REMEMBER... - Please help us get the word out: to save money during this time of uncertainty, LCC's Fall Term class schedule will not be mailed to district homes as in past terms. Copies of the schedule will be available on campus and at the Downtown Center and other outreach locations beginning Tuesday, September 2. The college will not be able to honor individual requests to have schedules mailed; departments are urged to not make any commitments in this regard.

QUICKIE BOARD MEETING - The LCC Board of Education meets at noon Wednesday in the President's Dining Room to set levy amounts for the September 16 election. Members are expected to approve resubmission of the same "A" and "B" measures rejected by voters on June 24. The "A" is for \$1,688,316 beyond the Oregon 6 percent constitutional limitation and the "B" is for \$339,829. The "A" would cost the owner of a home assessed at \$55,000 an estimated additional \$9.24 for LCC for one year. The "B" would cost an estimated \$2.75.

CLIMBING - The Management Group's donations to the LCC Advocates campaign fund for the September 16 election totaled \$1,875 this morning. The goal is \$2,000. Business Department Head Jack Kreitz is fundraising chairman.

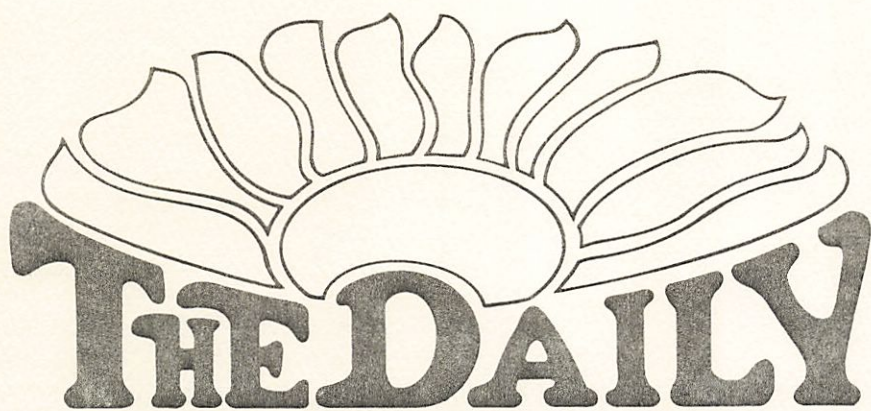

BUDGET CUT - As The Daily went to press Friday, it appeared that LCC would have its state support cut by 10 percent this year. The college will lose about \$825,000. Areas where the budget will be reduced are to be announced. It should be noted that none of this amount will be offset by the proposed \$2 million levy on the September 16 "A" and "B" ballots.

ARE YOU REGISTERED TO VOTE? - Voter registration cards and absentee ballot applications are available at the Student Resource Center, Student Activities, Counseling, Admissions--all on the second floor of the Center Building--or at the Information Window, first floor of the Administration Building.

DOLLARS COMING IN - LCC Advocates, the citizen committee working on behalf of the September 16 LCC election, reports more than \$3,000 raised to date to underwrite election expenses. The money will be spent on sending a mailer to homes in supportive precincts and handing out materials door-to-door in supportive precincts the day before the election. To date, classified people have contributed \$231, faculty \$625, ASLCC \$25, managers \$2,000, and non-staff \$200.

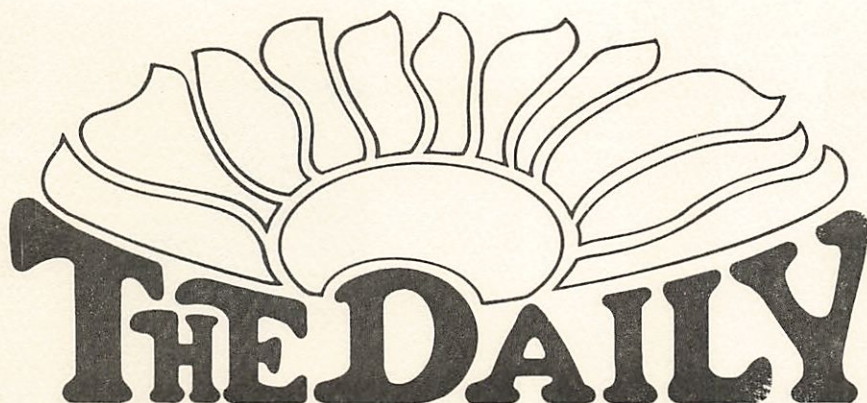

GOODBYE - John Wilson, Information Services Director, has accepted a position in the Coos Bay area, and will be leaving Friday, August 22. There will be a reception for John in the Boardroom (with cake and punch) Friday from 2 to 4 p.m. Join in wishing John a fond farewell.

A REMINDER - Everyone's help is needed in getting the word out that the Fall Term class schedule will not be mailed, and that copies of the schedule will be available beginning Sept. 2 at the following locations: main campus; Downtown Center; Florence and Cottage Grove outreach centers; Eugene, Springfield and Junction City public libraries.

SEMINAR - "Adventures in Attitudes," a 4-day seminar designed to help people develop better skills in communication, daily problem solving, time management, leadership, and personal career planning, is scheduled for Sept. 4, 5, 11 and 12 at LCC. Cost of the seminar is \$75, and advance registration is required. For more information or to obtain a registration form, contact the Staff Development Office at ext. 2260. (The Staff Development Office is not sponsoring or promoting the seminar.)

MORE BUDGET CUTTING - The possibility of further budget cutting for community colleges as part of the 1981-83 state appropriation process is seen by staff of the Oregon Community College Assn. It appears that tax revenues (mostly from the state income tax) could be far short of the requests from state agencies. The Executive Department projects \$416 million in new taxes collected during the biennium. OCCA says it could be closer to \$150 million. Basic school support alone wants \$236 million in new money; community colleges are asking for \$30 million for operations, \$21.75 for operations support and \$16.9 million for construction. And then there are all the other state agencies.... On the other hand, the revenue picture could brighten overnight if the economy picks up, more electronics firms move to Oregon, and so on.

OREGON COMMUNITY COLLEGES - Vice president Bob Adams has been elevated to interim president for 1980-81 at Linn-Benton CC at Albany. Former president Ray Needham has moved to a North Carolina CC....Central Oregon at Bend and Southwestern at Coos Bay are still without faculty contracts for the '80-'81 year. Central is at an impasse; SWOCC is awaiting faculty ratification of a tentative agreement....Clackamas at Oregon City has abolished out-of-district tuition, citing minimal revenue generated. Out-of-state tuition is retained....According to the Bureau of National Affairs, Oregon CC salaries for faculty rank 13th in the nation. Washington is 10th. The median 9-month salary nationally is \$16,297....The Legislative effort to reduce CC cuts from 10 to 4 percent failed but reflected heroic efforts by Sen. Ed Fadeley (D-Eugene). He got support from Sen. Fred Heard (D-Klamath Falls), Sen. Keith Burbidge (D-Salem), and Rep. Vera Katz (D-Portland)....The Employee Relations Board has handed down a definitive ruling that a collective bargaining unit must consist of more than one person.

ANOTHER BALLOT MEASURE SIX - The Oregon Taxpayers Union (OTU) gathered enough signatures on petitions to place a severe property tax limitation measure on the November ballot. It would roll back assessed valuations to their 1977 levels and limit future increases to 2 percent a year. The maximum amount of property taxes levied each year could not exceed one percent of true cash value. The effect on the ability of local government to generate revenue would be devastating. Sale of bonds for construction would be halted, and such things as the veterans loan program would be stopped. Gov. Atiyeh, an ardent supporter of past limitation proposals, opposes this one.

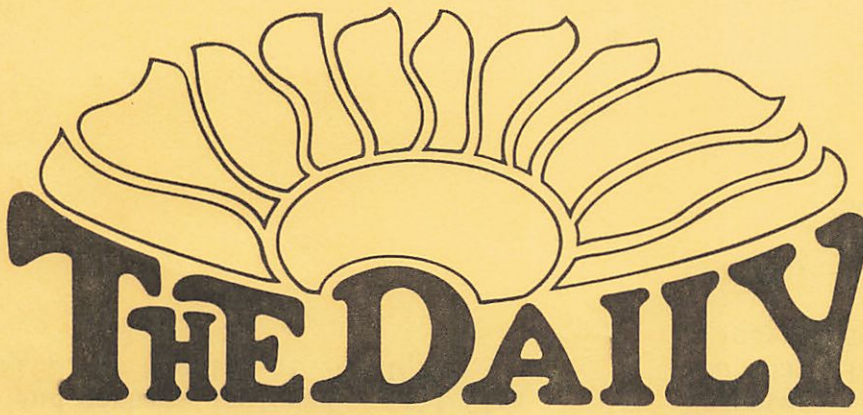

SMALL BUSINESS MANAGEMENT - LCC and the Oregon Department of Education co-sponsored a training program August 11-15 in the Business Department for Small Business Management instructors who are participants in the University of Minnesota Model Small Business Management program. LCC Small Business Management instructors Bill Dotson and Bill Tweedie assisted in the presentation. The 16 participants in the training program included 11 instructors from Oregon, 4 from Washington, and one representative from the Minority Business Development Agency in San Francisco. NO INCREASE - T.K. Olson of the Oregon Educational Coordinating Commission says that the 1981-83 state budget for education may include no growth in revenues over the 1979-81 period. The state's revenue picture may be clouded, he said, by a ripple effect of this year's general fund revenue shortfall into 1981-83, and continued high unemployment which keeps income tax collections down, thus hurting services paid for by state government.
