BE PREPARED - We will all be getting questions about LCC's class schedule. Please clip and post this so that you'll have the answers at hand.

Copies of the fall term class schedule are now available on campus (Admissions, Counseling, Information Window), at the Siuslaw Center (3149 Oak, Florence), at LCC's center in Cottage Grove (216 S. 6th), and at the Eugene, Springfield, and Junction City public libraries, and at the Eugene Downtown Center. The college is unable to honor requests to mail individual schedules to people.

DONATIONS STILL WELCOME - LCC Advocates--the citizen committee working for passage of the September 16 LCC levies--advises The Daily that an additional \$150 in donations was received last week from the faculty. Donations are still sought, since the committee still hasn't quite enough to finance two mailings to the 35 precincts that voted for both the "A" and "B" levies on the June 24 ballot. In addition to the mailings, the committee plans a precinct walk and get-out-the-vote telephoning. It amounts to more activity than has ever before been undertaken for an LCC election. Those who want to be part of it should contact their union officers.

READY TO CAST YOURS? - Voter registration cards, absentee ballot applications, and sample ballots for the September 16 election are available at the Information Window in the Administration building, the Student Activities Office, and the Admissions Office.

ENDORSEMENT - The Lane County Central Labor Council has unanimously endorsed passage of LCC's \$2 million in levies on the September 16 ballot. The Council vote followed a "grilling" of Deans Gerry Rasmussen and Bill Berry on levy details last Thursday.

ANOTHER ENDORSEMENT - The Eugene Education Association, after hearing a presentation by Language Arts Prof. Ted Romoser, endorsed the College's September 16 ballot proposals and agreed to work on their behalf.

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FOR THOSE WHO ASKED - If both LCC levies on the September 16 ballot are approved, the College can serve 9,000 full-time equivalent students this year (300+ below last year's total). If only the "A" measure is approved, the College can serve 8,500 FTE. If neither the "A" nor the "B" were approved, the FTE would drop to 6,600. The A ballot, if passed, will cost the owner of a \$55,000 home an additional \$9.24 a year. The B ballot would cost that homeowner \$2.75 more.

CLOSE TO GOAL - LCC Advocates advise that they are within a couple hundred dollars of having sufficient funds to send 26,000 post cards to voters in the 35 precincts which supported both the "A" and "B" measures at the June 24 election. The Advocates ask that those willing to help them reach their goal contact their union officers. The mailings have to go out this week.

MORE ENDORSEMENTS - Language Arts Prof. Ted Romoser went to a Labor Day picnic and asked and got the endorsement of LCC's Sept. 16 election levies by the Lane County Democratic Central Committee. Earlier, he also won endorsement from the Lane County Uniserve Council, which represents most Lane County K-12 teachers.

SOLAR WORKSHOP BEGINS - A workshop to teach community college teachers how to teach solar installation begins today and runs through Friday. SEEKING \$\$\$ - Oregon community colleges will ask partial restoration of the 10 percent cut in state funding made by the Legislature in August. Four-year colleges and universities got back \$1 million of their cut from the Legislative Emergency Board. Community colleges will go before the E-Board October 16 or 17 to ask for an equal amount to compensate for last year's overrealized FTE. LCC's share could range from \$100,000 to \$400,000.

ALL WON - The last three Oregon community colleges without budgets for this year won levies Sept. 16. Treasure Valley, which has no tax base, got a levy of \$1.4 million. Central Oregon, also without a base, won \$2.8 million. Lane got levies totaling \$2 million.

TAX BASES - Nine Oregon community colleges will seek tax bases at the Nov. 4 election. Blue Mountain seeks \$2.99 million; Central wants \$4.2 million; Chemeketa \$12.5 million (with a promise to levy no more than \$9.25 million in the first year); Clackamas \$8.5 million; Clatsop \$2.5 million; Linn-Benton \$5.5 million; Portland \$11.8 million; and Lane \$9.4 million. Treasure Valley has yet to decide how much it will ask. Mt. Hood, Umpqua and Rogue won new bases at the May election. SWOCC will live with what it has.

Only 33 of 1200 two-year institutions have women as presidents. A grant from the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) to the League for Innovation and the American Association of Women in Community and Junior Colleges (AAWCJC) (whew!) will respond to this imbalance by providing administrative training for cc women. The \$64,779 grant will involve 50 women a year for three years, with the aim of increasing the number of women in leadership positions in community colleges. WARM UP - Can exercising be fun? SHARING RESOURCES - The LCC Staff Development Office is sharing, on a space-available basis, selected in-service activities with personnel from the Willamalane Park and Recreation District. Don Lindly and Jewelee Houston of Willamalane attended sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

EXPENDITURES - Preliminary figures regarding LCC Advocates' spending for the Sept. 16 election indicate that \$3,400.44 was expended in the winning effort. The post office got \$2,128; \$20 went for mailing labels; \$45 went for coffee, etc., before the precinct walk; the county elections department got \$79.99 for voter lists; \$146.90 went to the firm which handled the counting and bundling of the mailings; \$25.26 was spent on precinct maps, etc.; \$131.65 was spent on the precinct party; and \$823.61 went for printing. An income figure hasn't yet come from the treasurer, but it is expected that there are sufficient monies to meet expenditures.

SHORTAGE - Because the state expects a shortfall in revenue for the 1981-83 biennium, Gov. Atiyeh directed budget planners to work on possible reductions ranging up to 15 percent. Oregon community colleges expected \$128 million for the biennium, could get about \$102 million. They got \$93 million this biennium.

FUNDING UPS & DOWNS - The House Appropriations Committee has approved a budget of \$14.2 billion for education programs in fiscal 1981, which begins Oct. 1, 1980. This is \$.8 billion less than President Carter requested. Funding for many programs of interest to LCC (those with monies for which LCC would be competing) are unchanged from the current fiscal year. For others, including National Direct Student Loans and Veterans' Cost of Instruction, funding is down. Those with increased funding include Basic Educational Opportunity Grants; Cooperative Education; Internat'1 & Foreign Language Studies; Bilingual Secondary and Elementary; and Handicapped: regional, vocational, adult and post-secondary. STUDY PANNED - A UCLA study which claimed some types of vocational education do not help students get jobs has been criticized by a government-appointed panel of education researchers for improper research techniques. The National Institute of Education granted UCLA \$171,000 for the original study and then appointed the second research team to review the results. The team found the report to be full of mathematical errors and statistics altered to buttress key statements. The team said the study was based on "skimpy statistical evidence." They said the proposal that much of the entry-level training now done by public vocational schools be transferred to "proprietary" institutions (i.e., private business schools, beauty schools, etc.) because they do a better job of training was "largely innocuous. The recommendation regarding the role of the private sector remains arguable," the panel said.
