KLCC GETS GRANT - KLCC-FM has received a \$96,053 grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (part of the Commerce Department) to purchase new equipment. Program Director Sam Hochberg says the money will be used to replace outdated equipment in the station's two existing studios, to equip an additional studio, and to purchase a new microwave system. Grant monies will also be used to raise the station's signal from 10,000 to 30,000 watts, and to install translators to rebroadcast KLCC programs in Oakridge, Florence and Cottage Grove. The expansion was necessitated by KLCC's increased commitment to local and national news and public affairs and to minority and women's programming, Hochberg says. KLCC Development Director Gina Ing was primarily responsible for the preparation of the grant application, with assistance from Hochberg and Chief Engineer Steve Barton.

GRANT GOES TO HORSTRUP, TOO - Carl Horstrup is recipient of a \$60,000 grant awarded by CETA and the Oregon Department of Education to develop preapprenticeship curricula in 10 apprenticeable trade areas. In addition to pre-job modules and instructional analyses, the project will incorporate basic skill components, patterned after a program which Horstrup is currently coordinating at LCC. Shannon Kracht will direct the project.

ELECTED - Bill Dotson was elected vice-president (and president-elect) of the National Association of Small Business Management Instructors at the Association's Third National Conference in Duluth, Minnesota, June 23-26. He will serve a two-year term. The organization serves to keep SBM instructors up to date on developments in the program.

SOME GOOD SIGNS - Although LCC's "A" ballot in the June 24 election was rejected 12,671-15,099, the percent of the Yes vote was 46, compared to 40 at the May 20 election. Some 58 precincts were supportive (34 percent district-wide), compared to 40 at the may 20 electron. Some 36 precincts were in there was a 53 percent Yes vote in Eugene 4-J, and 49 of the supportive precincts were in 4-J (63 percent). The "B" ballot was supported by central and southeast Eugene precincts, but rejected by outlying areas. The "B" measure received 1,373 more votes than the "A" measure, indicating that some voters may be unaware that the "B" cannot be levied unless the "A" passes.

MANAGEMENT COMPENSATION - Seventy-eight percent of the Management Employees responded to a "ratification vote" on the Board of Education's 1980-81 Management Compensation package last week, approving the package unanimously. The approval represents a "vote of thanks" to the Board, even though the Management Employees are not a bargaining unit with legal authority to reject or accept the package.

DONATION - Verne Whittaker, Chairman of the Management Steering Committee, reports that the Management Employees Group is donating \$1,000 to the LCC Advocates Committee and has initiated an additional fund-raising campaign to help insure that district residents are informed when they go to the polls in September. He says the donation equates to slightly more than \$10 per management employee, and he encourages the four bargaining units at LCC and other concerned supporters of the College to follow the leadership of the management group.

CWE GROWING - LCC's Cooperative Work Experience Program is now the fifth largest such program in the nation, and one of the most successful, reports CWE director Bob Way in the June issue of the CWE newsletter. Since 1970, the program has added to its initial offerings in forestry and mechanics to reach its present range of offerings in over 70 instructional areas.

MOBILE CLASSROOM UPDATE - The Annual Report for the LCC Mobile Classroom, prepared by Coordinator Linda Myers, contains the following facts:

- --380 people visited the Mobile Classroom between October 8, 1979, and June 6, 1980.
- --307 (81%) of those visiting the classroom were women.
- --79 of the 380, or 21%, registered for classes. Community members registering for classes vary in age from 19 to 72. The majority of the students are women in their early twenties to late forties.
- --About 75% of the people who visit the M.C. take home some informational pamphlet, brochure or catalog. Most people who visit the bus need to talk to someone about programs at LCC, how to get into classes, who to contact, or how to apply for financial aid.
- --A total of 427 videos were viewed this year by M.C. visitors.

SPENDING AND HIRING FREEZE - Governor Atiyeh's call for a 30 percent reduction in state support has resulted in a spending and hiring freeze at LCC. President Schafer has placed a freeze on all new hires, capital outlay expenditures, and other requests for funds not "absolutely necessary for the immediate continued operation of the college." Approval for any expenditures will be made through President Schafer's office.

POPULAR PROGRAMS - Seventy-two qualified applicants applied for 20 openings in next year's Dental Hygiene class. Final selection was made using personal interviews and other screening criteria. There were 42 applicants for 34 openings in the Dental Assisting program. In the equally popular nursing programs, a modified lottery was used to select next year's classes from among qualified applicants. There were 154 applicants for 80 spots in the Associate Degree Nursing program; 85 applied for the 30 openings in the Practical Nursing program. Applications for the Medical Office Assisting and Respiratory Therapy programs close this month.

NEW CLASSROOM - Board approval was given last Wednesday for remodeling of PE 115 for use as an emergency care classroom. The class had outgrown its old room, PE 111. Work on the classroom, scheduled for completion this summer, is being funded from uncommitted construction fund

NEEDHAM RESIGNS - Linn-Benton Community College President Ray Needham has resigned to take the presidency at Guilford Technical Institute in Jamestown, North Carolina. Needham has been president at LBCC since October 1970. His resignation is effective August 15. --OCCA Digest

STATE BUDGET DEFICIT - The July 3 issue of the <u>OCCA News Digest</u> predicts dire consequences for community colleges resulting from the state's projected deficit for the current biennium of about \$200 million. Warns the <u>Digest</u>, "Whatever the Legislature decides, it is certain that community colleges will have much lower revenue from the state for the 80-81 year than they have already budgeted for."

HELP US GET THE WORD OUT - To save money during this time of uncertainty, LCC's Fall Term class schedule will not be mailed to district homes as in past terms. Copies of the schedule will be available on campus and at the Downtown Center beginning Tuesday, September 2.

GETTING READY - Lane Community College Employees Federation is conducting a smash campaign to pass the LCC budget in September. All classified employees will be contacted by Jerry Sirois or some other representative (on their own time) during the week of July 21-25. Please be prepared to make a contribution--cash or checks (made payable to LCC Advocates) in any amount will be appreciated. Receipts will be given for cash donations.

SCHOLARSHIPS - Two Associate Degree Nursing students, Marianne Wharton and Deborah Burt, both of Eugene, have received scholarships toward their second year of study at LCC. Wharton received the \$300 Clairol Loving Care Scholarship; Burt received a \$450 scholarship from the Business and Professional Women's Foundation.

MORE ENERGY SAVINGS IN THE WORKS - Four projects to reduce energy consumption at LCC have been identified by Marquess Engineering, the firm hired to investigate ways of increasing the college's energy efficiency. Grant proposals to the Department of Energy for funding of the four projects are "in the process." If approved, the grants would cover half the total project costs of \$135,000, with the college asked to come up with the other half. Facilities Director Paul Colvin says savings from the four projects could amount to an annual \$30,000, meaning the college's share would be repaid in energy savings within 2 years.
