American Council of Education's survey of the five financial aid programs -- Basic Educational Opportunity Grants (BEOG), Supplemental EOG, National Direct Student Loan (NDSL), Guaranteed Student Loan (GSL) and College Work Study (CWS) -- shows that public four-year colleges get the most. Community college students received 28.8 percent of the BEOG money, 16.9% of the SEOG money, 9.2% of the NDSL money, 6% of the GSL money and 23% of the CWS money. Nearly 80 percent of the NDSL money goes to four-year students, public and private.

A report by Oregon's State Scholarship Commission shows that during the 1978-79 school year, some 3,549 community college students received \$1.3 million in state need grants. From the public four-year institutions, 6,458 students received \$2.6 million, and from the private four-year schools, 1,462 students shared in \$978,000.

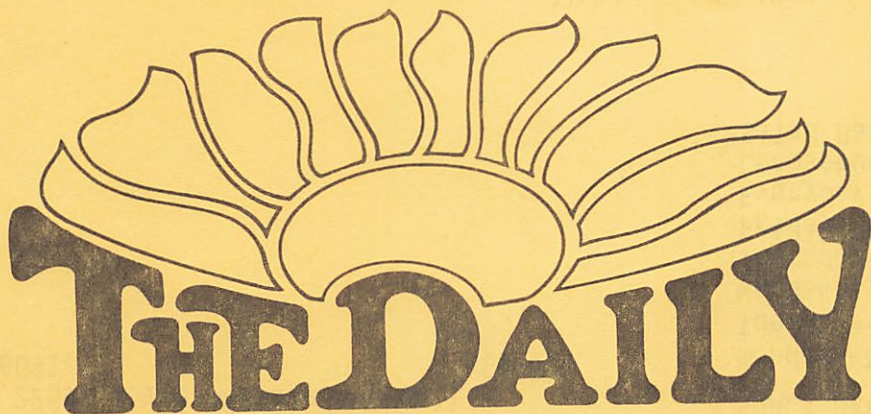

**LCC'S FUNDING PROBLEM** - President Schafer laid the College's funding problem at the feet of the state at last Wednesday's Board of Education meeting. He said the College probably wouldn't need the levies on the June 24 ballot if the state had met its funding obligations. In the absence of state support, however, local taxpayers have to be asked to pay extra to educate all those who want to enroll. The President's statement follows:

I think it appropriate to briefly review our financial situation and to identify the factors which contributed to our present dilemma.

Assuming for the moment that normal conditions prevailed--Lane would have received at least \$815,009 in state reimbursement for students served during the 1979-80 year.

Assuming the "open-door" concept was retained for the 1980-81 year, Lane would have received at least an additional \$1,124,550 in state support.

Failing in our attempt to obtain full funding from the Emergency Board, the community colleges accepted the "Boe Plan" which would have provided Lane an additional \$487,770 in 1980-81 if we were able to serve 9,575 full-time equivalent students.

As you know, last week the State Superintendent withdrew our request from the Emergency Board Agenda, thereby closing that avenue to us.

Had the state fully funded us for the students served we would not be facing the current election with an A and B ballot.

One could logically take the position that the college should limit its enrollment to the state determined limit.

The 1980-81 state support was approved by the last legislature at 8,385 FTE. We expected some 9,500 FTE to be served. The Governor's recent action reducing state funding by 2 percent reduces our reimbursement level to 8,210.32 FTE, some 1,300 below what we expect. This reduction translates into an additional loss of \$165,076 in state funding.

It seems obvious to me that we must take the initiative in convincing the ECC, State Department of Education and the Legislature that the enrollment forecasts for Lane be raised to a more realistic level in the next biennium.

Secondly, we must work through the State Department of Education and other community colleges to secure a state funding formula which retains state support at approximately the 45 percent level.

Thirdly, we must endeavor to clearly communicate to the voters of the district the issues we face and the implications of the election.

We've repeatedly informed citizens of the unexpected enrollment growth at LCC. People normally translate growth to success and prosperity. In a sense, we've been too successful in serving people.

I'm not at this time recommending that we severely limit enrollment during 1980-81, but I believe we must carefully monitor enrollment throughout the summer and be prepared to make appropriate decisions when we have all available information.

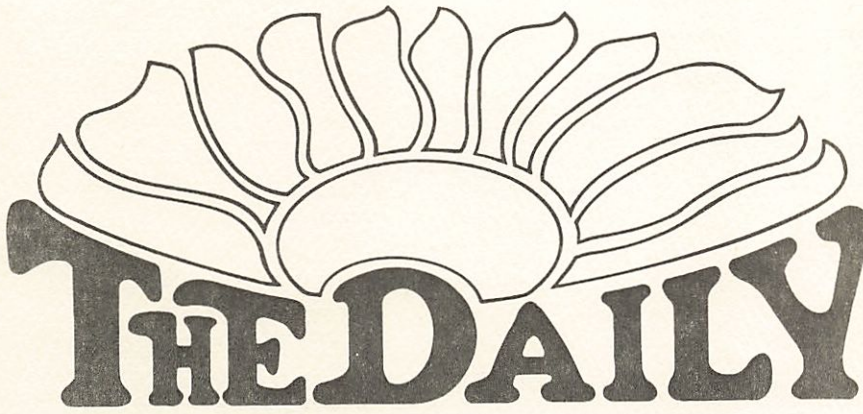

**MAY ELECTIONS LESS SUCCESSFUL THAN MARCH** - Slightly less than half of the school-related measures passed in Oregon's May 20 election, according to unofficial results from the Dept. of Education. In the 39 districts voting on an "A" measure, 27 had the measure approved (69%) and 12 failed. In the 15 districts voting on a "B" measure, 4 had the measure approved (26%), 11 failed. All of the "A" and "B" measures did slightly better in the March 26 school district financial elections: 79% of the "A" measures passed and 42% of the "B" measures passed.

**SUPPORTIVE PRECINCTS** - Though LCC's tax base proposal was rejected district-wide by 30,674 (40%) to 45,439, the College did carry 26 and tie one of the 171 precincts. As in the past, the wins were in central and southeast Eugene for the most part. About a fourth of the precincts produced more than a third of the supportive votes.

**APPOINTED** - Dean of Students Jack Carter was appointed last month to serve on the Community College Information System Advisory Committee of the State Board of Education. His term is for 2 years....Jeanne Armstrong, Home Economics, has been appointed to the State Museum of Natural History Planning Committee. She represents LCC, Lane Education Service District, and Willamette Science and Technology Center (WISTEC) on the committee, which is designed to improve communication among consortium members of the Lane County Cooperative Museum Commission.

**NEW COURSES** - The Board of Education has approved these new courses: Respiratory Therapy Trends and Issues; Neonatal/Pediatric Respiratory Care; Classical Cuisine and Service; Menu Planning; Athletic Nutrition; and Introduction to Disorganized Personality. A new option added to Food Service Management is Professional Restaurant and Hotel Cooking.

**ENERGY STUDY** - LCC's Board of Education has allocated \$11,500 to match a Department of Energy grant in the same amount to fund a \$23,000 study of ways to strengthen College energy-saving systems. Marquess Engineering Co. of Springfield will study the feasibility/efficiency of changes related to such uses as lighting, heating, ventilation, etc. The study could be the basis of a number of grant applications for federal and other monies to make recommended adjustments.

**GAME ROOM** - New ASLCC President David Anderson has proposed that space be found somewhere on campus for a student recreation room. He wants to raise money for the ASLCC while at the same time providing a recreation outlet for students. Games such as pool and foosball are suggested.

**TRIBUTE** - Bill Mobley, a former welding instructor who passed away recently, should be remembered for his dedication to students, excellence as a welder, and as a recipient of the LCC Vocational Instructor of the Year award. Bill also received his Associate of Science degree before an accident forced his retirement.

**FOREST LAB?** - John Phillips, Science, proposed to the LCC Board of Education at its June 11 meeting the development of commercial tree thinning demonstration plots south and east of campus. The forest "laboratory" would be an educational tool for LCC forestry students, and would also provide a valuable service to owners of small woodlands in Lane County.

**APPRECIATION** - Ruth Bascom, Chairman of the Galaxy Ball benefit for the new Willamette Science & Technology Center, sends thanks for the assistance of five LCC students who volunteered their time to serve the dinner at the ball. 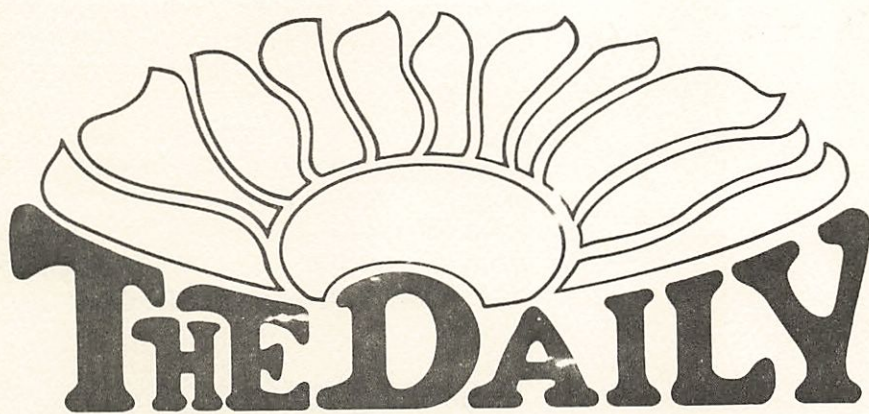
